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DESCRIPTION OF FUNDING ALLOCATION

C.

1. What were some of the benefits in having the travel fund approved?

- As a result of the Rural Travel Funding we received 40 children based from Waiharara-Pawarenga were able to participate regularly in sports. 18 of those children trained 4-6 days a week. All 40 were able to participate in regatta's in Te Tii, Lake Manuwai, Lake Ngatu, Pawarenga, Waitangi and Taipa.
- Another benefit to this travel fund was that the children were transported by carpooling so rather than a whole lot of fuel being consumed by multiple vehicles (and the consequential impact that has on the environment), the people with the most seats available were supported to take turns carpooling.
- Children were able to exercise/ participate in sport more often then normal due to relieved financial pressure on their parents/ coaches. This has a flow-on effect to less stressed families and better health for their tamariki.
- Finally, Team Tiare won two golds and a silver at Nationals. Ngā Tupu O Tai won silver and made two other finals. Black Broncos and Mulivai Boosters made two semi-finals, (Black Broncos also got the second fastest time across all heats but were DQ'd on a turn fault). Lil Tiare & Mauri Mini Dolphins all made their finals.
- Some of the social outcomes these rangatahi/ tamariki acquired included learning:
 - to deal with conflict resolution in a team environment,
 - to focus on the task at hand even when larger issues are going on in the background.
 - that sometimes people are better off in different teams rather than keeping a forced awkwardness
 - to have fun but be respectful
 - to look after younger club members and kuia
 - better nutrition through small steps ie. Drinking water rather than fad dieting
 - to prepare healthy kai
 - the power of positivity (and conversely the power of negativity) in a team
 - social media etiquette
 - Caring for the environment by mowing/ weedeating the waka compound, frequently picking up rubbish from around the lake and spraying waka down every time they changed from different bodies of water to reduce the likelihood of cross contamination.

2. In your opinion did the Far North Rural Travel Fund help your organisation/group increase participation in sport/recreation?

Yes, the above was all possible as the funds were shared by the coaches who were able to pick up and drop off these children for their trainings and competitions (most of whom come from homes that could not afford to get their children there themselves). This also meant that the parents then had the time and money to ensure their children had food, water and towels to participate.

Two coaches were also nominated for Tai Tokerau and Far North sports awards and chose to take youth in their teams to these awards to show them the potential of training hard.

WAKA AMA

The Far North medal haul at the waka ama national sprint championships hit double figures as the week-long event wrapped up on Lake Karapiro on Saturday.

The standout performer individually was Waitangi Piripi — a Te Rangi Aniwanuiwa student — claiming gold in the w1 intermediate women's 500m final (in a time of 2:41.63) while paddling for the Kaitiaki-based Nga Hoe Horo Outrigger Canoe Club on day four of the event.

The first place added to the two other gold medals Piripi had claimed while paddling with Team Tiare in w6 intermediate women's racing on day three last Tuesday; as well as a silver won with the team in w12 racing (combining with Nga Tupu o Tai and racing under the name Nga Hoe Horo Intermediate Girls).

Also from Nga Hoe Horo, the veteran men's team, Horo Koro's, won two silver medals in the master (70) men's w6 500m and 500m turn races on the seventh day of competition on Saturday; while one of the North's most acclaimed paddlers, Tupu King, finished runner up in the premier men's w1 500m event.

The Te-Tii based Kaihoe o Ngati Rehia Trust club also claimed medals on finals day, including gold for Team Manuwai in the golden master men w6 500m, with Team Manurere and Team Manuwai picking up silver and bronze respectively in the golden master men w6 1000m race; while Te Tai Tokerau paddled to two silver medals in the golden master women w6 1000 and 500m races.

Elsewhere, the highly successful Herberts on Tour (Nga Hoe Horo) took silver in the premier men w6 1500m title; the Tai Tokerau combined team claimed bronze in the premier men regional w12 500m final on day six; and Team Manu Wairere also featured, finishing second in the St. final of the golden master men w12 500m final on day five last Thursday.

Meanwhile, Tai Tokerau Polynesian Canoe Association spokeswoman Hilda Harawira Halkyard singled out Chev Reti — the coach of Team Tiare — as the most outstanding kaihoe wahine in this year's competition.

"Like many others she and her husband Jason committed many hours to develop budding intermediate teams. Marathon organiser... Chev came seventh in the premier's women's race, and was w1 support for seven intermediate paddlers.

"One won a gold medal, another won a bronze medal.

"She coached a double gold and silver

medallist team and was w1 supporter for six of their races, helped to coach and manage a j16, was a competent steerer for a midjet team and did so much more. Amazing."

■ The 2020 Te Wananga o Aotearoa Waka Ama Sprint Championships drew a field of 3900 paddlers from 68 clubs to compete in 406 races over seven days in front of crowds of spectators estimated at being over 13,000.

Highlights included the senior races last Thursday with a special mention going to four paddlers — Louise Henderson, Corrina Gage, Matahi Brightwell, and James Papali'i — for having competed in every sprint championship in New Zealand.

Overall winners included Horouta Waka Hoe, taking the club points award for the ninth year, while Hei Matau from Rotorua won the Ace Cuthers Memorial Club Spirit Award.

Event spokesperson Lara Collins said Hei Matau were deserved winners of the prestigious Memorial.

"As a club they embodied the values of waka ama throughout the 2020 sprint nationals being manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, hauora and tu tangata."

She said the weather threw some curve balls at organisers over the event from Sunday to Saturday, January 12-18, but thanks to the efforts by the 150-plus volunteers involved the week was "pulled off beautifully".

On behalf of organisers, Collins also extended a huge thanks to the paddlers, teams, coaches, officials, volunteers, and sponsors for all they did to ensure waka ama remained a sport to strive for and an incredible whānau to belong to.
