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Deputation from Hokianga Environmental Group to Far North District Council on Thursday 14th November 2024

Subject: Roadside and amenities management using glyphosate (round up) and other chemical herbicides

Request to FNDC

- That council undertake a 12 month trial of increased mowing instead of glyphosate spray in Rawene from the Rawene junction into and including the township.
- That the trial is undertaken with community representation with the purpose of
 determining what would be needed to meet the weed management requirements
 using mostly mechanical methods that are not detrimental to either human health or
 the environment, with a view to implementing this around Hokianga and the rest of
 Far North District.
- That the trial include roadsides, footpaths and other amenity areas that are the responsibility of FNDC and that the departments responsible for these different functions liaise and co-operate for the trial.
- Our understanding is that a trial would cost around \$9,500

Background:

- Many people from across the Far North District, including many tangata whenua, are concerned about the impact of toxic herbicides on both human health and the environment. This is not just a concern around Rawene as has been suggested but also across the Far North as evidenced by another group speaking to this topic today.
- That Rawene wants to be Spray Free is in the Community Plan.
- Hokianga Environmental Group has tried previously to address this with council, most recently when the Hokianga (No) Spray group was established back in 2021.
 This group, made up of Community Board and Community members, did not manage to achieve our desired outcome of a trial but we want to work positively with council to finish this project.

Concerns:


We have two main areas of concern about the current, glyphosate based, weed management approach:

- 1. The impact of glyphosate on human health
- 2. The impact of glyphosate on the environment particularly soil life and aquatic life

1. The impact of glyphosate on human health

- There is strong evidence that glyphosate is carcinogenic to humans and is also an endocrine disruptor and has other health implications.
- In the US there is a lawsuit against Monsanto who produce Roundup for the cancer
 it has caused. To date Monsanto have settled (often before trial) in around 100,000
 lawsuits and around 54,000 lawsuits remain with new cases still being filed. In
 October 2024, in one case, Monsanto had to pay \$3 million in compensation and
 \$75 million in damages.
- Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) found that out of 2,310 urine samples, taken from a group of Americans intended to be representative of the US population, 1,885 were laced with detectable traces of glyphosate.

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Deputation from PSNA Bay of Islands and Hokianga to Far North District Council on Thursday 14th November 2024

1. Proposed Resolution to implement UNSC 2334

"That Far North District Council supports Aotearoa New Zealand government policy, as expressed through United Nations Security Council resolution 2334, and will decline to purchase goods and services from companies identified by the United Nations Human Rights Council as being involved in the building or maintenance of illegal Israeli settlements on occupied Palestinian land"

Background

In December 2016 the United Nations Security Council passed resolution 2334 (UNSC2334).

This resolution was co-sponsored by the New Zealand government under National Party leadership with Bill English as Prime Minister and Murray McCully as Foreign Minister. Through this resolution the United Nations Security Council states that, in the occupied Palestinian territories, Israeli settlements had "no legal validity" and constituted "a flagrant violation under international law". It said they were a "major obstacle to the achievement of the two-state solution and a just, lasting and comprehensive peace" in the Middle East. The full text of UNSC2334 is included as an appendix to this letter.

We are asking Far North District Council to take steps to implement UNSC2334 and in particular paragraph 5 which states:

5. Calls upon all States, bearing in mind paragraph 1 of this resolution, to distinguish, in their relevant dealings, between the territory of the State of Israel and the territories occupied since 1967;
