# Report on the Outstanding Contribution of Te Hono Staff During Waitangi Week and Māngūngū Commemorations

Te Hono staff played an exceptional role in supporting Councillors and ensuring the smooth execution of Waitangi Week and Māngūngū Commemorations. Their professionalism, cultural expertise, and steadfast commitment to excellence were evident throughout the week as they navigated the complexities of hosting the most significant and historic event in Aotearoa.

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#### Member Report

Te Hono staff were more than cultural advisors or umbrella holders; they embodied the wairua of manaakitanga, ensuring that Councillors were well-supported at every step. They reserved seats for us at key events, provided seamless translation services, and acted as kaiwaiata, lifting the mana of our ropū through waiata at powhiri and other formal proceedings. They ensured we were fed, hydrated, and always at the right place at the right time, often shepherding us to the next kaupapa with precision and grace. In every moment, they acted as bodyguards and cultural navigators, anticipating our needs and ensuring our safety and comfort amidst the bustling activities.

A special acknowledgment must go to Dolly Baker and the behind-the-scenes team, whose meticulous planning made everything run like clockwork. From organising schedules, lanyards, and parking passes to managing the logistics of multiple events, their contributions were invaluable. Their attention to detail alleviated much of the stress that comes with such a significant event, allowing us as Councillors to focus on our roles and fully engage with the kaupapa.

Te Hono staff also demonstrated their ability to seize opportunities to engage with iwi organisations from across Aotearoa. They represented our district with pride, cultivating connections and strengthening relationships that will have lasting benefits for our organisation. This proactive approach showcased their vision for building meaningful partnerships and further solidified the importance of Waitangi Week as not only a commemoration but also an opportunity for collaboration and unity.

Reflecting on the past three years, I have seen my lobbying efforts to make Waitangi Week and Māngūngū Commemorations a core part of our organisational culture come to fruition. It is inspiring to see how far we've come and my vision is that these events become a Business As Usual (BAU) initiative, highlighting our unique position as hosts of the world's most significant treaty commemoration. It is humbling to acknowledge that this kaupapa, which makes us distinctive on the global stage, is held right here on our front doorstep.

The fact that it has taken nearly 35 years for this Council to fully recognise, acknowledge, and participate in this historic event is a reminder of how far we have come and how much further we can go. I trust that in the coming years, we will continue to build on this foundation, investing more resources and energy into ensuring that we host this event with the same manaakitanga and care that our tūpuna displayed when welcoming our treaty partners. By doing so, we not only honour the legacy of our tūpuna but also set a benchmark for future generations to uphold.
