6.1 VEHICLE CROSSINGS BYLAW - RECOMMENDATIONS FOR MAKING NEW BYLAW

Agenda item 6.1 document number A3380268, pages 25 - 63 refers.

That Council:

- a) agree to the recommendations in the Staff report on submissions and recommendations for consideration in Attachment 1 that:
 - No changes are made to clauses 12, 15, 16, 18, 21, 22 and 23 in the draft bylaw.
 - ii) Clause 4 is changed by:
 - 1) Adding the words "reconstruction, upgrading and relocation" after the word "construction"
 - 2) Deleting the words "and repair" after the words "and relocation";
 - 3) Inserting the word "vehicular" after the words "vehicle crossings giving";
 - 4) Adding the words "or another design approved by the council" after "engineering standards for vehicle crossings".
 - iii) Clause 5 is changed by:
 - 1) Deleting the definition of berm;
 - Adding to the definition of vehicle crossing, the words ", but does not include paddock entrances with less than ten (10) stock movements per month" after "accessing the property";
 - 3) Deleting subclause (2) and replacing with a new Clause 2:
 - "2. Related information boxes

Boxes headed 'Related information' in this bylaw are for information purposes only, and -

- (a) they do not form part of the bylaw; and
- (b) cannot be considered in the interpretation or application of a provision of this bylaw; and
- (c) may be inserted, amended or removed without formality"
- 4) Adding a "related information box" referring to a new diagram to supplement the written definition of a vehicle crossing:

"The terminology associated with vehicle crossings is illustrated in diagram 1 in the Schedule to this bylaw".

- iv) Clause 6 is changed by:
 - 1) In subclause (1), deleting the word "widen" and replacing with the word "upgrade";
 - 2) In subclause (2), replacing the word "widened" with "upgraded";
 - 3) In subclause (2), adding the words: ", or permission has been granted by the council for a private road or right-of-way under section 348 of the Local Government Act 1974" after "has been granted for this work";
 - 4) Adding a new subclause (3): "An approval is not required to conduct minor repairs or to maintain a vehicle crossing";
 - 5) Adding further information to the "related information" box as follows:
 - "Approvals are required for:
 - · Construction i.e. building a new vehicle crossing
 - Reconstruction i.e. rebuilding a crossing which is broken and/or not fit for purpose
 - Upgrading e.g. widening a crossing, replacing metal with tarseal, replacing a culvert, or making safety improvements to a crossing
 - Relocating i.e. moving a crossing from one place to another.

Approvals are not required for:

- Minor repairs i.e. refurbishing a crossing that is showing signs of wear and tear but is not broken (such as repairing a pothole)
- Maintenance e.g. resealing the surface of the crossing with existing seal material or cleaning a culvert.

Whether or not an approval is required for work on the vehicle crossing, a Work Access Permit is required for all work on the road corridor (see clause 17). This is required under the National Code of Practice for Utility Operators' Access to Transport Corridors".

- v) Clause 7 is changed by:
 - Adding "or other council-approved design" after "appropriate engineering standard";
 - 2) Adding "Council will respond to the applicant in 30 working days or less" after "the proposed vehicle crossing".
- vi) Clause 8 is changed by:
 - 1) Adding the words "in its sole discretion" after "may grant an approval";
 - 2) Adding the words "or other design approved by the council" after "the appropriate engineering standard";

3) Adding a new paragraph (b): "the council is satisfied that the proposed vehicle crossing will not cause undue impacts involving road safety or damage to the environment".

vii) Clause 9 is changed by:

- 1) Adding the words "or other design approved by the council" after "appropriate engineering standard" in paragraph (a);
- 2) Adding the words "or other design approved by the council" after "specified engineering standard" in paragraph (b);
- 3) Replacing the word "mention" with "notice" in paragraph (b).

viii) Clause 10 is changed by:

1) Adding a "related information box" below paragraph (a).

"Chapter 15 of the District Plan ('Transportation') covers areas such as parking and access to private properties including where access is permitted and not permitted. It lists the criteria that will be used to assess road access such as traffic safety and congestion, foreseeable future changes to traffic patterns in the area, and the safety of pedestrians, disabled persons and cyclists, etc.";

- (a) water supply shortage or drought; or

These emergencies may be initiated by the following authorities: The Minister of Health, the Medical Officer of Health, the Regional Council, the Council, and the Civil Defence Emergency Management Group".

2) Adding a new "related information" box:

"In section 4 of the Civil Defence Emergency Management Act 2002 the definition of emergency includes failure or disruption to a lifeline utility. An entity that supplies or distributes water to inhabitants of a city or district is a lifeline utility.

Section 69S of the Health Act 1956 provides the council may restrict or interrupt the supply of water in the event of emergency repairs but must notify the Medical Officer of Health within 24 hours and take all practicable steps to advise affected persons.

Section S69T of the Health Act 1956 provides the council must notify authorities if it identifies or foresees a risk to the adequate supply of drinking water and request these authorities apply their powers to mitigate the water supply risk. The authorities include the Medical Officer of Health, Fire and Emergency New Zealand, and the Northland Regional Council.

S69ZZA of the Health Act 1956 provides for the Minister of Health to declare a drinking water emergency if there is a serious risk of harm to public health arising from drinking water or if there is a lack of drinking water available.

Section 329 of the Resource Management Act 1991 provides the Northland Regional Council the right to issue water shortage directions which may restrict water takes".

- 3) Deleting subclause 5(2) and replacing with a new clause (clause 2):
 - "2. Related information boxes

Boxes headed "Related information" in this bylaw are for information purposes only, and –

- (a) they do not form part of this bylaw; and
- (b) cannot be considered in the interpretation or application of a provision of this bylaw; and
- (c) may be inserted, amended or removed without any formality."
- iv) Clause 7 is changed by:
 - 1) Adding the following "related information" box after subclause (3):

"Approximately 400mm of the service pipe between the meter reader and the customer's pipe is technically on council-owned property. Any work required by the customer on this section of the customer's pipe is acceptable to the council"

"Section 69S(3) of the Health Act 1956 states a maximum timeframe of 8 hours for a planned interruption to supply, after which the supplier must have taken all reasonable steps to notify affected parties".

"The council applies a tolerance of ±3% to determine whether a customer's water meter is reading correctly or incorrectly".

Level Two: No sprinklers

Level Three: No hoses or sprinklers

Level Four: Essential use only - water suppled can only be used for drinking or cooking, to wash clothes and take showers".

To resolve a final proposal for representation arrangements for the Far North District Council to apply for at least the 2022 triennial local government elections.

WHAKARĀPOPOTO MATUA / EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- Council adopted its initial proposal on 12 August 2021
- Consultation occurred between 20 August and 1 October 2021
- Hearings were conducted on 14 October 2021
- Deliberations were conducted on 21 October 2021
- The outcome of the submissions and deliberations have resulted in recommended changes to the initial proposal
- Council must now amend its initial proposal to become its final proposal and publicly notify this for objection / appeal.

TŪTOHUNGA / RECOMMENDATION

That the Far North District Council, pursuant to section 19N of the Local Electoral Act 2001 and having considered and deliberated on submissions received to the initial proposal for the 2021 review of representation arrangements, amends its initial proposal to the following final proposal for at least the 2022 triennial local government elections:

The Far North District Council to comprise the Mayor elected at large and 10 councillors elected under the ward system, specifically six general ward councillors and four Māori ward councillors.

The Far North District Council be divided into four wards, these being:

- (i) Bay of Islands-Whangaroa General Ward (represented by three general ward councillors), comprising the area in the proposed Bay of Islands-Whangaroa General Ward map as shown on Attachment 1.
- (ii) Kaikohe-Hokianga General Ward (represented by one general ward councillor), comprising the area in the proposed Kaikohe-Hokianga General Ward map as shown on Attachment 2.
- (iii) Te Hiku General Ward (represented by two general ward councillors), comprising the area in the proposed Te Hiku General Ward map as shown on Attachment 3.
- (iv) Ngā Tai o Tokerau Māori Ward (represented by four Māori ward councillors), comprising the whole of the district in the proposed Māori Ward map as shown on Attachment 4.

That Te Pēwhairangi-Whangaroa General Ward and Te Pēwhairangi-Whangaroa Community Board be changed to Bay of Islands-Whangaroa General Ward and Bay of Islands-Whangaroa Community Board (retain the existing names).

The Māori ward be named Ngā Tai o Tokerau.

The above general wards are the current ward areas with the exception of the Kaikohe-Hokianga and the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa ward boundaries to be altered as follows:

- (i) Meshblock 0037202 be added to the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa General Ward from the Kaikohe-Hokianga General Ward.
- (ii) Meshblock 0036401 be added to the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa General Ward from the Kaikohe-Hokianga General Ward.
- (iii) Meshblocks 0034600, 0034800 be added to the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa General Ward from the Kaikohe-Hokianga General Ward.

The three general wards, the number of general councillors per ward, the ward populations (estimated at 30 June 2020) and the population ratio per general councillor are as follows:

The representation of the Te Hiku General Ward falls outside of the stipulated range.

In accordance with section 19V(2) of the Local Electoral Act 2001, the population that each community board member represents must be within the population range of 3,693 plus or minus 10% (3,323 – 4,062) unless particular community of interest considerations justify otherwise. The representation of the North Cape Subdivision falls outside of the stipulated range.

The reasons for the boundary alterations to the wards and community board subdivisions are:

- (i) the adjustments ensure that communities of interest that were divided are now unified
- (ii) the affected meshblocks are contiguous, have no physical divisions and are similar to the surrounding land.

1) TĀHUHU KŌRERO / BACKGROUND

The Local Electoral Act 2001 (LEA) requires local authorities to undertake a review of its representation arrangements at least once every six years to ensure the arrangements provide fair and effective representation for communities.

Council last reviewed its representation arrangements in 2015, thus necessitating a review in 2021 ahead of the 2022 triennial local government elections.

The LEA prescribes the process and timeline that councils are required to follow when undertaking a representation review. The process undertaken to date is as follows:

Council must now resolve its' final proposal for representation arrangements for the Far North District Council to apply for at least the 2022 triennial local government elections.

The final proposal must be publicly notified within six weeks of the closing date of submissions (i.e. by 12 November 2021). This public notice will summarise the submissions received, decisions made in relation to those submissions and reasons for any changes made to the initial proposal.

The LEA provides for a one-month objection / appeal period which will run from 12 November to 13 December 2021. As the final proposal does differ from the initial proposal, any person may object to the final proposal.

If an objection on the final proposal is received or if the fair representation criteria (+/- 10% rule) is exceeded (for wards and subdivisions of community boards), then all information regarding the followed process must be sent to the Local Government Commission (LGC) for determination. The LGC must make its determination by 10 April 2022.

All elements of Council's representation review are subject to appeal and/or objection to the Local Government Commission, except for the choice of electoral system and the principle of Māori wards (undertaken earlier under separate processes). It is therefore important that the process considers all options, is robust and results in a decision that can be supported by reasons that provide a defensible outcome.

2) MATAPAKI ME NGĀ KŌWHIRINGA / DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

Statutory provisions and guidelines

The LEA prescribes the process and timeline that councils are required to follow when undertaking a representation review. Part 1A of the LEA sets out the requirements for a review of the representation arrangements by a territorial authority. When establishing Māori ward(s), the provisions of Schedule 1A substitute the Part 1A provisions, as required.

In addition to the specific requirements of Part 1A and Schedule 1A LEA, territorial authorities must also consider other relevant provisions of the LEA, including the purpose of the Act (to allow diversity, through local decision-making) and the following principles specified in section 1 LEA:

- Representative and substantive electoral participation in local elections and polls;
- Fair and effective representation for individuals and communities;
- Reasonable and equal opportunities to vote and nominate, or be nominated as candidates;
- Public confidence in, and public understanding of, local electoral processes.

The LGC has issued guidelines for local authorities to consider when undertaking representation of reviews. These guidelines identify the key principles to be considered when conducting a review. These key principles are:

- Identifying communities of interest;
- Effective representation of electors (the optimal number of councillors);
- Fair representation of electors (compliance with the +/- 10% rule).

Refer to Attachment 20 for the full explanation of the considerations and principles which have been outlined in previous reports.

With regards to the Far North District Council, in most cases the need to address known issues (or feedback from our communities, community boards and council on communities of interest) has required balancing the numbers resulting in some minor non-compliance with the +/- 10% rule. Council believes they can justify being marginally outside of the +/- rule in these cases so as not to split communities of interest (section 19V(3)((ii) of the Local Electoral Act 2001).

Options considered by Council

Since January 2021, multiple briefings on the representation review have been held with elected members, including community board chairs who were invited to every Council workshop.

On 28 April, based on feedback received from the combined community board and councillor workshops held in January, along with feedback received from our communities during informal consultation during the month of March, Council requested modelling the following options:

- Status quo with adjustments to boundaries to address communities of interest; and
- Increasing the total number of councillors to 12 with a four-ward structure:
 - Split Bay of Islands-Whangaroa general ward into two new general wards
 - o Three councillors per general ward
 - o Four community boards aligned with the four general ward structure
 - Seven members in each of the four community boards
 - o Changing the name of Bay of Islands-Whangaroa

On 4 May Council resolved to adopt Māori wards for the 2022 and 2025 triennial local body elections.

Council's electoral officer, Dale Ofsoske and council staff developed and worked through six possible representation scenarios which were presented to members on 11 May. Included in these scenarios was the impact of one or more Māori wards and the effect on councillor numbers for the general wards and the Māori ward/s.

Four scenarios were discarded as they did not align with the legislative requirements for fair representation. The difference between the two remaining scenarios was whether to retain nine councillors (six general ward and three Māori ward councillors) or increase the number of councillors by one to 10 (six general ward and four Māori ward councillors).

On 23 June at a Council workshop, Council was presented with a two ward Māori ward structure (north and south) as an alternative to the one ward structure. Council indicated a preference towards increasing the number of Councillors to 10, retaining the current three general ward structure, establish one Māori ward and retain the existing community board subdivisions with some minor adjustments to ensure communities of interest were maintained.

On 6 July, the Mayor and Deputy Mayor attended a hui with Te Kahu o Taonui to discuss options for Māori ward representation. This was followed up with further communications, where possible. The indication from the iwi and hapū partners the Council was able to talk to was that one Māori ward for the 2022 elections would be the preferred model, with the opportunity to review ahead of the 2025 triennial local body elections, should it be required.

On 12 August 2021, Council adopted its initial proposal for consultation (refer to minutes in Attachment 21).

Public notice of the initial proposal was published on 20 August 2021.

Formal consultation

Formal consultation on the initial proposal was undertaken from 20 August 2021 to 1 October 2021.

The nation was faced with a full Alert Level 4 COVID lockdown shortly after consultation opened which impacted on our ability to reach customers via our usual channels of libraries and service centres. To counteract this, staff set up a dedicated email to receive and respond to queries that would normally occur with our counter-facing staff, and the representation review brochure was broken down into an online friendly version. Despite moving to Level 3 and then later into Level 2 lockdowns, the Delta restrictions meant that public facing interactions were not safe for staff nor members of the public. All materials were available in our service centres and libraries once we were allowed to receive members of the public (under Delta restrictions).

The initial proposal was open for feedback on the Council website's Have Your Say page, and in print form at all FNDC libraries and service centres. A letter and brochure (English and Te Reo versions) were sent from the Mayor to our iwi partners, the chief executives of our local rūnanga and Te Kahu o Taonui.

A dedicated communications and advertising campaign was undertaken during this period to draw attention to the consultation.

Submissions

Formal submissions were able to be made electronically, via email or post or delivered to Council offices and libraries.

129 submissions on the initial proposal were received:

- 125 submissions were received within the consultation period
- 4 submissions were received after close of submissions
- 32 submitters did not use the submission form and submitted an email / handwritten submission
- 14 submissions were made by organisations

19 submitters indicated that they wished to speak to their submissions and 11 were heard on 14 October 2021.

Council deliberated on submissions on 21 October 2021. A copy of the unconfirmed minutes of the Council Deliberations meeting on 21 October 2021 is attached as Attachment 22.

Considerations for final proposal

Three key issues identified in the public submission process were:

Boundary changes – community board subdivisions

Submissions were received opposing two subdivision boundary changes on the basis that the changes would divide established communities of interest.

- One proposed change received strong opposition by 30 submitters in relation to the communities of Waiomio and Maromākū.
- The other proposed change made by one submitter in relation to the community of Awanui, was deliberated upon and has been determined as not splitting a community of interest.

The recommendation is to amend the initial proposal as follows:

- 1. That the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa Community Board subdivision boundaries be amended as follows:
 - a. Meshblocks 0046100, 0046400, 0046700, 0046801, 0047801 to be added to the Kawakawa-Moerewa Subdivision from the Russell-Ōpua Subdivision.

This recognises Maromākū and Waiomio as communities of interest within the Kawakawa-Moerewa subdivision rather than the Russell-Ōpua subdivision. It will be non-compliant with the +/- 10% rule but can be justified by not splitting communities of interest.

Boundary of the new Waipapa subdivision

The initial proposal had good support for a new Waipapa subdivision but the matter of whether the Purerua Peninsula was associated with the new Waipapa or existing Kerikeri subdivision as a community of interest was raised. Upon assessment it has been determined that Purerua Peninsula (including Purerua Road and Taronui Bay) have a closer association with Kerikeri as a community of interest.

The recommendation is to amend the initial proposal as follows:

- 2. That the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa Community Board subdivision boundaries be amended as follows:
 - 1. Meshblocks 0044008 and 4010073 to be added to the Kerikeri Subdivision from the Waipapa Subdivision.

This recognises the Purerua Peninsula (Purerua Rd and Taronui Bay) as communities of interest within the Kerikeri subdivision rather than the Waipapa subdivision. It will be slightly non-compliant with the +/- 10% rule but can be justified by not splitting communities of interest.

Name of the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa ward

The initial proposal changed the name of the Bay of Islands-Whangaroa ward and Community Board to Te Pēwhairangi-Whangaroa General Ward and Te Pēwhairangi-Whangaroa Community Board to reflect its Māori name. There was strong opposition to changing the name.

The recommendation is to amend the initial proposal as follows:

3. That Te Pēwhairangi-Whangaroa General Ward and Te Pēwhairangi-Whangaroa Community Board be changed to Bay of Islands-Whangaroa General Ward and Bay of Islands-Whangaroa Community Board (retain the existing names).

Section 19V(3)(a)(ii) LEA permits a council to have non-compliance of the +/- 10% rule if compliance would divide a community of interest if Council can demonstrate that complying with the +/- 10% rule effectively splits a community of interest. If this can be demonstrated, then Council can adjust ward or subdivision boundaries in the deliberations and final proposal to ensure communities of interest are not divided but united.

In such a case, the final proposal must be treated as an appeal under section 19V(5) of the LEA and referred to the LGC following the appeal/objection period, for determination.

Once the final proposal is adopted, there will be a one month objection/appeal period, ending on 13 December 2021.

Take Tūtohunga / Reason for the recommendation

Resolve the final proposal for the 2021 Far North District Council Representation Review.

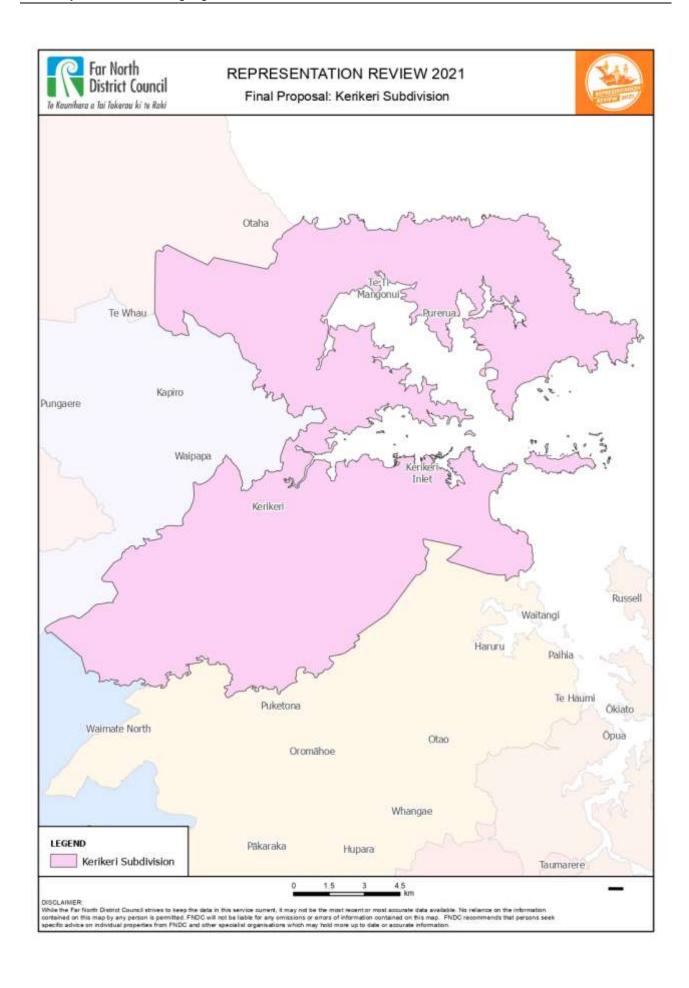




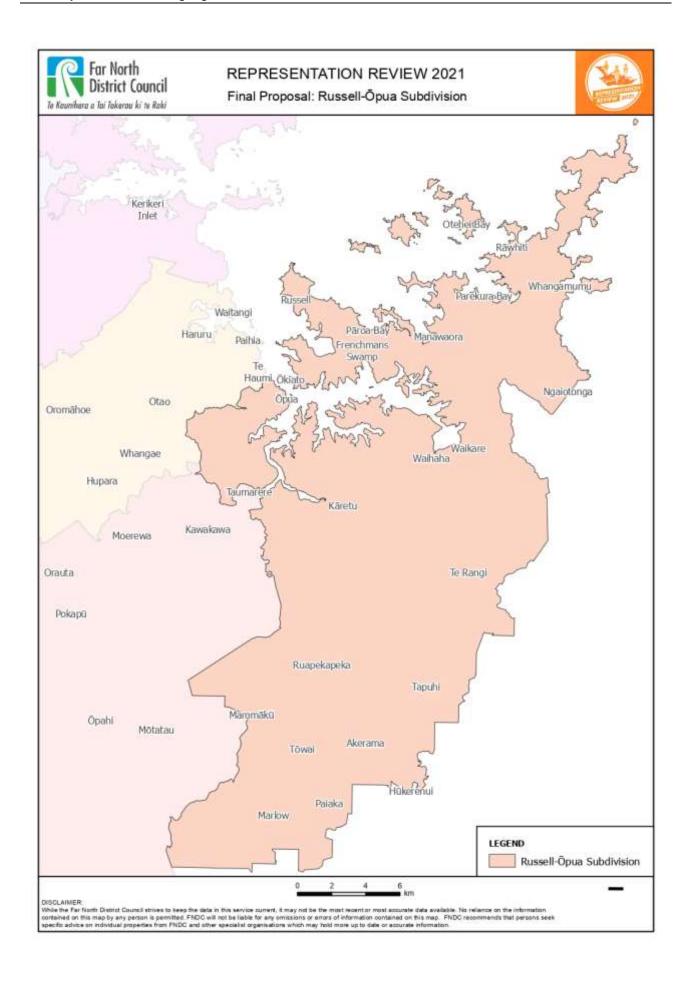


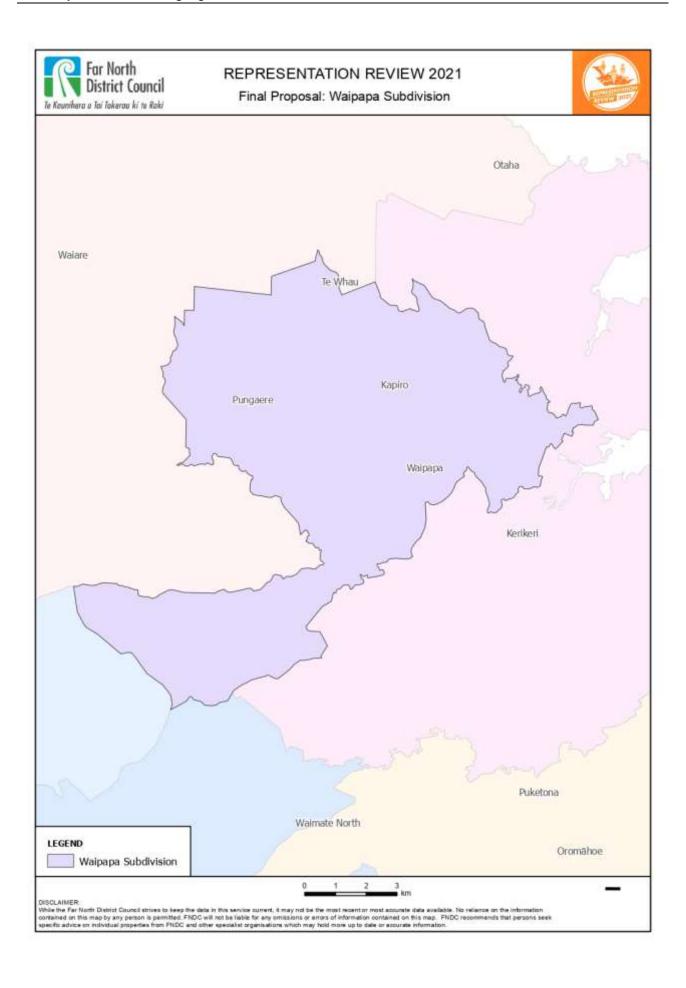


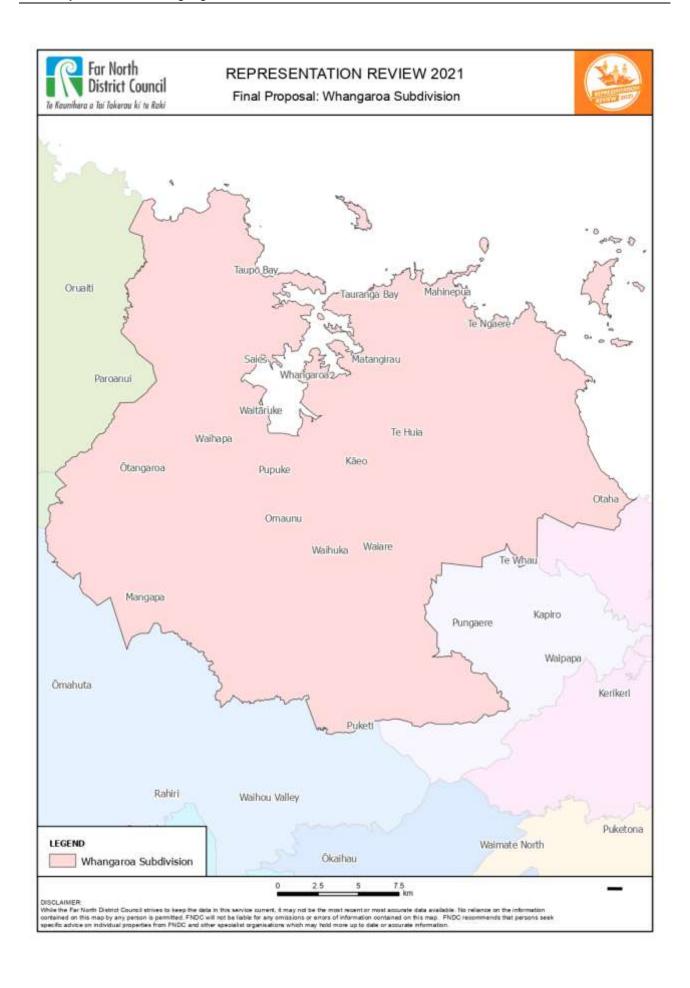


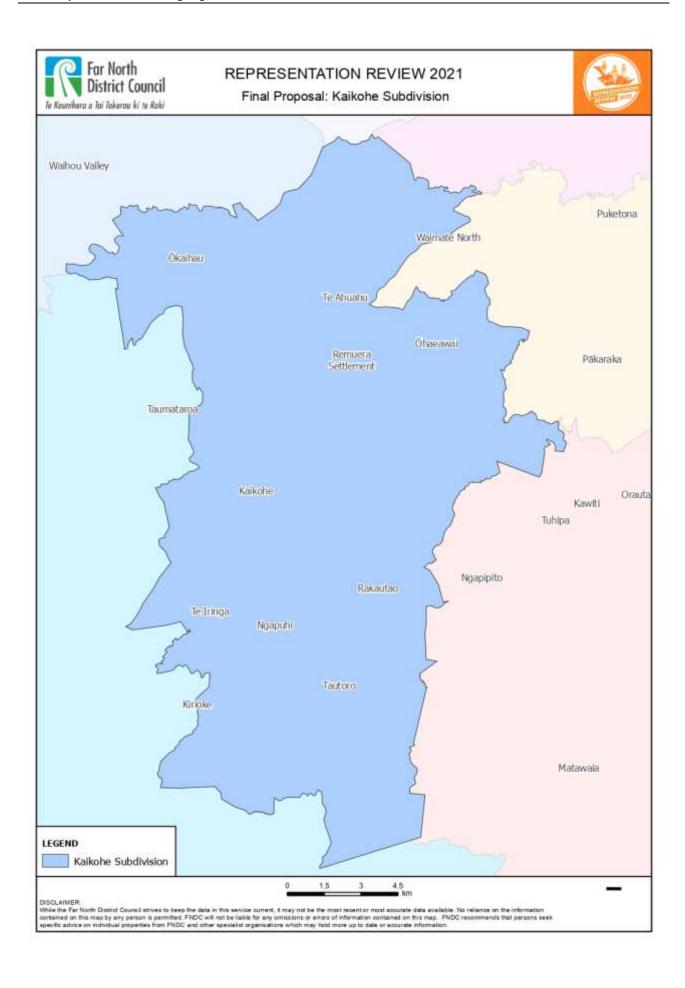


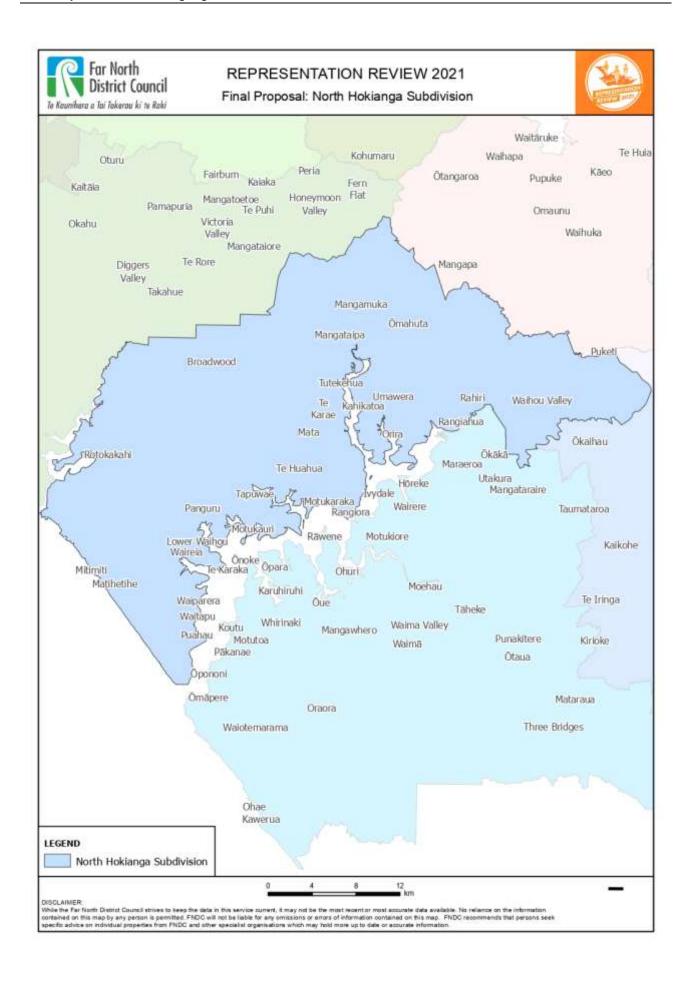


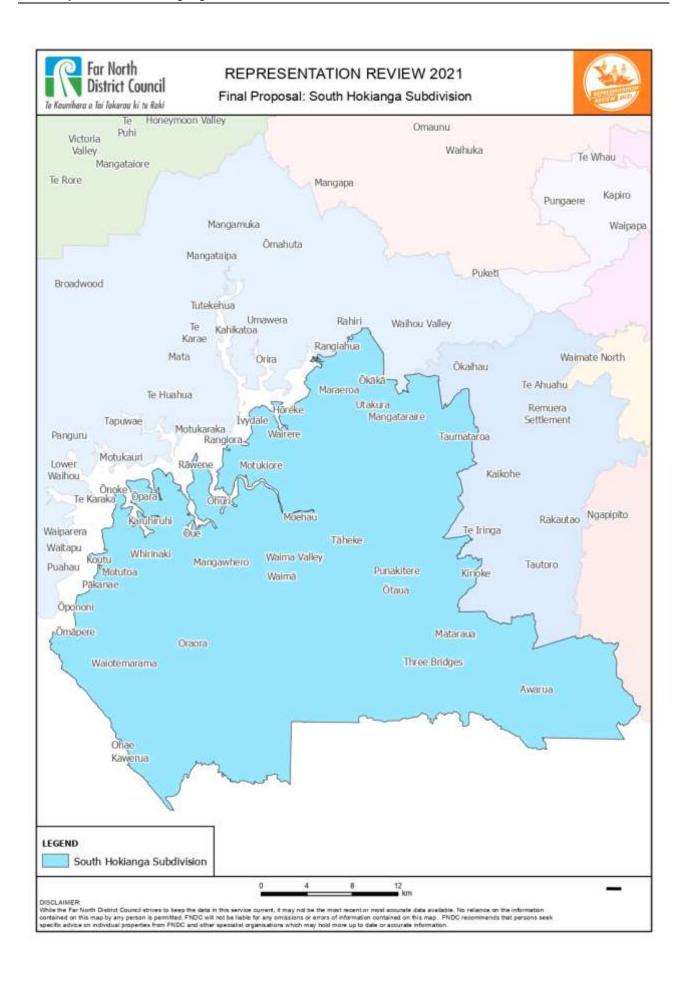


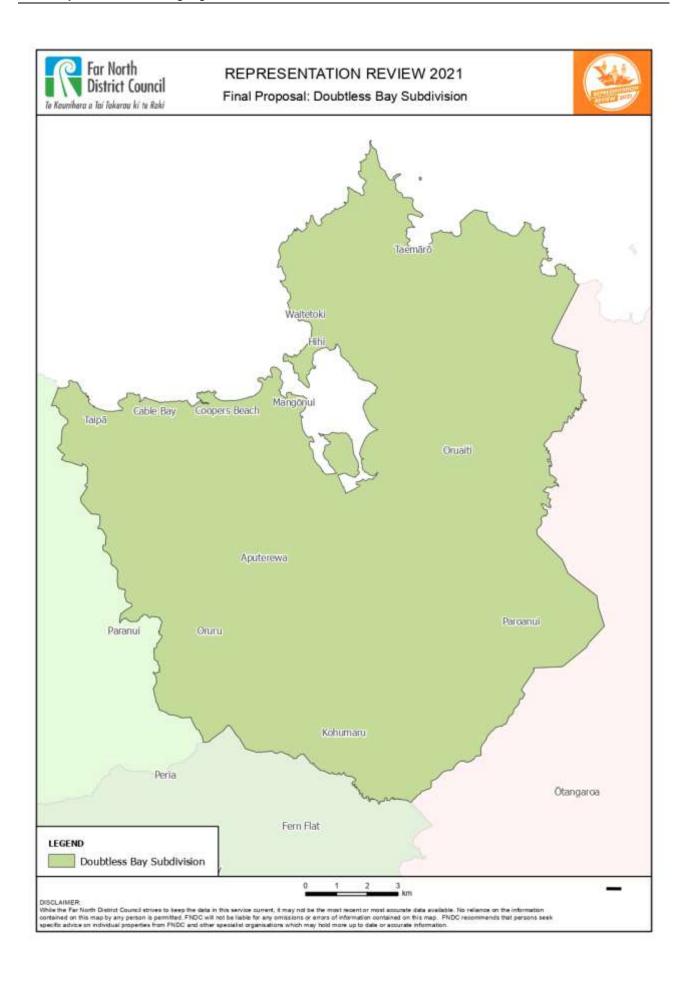


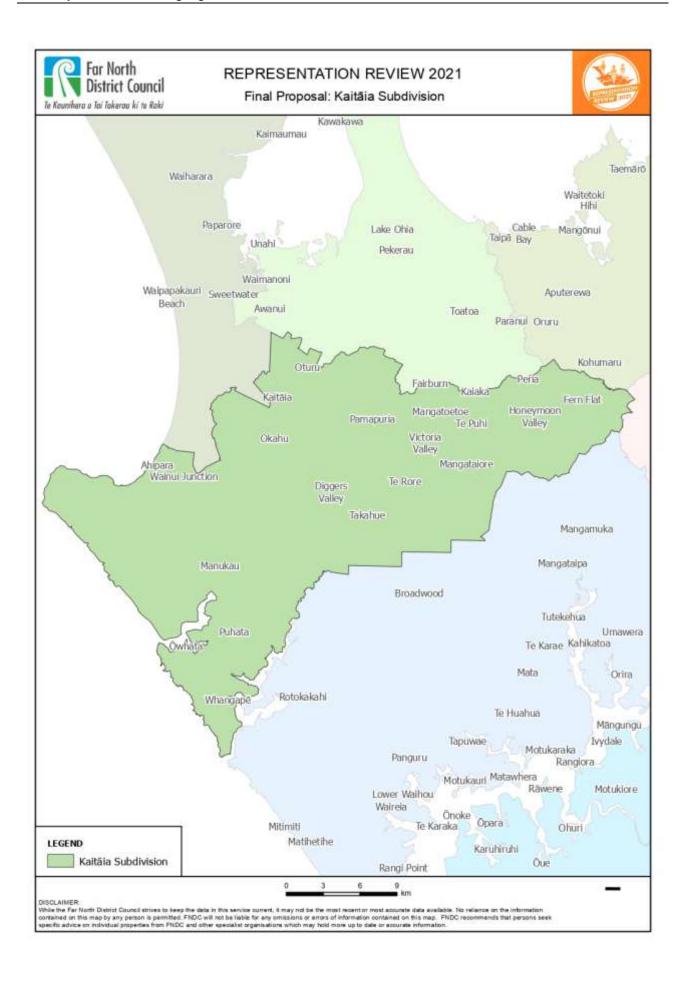


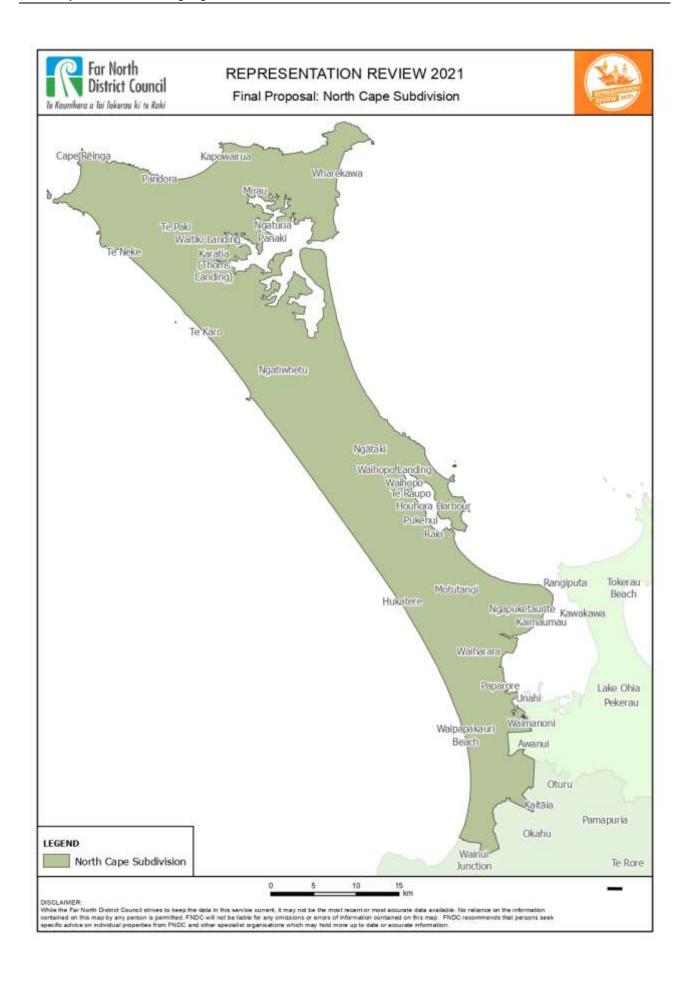


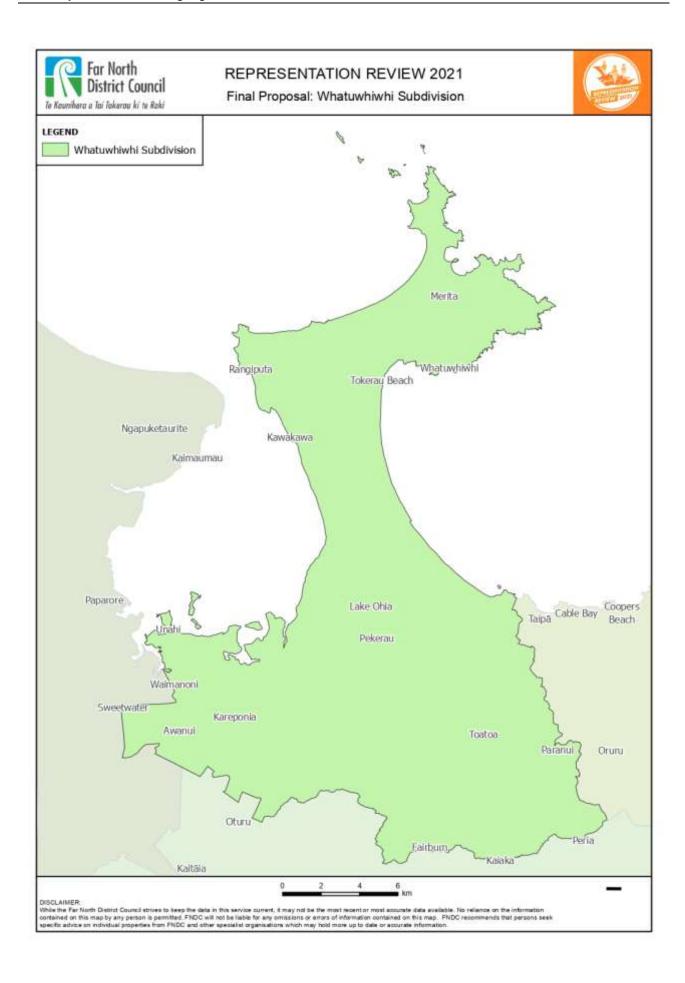


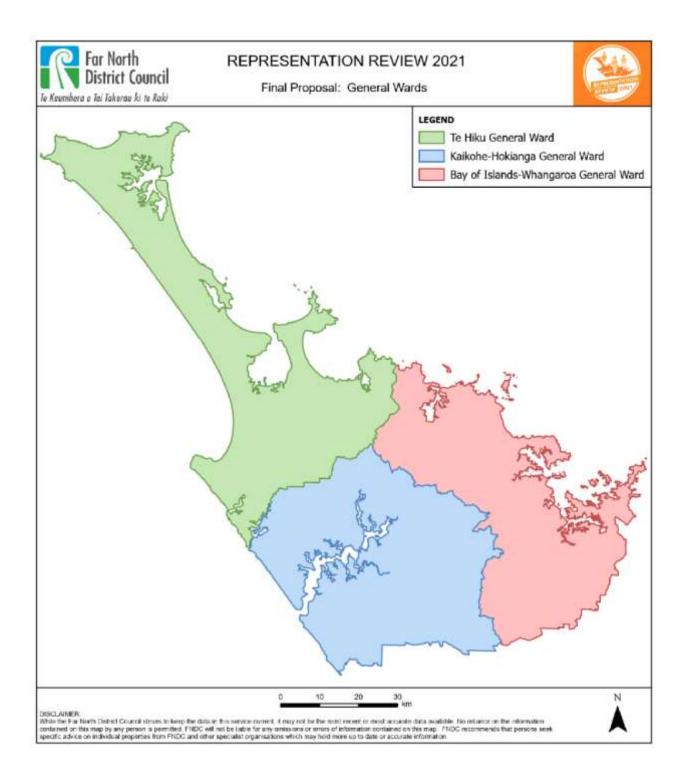


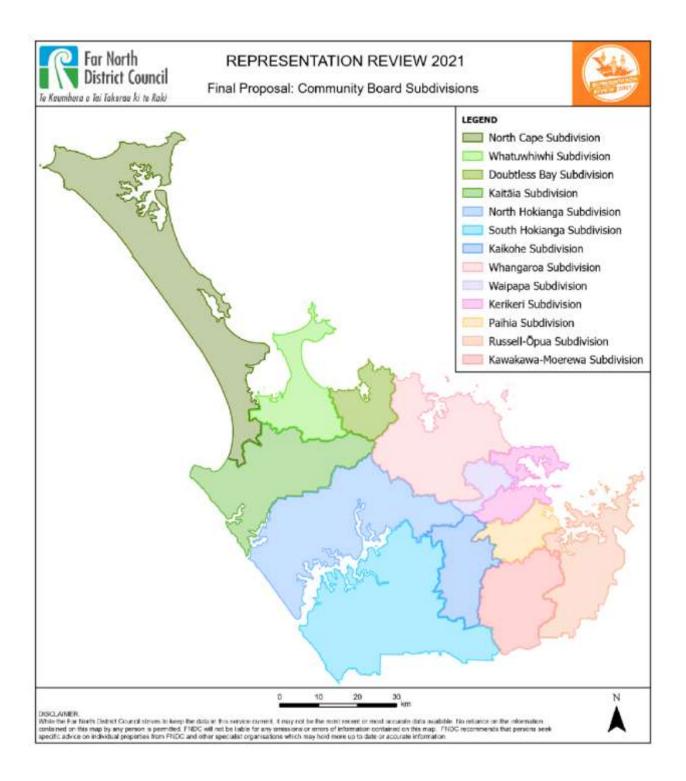












Local Electoral Act - Statutory provisions and guidelines

The Local Electoral Act (LEA) prescribes the process and timeline that councils are required to follow when undertaking a representation review. When establishing Māori ward(s), the provisions of Schedule 1A substitute the Part 1A provisions, as required.

In addition to the specific requirements of Part 1A and Schedule 1A LEA, territorial authorities must also consider other relevant provisions of the LEA, including the purpose of the Act (to allow diversity, through local decision-making) and the following principles specified in section 1 LEA:

- Representative and substantive electoral participation in local elections and polls;
- Fair and effective representation for individuals and communities;
- Reasonable and equal opportunities to vote and nominate, or be nominated as candidates:
- Public confidence in, and public understanding of, local electoral processes.

Considerations and principles

The LGC has issued guidelines for local authorities to consider when undertaking representation of reviews. These guidelines identify the key principles to be considered when conducting a review. These key principles are:

- Identifying communities of interest;
- Effective representation of electors (the optimal number of councillors);
- Fair representation of electors (compliance with the +/- 10% rule).

Identifying Communities of Interest

The district's land use is predominantly rural with supporting service towns. The largest residential concentrations are Kaitāia, Kaikohe and Kerikeri.

During the review process, Council has considered the following factors when identifying the districts communities of interest:

- Current and historic boundaries and whether these are still relevant to the district;
- Changes to communities over time;
- Housing and development patterns and urban growth;
- Physical, geographical and topographical features and the issues faced by the communities in relation to these features (urban vs coastal issues);
- Similarities in the demographic and socio-economic characteristics of the residents of a community;
- Provision of goods and services and support to communities.

Effective representation of electors

When considering effective representation, Council must determine:

- The number of councillors to be elected to the Council;
- The basis of election of councillors whether councillors are elected by wards or by the district as a whole (at-large) or by a mixture of wards and at large voting;

- If elected by wards, the number, boundaries and names of these wards and the number of councillors that will represent each ward;
- Whether to have community boards, and if so, how many, their boundaries and membership.

Currently the district is represented by 9 councillors elected from three wards, plus the mayor elected at-large along with 19 community board members elected to subdivisions within the three wards. Traditionally, wards have been based on geographic boundaries and common community interests.

During the review process, Council has considered the following factors when determining effective representation:

- The physical size of the district and the current wards and subdivisions;
- The number of communities of interest;
- The need to meet operational workload requirements of both the Council and individual councillors in attending Council and committee meetings;
- Access by the community to its elected representatives and the ability of councillors to access and engage with the community through public and face-toface meetings.

Fair representation of electors

Fair representation is defined as a democratic model with the following characteristics:

- There is a reasonable ratio of councillors and community board members per head of the population;
- There is an assurance that councillors and community board members are in reasonable geographic proximity to the community for easy contact;
- There is sufficient opportunity for representation and involvement of communities.

Once communities of interest and effective representation have been established, Council must apply the principles of fair representation and ensure the +/- 10% rule is met, if practicable. The +/- 10% rule requires that the population of each ward (if applicable) divided by the number of councillors to be elected by that ward must not exceed +/- 10% of the population of the district divided by the total number of councillors. The same rule applies for community boards at the subdivision level.

TAKE PÜRONGO / PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this paper is to provide Council with an update on the 2021-24 NLTP subsidy funding for our Land Transport activities and inform Council's decisions regarding use of remaining unsubsidised local share.

WHAKARĀPOPOTO MATUA / EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On 7th September 2021 Waka Kotahi announced their approved subsidy funding for:

- Local road maintenance
- Road to Zero: Road safety promotion
- Low Cost–Low Risk (LCLR) activities which include Road to Zero, Walking and Cycling improvements and Local Road improvement activity classes

Waka Kotahi also provided an indicative indication of whether major project investment activities would be funded, subject to further justified technical investment applications, these are classified as "probable". Other projects which may possibly be funded if more money becomes available from Waka Kotahi, these are classified as "possible".

With subsidy funding now confirmed, full option and impact analysis has been undertaken by the Northland Transportation Alliance, included as an attachment to this paper.

TŪTOHUNGA / RECOMMENDATION

1 Purpose

The purpose of this paper is to provide Council with an update on the 2021-24 NLTP subsidy funding for our Land Transport activities and inform Council's decisions regarding use of remaining unsubsidised local share.

2 Background

The NTA prepared a funding budget for the Council to maintain, operate, renew, and invest in transportation infrastructure which was submitted into the Council's Long-Term Plan (LTP). The same funding request was submitted to Waka Kotahi for subsidy.

The subsidy application was made under Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency's Funding Assistance Rates (FAR) policy through the National Land Transport Fund (NLTF) for the 2021-24 period to co-invest in local roading transport activities.

The funding application was justified through the Northland Regional Activity Management Plan 2021-2051: Transportation (AMP).

The AMP supported a funding request not only to maintain existing levels of service, but in key areas such as unsealed roads, bridges, structures, and cycleway maintenance additional funding requirements were identified and applied for to implement targeted improvement programmes.

On the 31st May 2021, Waka Kotahi issued an indicative allocation for Council that was \$17m lower than the bid made late in 2020. In early June 2021, Audit New Zealand made it clear that, at the instruction of the Office of the Auditor General, Council would receive a qualified audit opinion for the 2021-31 Long Term Plan if the budgetary provisions were not reduced to the level of the Waka Kotahi indicative allocation. To achieve a "clean" opinion, \$17m was removed from the renewal budgets over 3 years as the indicative allocation did not include any analysis of the work groups that would be affected. The amendment was made on the basis that Council could decide to re-instate renewal budgets during 2021-22 and amend the figures in the up-coming Annual Plans if required. This protected the local share that formed part of the rate calculation and ensured that, providing the final allocation was not more than the indicative allocation, maintenance budgets would not be compromised. This report is now seeking a partial re-instatement of renewal funding as the final allocation for renewals is higher than provided for in the LTP

The funding application is classified into various activity classes as defined in the Government Policy Statement on Land Transport (GPS). The activity classes are high-level groupings of outputs, e.g., Road to Zero, Local road maintenance, etc.

On 7th September 2021 Waka Kotahi announced their approved subsidy funding for:

- Local road maintenance
- Road to Zero: Road safety promotion

 Low Cost–Low Risk (LCLR) activities which include Road to Zero, Walking and Cycling improvements and Local Road improvement activity classes

Waka Kotahi also provided an indicative indication of whether major project investment activities would be funded, subject to further justified technical investment applications, these are classified as "probable". Other projects which may possibly be funded if more money becomes available from Waka Kotahi, these are classified as "possible".

3 Discussion – Local Roads Maintenance: MO&R and Low Cost-Low Risk Activities

3.1 Requested Funding budget for 2021-24 NLTP vs Approved Subsidy

The funding budget prepared for the 2021-24 NLTP versus the Waka Kotahi approved subsidy of 7° September is shown below in Table 1.

- Local Roads Maintenance
- Road Safety Promotion
- Low Cost Low Risk

The Investment Activities (or Major Capital projects) prepared for the 2021-24 NLTP with the Waka Kotahi funding priority announcement on 7th September a discussed within Section 4.

3.2 Implications of funding approvals

Overall, the funding approvals from Waka Kotahi for the 2021-24 NLTP are significantly greater than the 2018-21 NLTP, although less than the requested budget.

Local Roads Maintenance Funding

The work activities under the Local Roads Maintenance which did not receive full subsidy funding is across maintenance, operations, and renewals. The implications on the activities which did not achieve the funding requested are:

- Unsealed Pavements
 - Removal of subsidised dust suppression.
 - An 86% increase in funds from 2018-21 NLTP was requested for Heavy Metaling but only a 58% increase in funds was approved. This will result in our planned Centre of Excellence Paige Green program being rolled out at half capacity for year 1, but full capacity in years 2 and 3, and
 - The return cycle for pavement rehabilitations of Band 2 (Forestry Roads) extended to a 20yr return programme (originally 15yrs).
- Sealed roads A 50% increase in funds from 2018-21 NLTP was requested but only a 40% increase in funds was approved. This will stretch the Thin Asphaltic Concrete (TAC) resealing programme from three years to four years.
- Bridge and Structures renewals (This work category was moved from LCLR in the 2018-21 period to the Local Road Maintenance activity class in the 2021-24 period). A significant increase (43% for bridges alone) in funding was being sought, but only a 7% increase in funds was approved. This reduced budget from planned AMP remains similar to the previous NLTP and is equivalent to extending the three-year programme out to four years and halving the retaining wall maintenance and renewals programme.
- Drainage renewals a reduction from both the planned AMP programme and the previous NLTP budgets in planned renewal operation (approx. 10%).
- Environmental Services a reduction of AMP planned vegetation spray (approx. 10%) but remains greater than the previous NLTP.
- Network Services maintenance a reduction of the AMP planned paint remarking (approx. 10%) but remains greater than the previous NLTP
- Halved the previous NLTP Travel Demand management budget under the Network and Asset Management.

Road Safety Promotion Funding

The requested funds under the Road Safety Promotion activity class, which is a 66% increase from the 2018-21 funding, was requested but only 57% increase in funds was approved.

The increase is for:

 An increased programme in Kerikeri under REAP for existing Alcohol & Drug, Young Driver and Speed programmes as well as restraints. It also includes for allowance for an in-house NTA coordinator.

The declined portion was due to the inclusion of the Heavy Transport (HT) training within the original submission, which is not eligible for RSP subsidy.

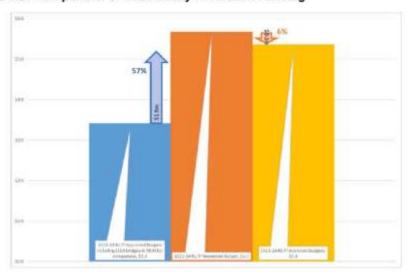


Figure 3.2 - Comparison of Road Safety Promotion Funding

Low Cost - Low Risk Investment Funding

Within the Low Cost - Low Risk Road investments activity class, each listed project was rated Very High, High, Medium or Low against the Government Policy Statement (GPS) alignment. Waka Kotahi set the National Funding priority levels and therefore several low and medium rated LCLR projects which were below the funded priority levels did not receive subsidy.

A full listing of the submitted LC-LR projects and their approval status is included in Appendix A, but in brief, the following projects did not achieve the subsidy funding:

- · Various New footpaths / Shared Use paths and recreation tracks
- · Various Pedestrian access upgrades in urban areas and Safety improvements
- Twin Coast Discovery Walking tracks
- Various cycleways: improvements and linkages, including destination facilities
- · Bus stops and shelters, Ride shares and Parking facilities
- Lighting Improvements
- New Road traction seals
- · 3-Year planning for next NLTP for HRRI and resilience programmes

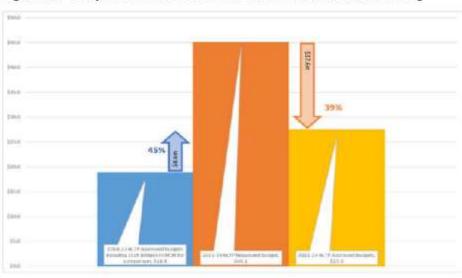


Figure 3.3 - Comparison of Low Cost - Low Risk Road Investment Funding

3.3 Local share of funding for Local Road Maintenance & LCLR Investment Activities

Based upon the Waka Kotahi NZTA subsidy funding approvals, the current adjusted-LTP (previously adjusted under the recommendation of audit to match the indicative funding) and the Requested Funding Budget, there are three options to present which consider the local share portion of the LTP which will not receive subsidy funding. Each option includes a potential action regarding the calculated unsubsidised local share¹, and the implication to the roading network. The Options are:

- Option 1 the <u>reallocation</u> of all roading surplus adjusted-LTP local share funds (\$4,28M)² to other Council Projects, which will result in limited improvements to the network and the possibility of a continued network decline at a similar rate to the previous NLTP period. It does not allow for any unsubsidised investment activities and does not uptake the full Waka Kotahi subsidy available.
- Option 2 the <u>redistribution</u> of all roading surplus adjusted-LTP local share funds (\$4,28M)³, to unsubsidised activities within the Local Road Maintenance and enable further uptake of available renewals subsidy, which will reduce the network decline and address some of the targeted improvement programmes defined in the AMP. It does not allow for any unsubsidised investment activities and does not uptake the full Waka Kotahi subsidy available.

- Option 3 the <u>reinstatement</u> of \$3.28M⁴ of local share of the original-LTP renewals roading funding request and <u>redistribution</u> of the available \$4.28M surplus local share to achieve the following:
 - Reinstating \$3.28M of renewals local share will enable the full uptake of the renewals portion of the Local Road Maintenance Subsidy from Waka Kotahi.
 - The redistribution of the surplus LTP local share (\$4,28M) as unsubsidised funds will reduce the network decline the most from the three options and addresses the majority of the targeted improvement programmes defined in the AMP.
 - This option further enables the construction of all the New footpaths programme under the LCLR activities and some further Pedestrian safety improvements.as unsubsidised activities

Each option is presented below:

Option 1

Option 1 is the reallocation of all roading surplus to other Council Projects.

Table 2 below demonstrates the figures related to this option for Local Road Maintenance, Road Safety Promotion and Low Cost-Low Risk Investment activities only. The table shows the breakdown of the three funding amounts: requested; adjusted-LTP and approved subsidy and the surplus unsubsidised locals share, calculated from the adjusted-LTP less the approved subsidy. This unsubsidised local share equates to \$4,28M. The final column of the table presents the outcome for Option 1 for the <u>reallocation</u> the \$4.28M roading surplus unsubsidised LTP funds to other projects within Council.

This option would have the most impact on the proposed AMP Levels of Service (LOS) for Local Road Maintenance: MO&R activities with only 81% of the MO&R activities being able to be achieved (\$85.4M out of a planned \$105,7M). Compared to the previous NLTP (and allowing for escalation) this option is approx. a 4% increase on work activities and as such will continue a steady decline in the levels of service for the network. This option does not enable the implementation of the targeted improvement plan as defined in the evidence-based AMP.

This option does not permit the full uptake of the allowable subsidy funding, i.e., the current allocation of the adjusted-LTP funds does not provide an opportunity to uptake all the Waka Kotahi funding subsidy for the Local Road Maintenance: Renewals.

Council originally applied for \$54.9M of Renewals funding, NZTA approved \$48.3M of funding however Council only allowed \$37.7M of funding for Renewals in the approved LTP. At present Council would be unable to uplift \$10.6M of available renewals funding, with Council requiring a further \$3.28M of Local share to be reinstated to the approved LTP to uplift this NZTA funding.

A further consideration of this option is that there are no unsubsidised funds available for community projects, like new footpaths which were declined under the LC-LR approvals.

Option 2

Option 2 is the redistribution of all roading surplus adjusted-LTP local share funds to unsubsidised activities within Local Road Maintenance activities.

Table 3 below demonstrates the figures related to this option for Local Road Maintenance, Road Safety Promotion and Low Cost-Low Risk Investment activities only. The table shows the breakdown of the three funding amounts: requested; adjusted-LTP and approved subsidy as well as the surplus unsubsidised locals share, calculated from the adjusted-LTP less the approved subsidy and the redistribution of those surplus amounts. This unsubsidised local share equates to \$4,28M. The final column of the table presents the outcome for Option 2 for the redistribution the \$4,28M roading surplus unsubsidised LTP funds to unsubsidised activities within Local Road Maintenance activities.

While both Option 2 and option 3 both similarly provide for the least impact on the proposed AMP Levels of Service (LOS) for Local Road Maintenance: MO&R activities with 92% of the MO&R activities being able to be achieved (\$96.9M out of a planned \$105,7M), this option does not provide for any unsubsidised funds to be available for community projects, like new footpaths which were declined for subsidy by Waka Kotahi under the LC-LR approvals

Compared to the previous NLTP (and allowing for escalation) this option is approx. a 15% increase on work activities versus a planned 25% increase on work activities (as per the AMP) and as such will reduce any decline in the levels of service for the network.

While this option does not enable the full implementation of the targeted improvement plan as defined in the evidence-based AMP it is a major increase from Option 1.

The redistribution of the surplus is as follows:

- With the rates-funded Local Road Maintenance Activities of Maintenance and Operations and Road Safety Promotions:
 - redistribute the Road Safety Maintenance local share of \$98k along with the maintenance local share of \$363k as unsubsidised funding to fund the maintenance operation to closer to the desired AMP LOS. (98%)
 - redistribute the Operations local share of \$579k as unsubsidised funding to fund the maintenance operation to closer to the desired AMP LOS (94%)
- With the debt funded Local Road Maintenance Activity of Renewals and Low Cost-Low Risk Activities:
 - redistribute the Low Cost-Low Risk surplus local share of \$3,24M as subsidised funding to uptake the Waka Kotahi funds under the Renewal activities.
 - This will enable an increased Drainage renewal programme, Bridge and structure renewal programme, unsealed road metaling programme and an increased sealed road resurfacing programme to be undertaken.
 - This option would enable a greater uptake of the potential subsidy funding for the renewal activities, \$48.1M of the available \$48,2M (noting this achieves 88% of the \$54.9M renewal works planned within the AMP.

Option 3

Option 3 is the reinstatement of a portion (\$3,28M) of the adjusted-LTP to enable full uptake of the available subsidy under *renewals* and to then redistribute the surplus local share as unsubsidised activities.

Table 4 below demonstrates the figures related to this option for Local Road Maintenance, Road Safety Promotion and Low Cost-Low Risk Investment activities only. The table shows:

- Columns 1-3: he breakdown of the three funding amounts of requested; adjusted-LTP and approved subsidy.
- Columns 4 & 5: the requested reinstatement to the LTP and the outcome of the LTP with the reinstatement included
- Columns 6 & 7: the surplus unsubsidised locals share, calculated from the reinstated-LTP less the approved subsidy and the redistribution of those surplus amounts. (This unsubsidised local share equates to \$4,28M).
 - The last column of the table presents the final outcome for Option 3 following reinstatement of renewals local share and the redistribution of the existing roading surplus as unsubsidised activities.

Similarly to option 2, his option would have the least impact on the proposed AMP Levels of Service (LOS) for Local Road Maintenance: MO&R activities with 92% of the MO&R activities being able to be achieved (\$97.0M out of a planned \$105,7M), however in addition this option does provide for the surplus LC-LR local share to be allocated as unsubsidised funding to be available for community projects, such as the new footpaths programme and some safety-pedestrian improvements, which were declined for subsidy by Waka Kotahi under the LC-LR approvals.

Compared to the previous NLTP (and allowing for escalation) this option is approx. a 15% increase on work activities versus a planned 25% increase on work activities (as per the AMP) and as such will reduce any decline in the levels of service for the network.

Similarly, to option 2, while this option does not enable the full implementation of the targeted improvement plan as defined in the evidence-based AMP, it is a major increase from Option 1

The reinstatement of the \$3.28M would be divided into the following portions:

- Reinstate \$1,094,207 of renewal funding into 2021/22 budget
- Reinstate \$2,188,415 of renewal funding into the Annual Plan, split evenly, for 2022/23 and 2023/24.

With the reinstatement of \$3.28M allowing full uptake of the full available renewal's subsidy, the proposed redistribution of the existing surplus local share (\$4.28M) is as follows:

- Rates-funded Local Road Maintenance Activities of Maintenance and Operations and Road Safety Promotions;
 - Redistribute the Road Safety Maintenance local share of \$98k along with the maintenance local share of \$363k as unsubsidised funding to fund the maintenance operation to closer to the desired AMP LOS. (98%)
 - Redistribute the Operations local share of \$579k as unsubsidised funding to fund the maintenance operation to closer to the desired AMP LOS (94%)
- With the debt funded Local Road Maintenance Activity of Renewals and Low Cost-Low Risk Activities:
 - Redistribute the Low Cost-Low Risk surplus local share of \$3,24M as unsubsidised subsidised funding. (\$2,88M for the new footpaths programme and the balance \$0.36M for Safety-Pedestrian Improvements).

Preferred Option

The NTA's strategy is to ensure all current assets are maintained, operated, and renewed at the desired Level of Service as justified thought it's AMP.

Proposed Options 1, 2 & 3 provide 81%, 92% and 92% respectively, of funding to achieve the MO&R activities.

Options 1 & 2 provide no additional funding for LCLR activities other than those prescribed by Waka Kotahi, while Option 3 enables the full New footpath programme to be added to the programme of works.

Option 3 is the preferred option for the NTA as it provides the best opportunity for the desired AMP Level of Service (LOS) for MO&R activities to be maintained and provides for the construction of the complete 3-year programme of New footpaths/shared use.

4 Discussion - Investment Activities

4.1 Requested Funding budget for 2021-24 NLTP vs Approved Subsidy

The Investment Activities or Major Capital projects prepared for the 2021-24 NLTP with the Waka Kotahi funding priority announcement on 7th September are shown below in Table 5.

Waka Kotahi also provided an indicative indication of whether major project investment activities would be funded, but subject to further justified technical investment submissions, these are classified as "probable".

Other projects which may possibly be funded if more money becomes available from Waka Kotahi, these are classified as "possible".

Projects noted as not included in the 2021-24 NLTP have not been funded.

5 Recommendations

That the Council:

- Receives the NTA Report dated 30th September 2021-24 NLTP Outcomes
- 2. Approves Option 3, to:
 - a. reinstate a portion of the Original funding Request Local Share (\$3,282,622) into the Council's 2021-31 Long Term Plan to enable full renewals subsidy uptake from Waka Kotahi, the reinstatement would be divided into the following portions:
 - i. Reinstate \$1,094,207 of renewal funding into 2021/22 budget
 - Reinstate \$2,188,415 of renewal funding into the Annual Plan, split evenly, for 2022/23 and 2023/24 and;
 - to redistribute the unsubsidised local share portion (\$4,277,963) as follows:
 - i. \$461,125 as unsubsidised work activities for maintenance activities
 - ii. \$578,753 as unsubsidised work activities for operational activities
 - \$3,238,085 as unsubsidised work activities (New Footpaths programme and safety – pedestrian improvements) under the Low Cost-Low Risk Investment Activities.

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of the report is to identify the projects that Project Managers are requesting be carried forward to the 2021-22 financial year. The projects are identified individually and a summary by activity including funding requirements is also included.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

 Projects included in the 2020-21 Capital Programme that have not been completed and require the budgets to be carried forward to the 2021-22.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Council approve the capital budgets identified in the report "Carry Forward for Capital Programme 2020-21" totalling \$34,548,169 be carried forward to the 2021-22 financial year.

1) BACKGROUND

At 30 June 2021, a number of capital projects were underway but not completed. The budgeted capital works for the 2020-21 year (including carry forwards from 2019-20) was \$94.6m. In addition, external funds were received throughout the year to the amount of \$12.9m. Actual expenditure incurred was \$72.3m, equating to 67% of the total budget (including the external funds received). Of the \$35.2m not spent by 30 June 2021, \$34.5m is subject to carry forward in this report.

2) DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

The projects identified for carry forward total \$34,548,169 and are funded as follows:

 Loan funding
 \$10,373,891

 Depreciation funding
 \$ 3,231,889

 Subsidy
 \$19,955,994

 Reserves
 \$ 486,395

It should be noted that 57.7% of the requested carry forward sum relates to projects that are funded by external support such as TIF, PGF and DIA 3 waters reform funding. Carry forwards not linked to external funding total \$14,592,175.

Reason for the recommendation

To enable the capital projects identified to be completed.

3) FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS AND BUDGETARY PROVISION

The budgets identified in the attached report would be in addition to those adopted in the 2021-22 year of the Long-Term Plan. Overall funding limits will not be exceeded as these projects have been included as completed in the opening balances shown within the first year of the Long-Term Plan 2021-31.

TAKE PÜRONGO / PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

That Council grant a new nine year lease for part of the building at 6 South Road, Kaitaia to Kaitaia People Centre Nga Hoa Awhina Inc

WHAKARĀPOPOTO MATUA / EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- Since 2012 The Kaitaia People Centre Nga Hoa Awhina Inc has leased part of the former museum building at 6 South Road, Kaitaia.
- The final expiry of the lease was 31 July 2021.
- The tenant has requested a new nine-year lease, 3 terms of 3 years each.
- The Te Hiku Community Board considered this report at their meeting held 24 August 2021 and made the following resolution.

TŪTOHUNGA / RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- a) approves granting The Kaitaia People Centre Nga Hoa Awhina Inc a new nine-year lease on part of the building located at 6 South Road, Kaitaia, being Pt Section 20Blk V Takahue SD from 1 September 2021 at Market rent.
- b) agrees that the General Manager Infrastructure & Asset Management is authorised to negotiate and agree to the terms and conditions of the lease.

1) TĀHUHU KŌRERO / BACKGROUND

When Te Ahu opened in 2012, the Council resolved that expressions of interest should be invited for the lease of buildings becoming vacant (the former i-SITE/Lighthouse building, the former Library on Melba Street and parts of the former Museum building now Pioneer House and the subject property). Leases should be on commercial terms and at commercial rent.

The land on which the building is located is classified as a Local Purpose (community facilities) Reserve and in accordance with Clause 61(2A) of the Reserves Act 1977, Council as the administering body, may lease all or any part of the reserve to any person, body, voluntary organisation, or society (whether incorporated or not) for any of the following purposes: community building, playcentre, kindergarten, plunket room or other like purposes. Several expressions of interest were received from various groups and organizations; however most were either non-compliant or unable to pay commercial rent.

The current tenant, The Kaitaia People Centre Nga Hoa Awhina Inc (KPC) provide a broad range of information services, legal clinics, counselling and budgeting services, etc from the premises.

The lease to the KPC is on standard Auckland District Law Society commercial terms and conditions.

2) MATAPAKI ME NGĀ KŌWHIRINGA / DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

Once a lease has come to the final expiry, Council as the landlord, is under no obligation to continue leasing to the current tenant. Council has the option to seek expressions of interest again to find another tenant.

Over the years the KPC has been a good tenant, running a professional operation and providing a valued service to the community. The lease is on commercial terms and the rent is determined by valuation.

Council would not benefit financially from a change of tenant and could in fact find it difficult to attract a new tenant of this calibre given the restrictions under the Reserves Act.

Council has several options:

Option 1 (recommended):

Grant a new 9 year lease to the KPC lease by way of one 3 year initial term plus two times 3 year right of renewal.

Option 2:

Advertise for Expressions of Interest from interested parties.

Take Tūtohunga / Reason for the recommendation

Over the years the KPC has been a good tenant, running a professional business operation and providing a valued service to the community. The lease is on commercial terms and the rent is determined by valuation. Council would not benefit a change of tenants and could in fact find it difficult to attract a new tenant of this calibre.

3) PĀNGA PŪTEA ME NGĀ WĀHANGA TAHUA / FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS AND BUDGETARY PROVISION

The current "market rent" as determined by valuation is \$11,600 +GST per annum. The lease allows for rent reviews to market rent every 3 years.

TAKE PÜRONGO / PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this report is for Council to agree the divestment of the Matauri Bay wastewater treatment plant (WWTP)to Cavalli Properties.

WHAKARĀPOPOTO MATUA / EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The WWTP plant at Matauri Bay was built by Innoflow for Matauri Bay Properties Ltd (MBPL) and Matauri X Incorporation and transferred to Council ownership in 2009.

- The plant has never been operationalised.
- No commitment to operationalise the plant has been made by Council.
- Cavalli Properties Ltd purchased the interests in the land when MBPL went into receivership/ liquidation.
- In the 2018 LTP process, Council determined again to not operationalise the plant after submissions from Matauri X Incorporation and the community and hapu of Matauri Bay.
- In response to requests to operationalise since then, Council response has been a stated preference for the developers to take back the plant and run it themselves (or establish a community trust to do so).
- At a workshop with Elected Members in August, a request for a paper to Council seeking to divest this property in favour of the developers was made.

TŪTOHUNGA / RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- a) reaffirm their previously stated position that this wastewater scheme should not be operated by Council.
- b) approve the sale of the wastewater treatment plant at Matauri Bay to the Cavalli Properties Ltd development group for the value of \$1.00.
- c) having considered the legal advice, Council decline to bill for wastewater charges on behalf of Cavalli Properties.

1) TĀHUHU KŌRERO / BACKGROUND

A 2009 agreement between FNDC, Matauri Bay Properties Ltd (MBPL) and Matauri X Incorporation saw the wastewater treatment plant that was built by Innoflow at Matauri Bay transferred to FNDC for a nominal value. The intention was to make the scheme operable to service the MBPL development as well as other properties and facilities at Matauri Bay via a co-funding arrangement. The consents to operate the scheme are and continue to be in the name of Cavalli Properties who bought the land interests of MBPL and expire in 2026.

Council has from time to time entered into discussions with Matauri X on this matter, but no commitment to operationalise the scheme has been made by Council.

Cavalli Properties (Cavalli) and Matauri X Incorporation (MXI) approached Council in early 2020 to again request operationalisation of the wastewater treatment plant at Matauri Bay as they had resolved earlier sensitivities that existed among the community and wish to commence selling the properties in the subdivision created some years ago. They wanted to put these properties to market with the statement that there is an operational wastewater system that purchasers can connect to.

Council response to this request was that the most expeditious way to achieve an operational WWTP was for the development group to take back the plant and operate it themselves or via a community trust. This was made clear as Council's preferred approach and any other option would be a lengthy process.

2) MATAPAKI ME NGĀ KŌWHIRINGA / DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

In 2016, a "Statement of Intent to establish a Working Relationship between FNDC and Matauri X Incorporation Committee of Management" was agreed, however little progress was made.

During the 2018 Long-term Plan (LTP) process, a submission was received from the Matauri X Incorporation along with the community and hapū of Matauri Bay (Ngāti Kura, Ngāti Miro, Ngāti Torehina) requesting that the operationalisation of the plant be included in the LTP. At the time it was recommended to make no change to the LTP.

While FNDC owns the assets and has a right to operate a scheme, this doesn't automatically make it an operational FNDC wastewater scheme. This requires consultation to set the area of benefit and therefore an appropriate targeted rate. Further, the Agreement to Acquire signed by FNDC and Matauri X includes a joint funding proposal for the scheme's operation. Further work would be required if Council decided to operationalise the scheme, and a targeted rate could not be struck unless via an LTP amendment.

The options previously considered for this plant have been:

- Council to form rateable scheme (i.e. Operationalize the scheme and put a targeted rate in place to fund ongoing operations).
- Develop Public Private Partnership to operate.
- Divest Scheme for CP / MXI to own and operate.

Council has maintained the preferred option to be to divest the scheme for the developer or community to own and operate.

The alternative would require a working group to be established to consider various areas of uncertainty including:

- Plant deterioration since the last condition assessment (probably best met by an updated condition assessment).
- Confirmation of timing for the plant to be fully operational once the latest condition is understood.
- Impact of the National Policy Statement on Freshwater.
- Ensuring ownership of the plant and the consents exist with one entity.
- Any changes in the Development Plans from what was included in the consents and subsequent impacts to or for plant capacity.
- Funding options for the operation and maintenance of the plant.
- Elements of and the subsequent impacts of a private plan change (PPC23) lodged in March 2021 to rezone the development area from General Coastal to Coastal Residential, and also removing an 'Outstanding Landscape' from the area.

Consideration has also been given to offering Cavalli Properties assistance with invoicing for the charges of the WWTP to the users. The Local Government (Rating) Act 2002 precludes us from being able to rate for these properties as none of the prescribed criteria are met. The rate would be a targeted rate under the LGRA and would have to be consulted on and form part of the rating Funding Impact Statement. This would require Cavalli Properties to advise the funding requirements in advance and then Council would transfer that "rate" to the company. However, the risk of non-payment would then sit with Council and ultimately be a risk for the wider community. Council would not be able to rate under an agency agreement, as we do for the Northland Regional Council, as Cavalli Properties are not a rating authority under the LGRA.

Assistance could only be in the form of sundry invoicing on behalf of Cavalli Properties if it is agreed that this is a prudent course of action to take. There is no legal barrier to Council contracting with a private entity for Council to provide services such as invoicing, however there is a risk that the

invoices will not be paid, and Council will become a debt collection agency. Staff strongly recommend that Cavalli Properties invest in an accounting system such as Zero and carry out billing themselves.

Take Tūtohunga / Reason for the recommendation

Council has maintained the preferred option to be to divest the scheme for the developer or community to own and operate as this is a private system for a private development.

To provide a draft 2022 calendar of Council and Committee meetings to Council for adoption.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The attached draft calendar proposes the adoption of dates for formal Council, Committee meetings and reserve days for training and workshops.
- The calendar only sets dates up till the Local Government Election date in October 2022.
- Council and its Committees will meet on a 6-weekly cycle.
- Reserve dates have been identified as dates to keep for Council business as required (workshops, briefings, and extraordinary meetings).
- Community Board meetings are excluded awaiting confirmation of Council and Committee dates.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council adopt the 2022 calendar as attached.

1) BACKGROUND

It is good practise across New Zealand for a Council to set its Formal Meeting Calendar a year in advance. In scheduling meetings and the frequency Councillors should be mindful of the following principles:

- Meetings should be necessary for the good governance of its region or district.
- Meetings should promote the open and public transaction of business at meetings.
- Councillors are considered to be in a part time role of which attendance at formal meetings is only a small portion of the role. Consideration needs to be given to balancing workloads and non-Council commitments.

The proposed schedule includes 'reserve' dates for additional Council commitments such as workshops, training, extraordinary meetings or briefings to enable elected members to plan their varying commitments and in recognition that workshops are a beneficial tool to increase governance understanding of technical or complex issues.

Council have resolved not to conduct meetings on 28 October each year in recognition of He Whakaputanga o te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tireni – Declaration of Independence of the United Tribes of New Zealand, as the national day set aside to observe New Zealand Wars.

Community Board meetings are excluded from the schedule and a report will be provided to each board to confirm their 2022 meeting dates.

2) DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

The attached schedule continues the meeting structure and frequency from the later part of the 2021 formal meeting calendar following the mid-term review, with the following amendments:

- a) Due to increase in work programmes that the following Committees be allocated an entire day to conduct business:
 - Assurance Risk and Finance (except for 22 June)
 - Strategy and Policy Committee

b) A shift in the sequence in which Committee's meet to avoid conflicts with similar regional committees and to assist in balancing the workload. (Demonstrated in the following table)

Community boards under legislation set their own meeting dates around Councils. Reports will be sent to their next meetings to ask them to confirm their meeting dates for 2022.

This report recommends that all appointments in the schedule be held at Far North District Council headquarters in Kaikohe. The Far North District Council does not own any suitable buildings elsewhere. While it is possible, hosting meetings elsewhere comes with an increase in cost and cannot be supported to the same level that is possible at headquarters (i.e livestreaming). If there is a desire to hold meetings elsewhere consideration needs to be given to what value this would add to the decision-making process.

Staff are committed to providing as much notice as possible and making sure that business, where possible, is restricted to the days adopted as part of this schedule. Chief Executive Officer's Report to Council

Introduction

Welcome to this CEO report, which provides an overview on the Council's activities for the period 1 July 2021 – 31 August 2021.

Welcome to the latest summary report of Council activities

Introduction from Shaun Clarke, Chief Executive

July marked the beginning of the new financial year and the fifth birthday of the Northland Transportation Alliance (NTA). The alliance was the first of its kind in New Zealand when it was established in July 2016, formed to enable the Councils and Waka Kotahi to achieve efficiencies and improve transport outcomes by co-ordinating the delivery of work programmes and deploying the human resources of the four Councils more effectively. We are seeing some of the benefits of this approach and are proud of the progress the NTA have made.

Council received good news regarding the bids for \$642,406 in round five of the Tourism Infrastructure Fund (TIF) for new tourism facilities in the District. All bids were approved which will allow us to install Wi-Fi-enabled streetlights at Paihia and Russell, install self-compacting, wi-fi enabled, smart rubbish bins at Paihia, Russell, and Karikari Peninsula, build public toilets at Lake Manuwai, build public toilets near the sand dunes at Te Paki Stream, install a recreational vehicle dump station at Te Paki Stream Road in partnership with Ngāti Kuri and DoC, and seal Bayly Road which provides access to the Waitangi Mountain Bike Park.

On 17 August all of New Zealand moved to Alert Level 4 at 11:59pm due to COVID (delta variant) detection. Our hybrid operating model allowed us to respond quickly with most staff having worked from home more regularly since the first lockdown. We activated our Crisis Management Team within hours of the Government's announcement and initially met twice a day to review new information and plan our response. We provided information about services affected by COVID-19 on our Facebook page before the lockdown started. Our alliance partner Far North Waters (FNW) quickly established 'operator bubbles' at our water and wastewater plants to reduce health risks to critical staff. Our Rates team phoned ratepayers who normally pay their rates at our service centres to discuss alternative payment options. Essential staff who needed to travel across the District for work were identified and issued the required 'essential travel' authorisation letter. Staff wellbeing was a focus, initially checking in with our people leaders each morning and asking them to do the same with their teams.

COVID restrictions necessitated a re-think of how we might consult with our communities during this period. A revised and adaptable plan was formulated to raise awareness of heritage areas in our Draft District Plan, with digital materials and brochures prepared. Planning also commenced on how we will gauge community support for the Three Waters Reform Programme.

Consultation also commenced on whether the Council's governance structure accurately reflects our communities and ensures fair and effective representation. This proposes increasing the number of councillors to 10 to reflect the increase in population since the last review in 2015, community boards and general wards remaining the same with the same number of community board members, and introducing a Māori ward, Ngā Tai o Tokerau, to cover the entire district with four councillors elected at large for this ward. The remaining six general councillors would be elected to the general wards in which they stand. It also proposes to tidy up boundary definition and create a new subdivision for Waipapa.

The staff awards recognising extraordinary dedication and a willingness to go the extra mile were celebrated at our quarterly Love Your Work Awards. Staff nominated eight of their peers and our

District Plan Team for awards and cited exemplary demonstration of our values in their nominations. I would like to acknowledge the Building Team who issued 100% of building consents and Code Compliance Certificates within statutory timeframes in July. On average, the team issued building consents within 11 days and Code Compliance Certificates within seven days. The Resource Consents Team also issued 100% of resource consents within statutory timeframes in July and June.

Other highlights have included:

- The new Northern Animal Shelter on Bonnetts Road being officially opened, all dogs in Council care across the district will be housed in this facility.
- Staff facilitated a site-visit for Councillors to the Ngawha Innovation Park to hear an update from Far North Holdings Ltd (FNHL) on project progress.
- The Strategic Leadership Team (SLT) undertaking delegation training to focus on how to empower others so they have the necessary head-room for big picture thinking, relationship development and decision-making.
- Staff completed information sessions in communities affected by new speed limits before
 we went into lockdown and had received 79 submissions when the feedback period closed.
- The Contact Centre migrated to a new cloud-based system meaning our customer service
 officers can log into the phone system as long as they have an internet connection and a
 headset (ie they are not necessarily required to be in the office anymore).
- The first phase of our Kerikeri Domain Revitalisation Project got underway, with resource consents obtained for construction works.
- The Iwi and Local Government Chief Executives Forum (ILGACE) met and discussed economic development, representation review arrangements and outstanding natural landscapes in the marine environment.

Operational performance during this period saw:

- Comparing July 2021 to July 2020:
 - 1.44% decrease in financial interactions at Service Centres
 - 21.9% decrease in calls to the Contact Centre
 - o 37% decrease in AskUs emails received
 - o 27.22% increase in building inspections booked
 - o 18.84% decrease in visits to Service Centres
 - 28% decrease in i-SITE visitor numbers
 - o 20% decrease in i-SITE retail revenue
 - o 37% decrease in i-SITE transaction spend
 - 3% decrease in i-SITE transaction numbers
 - 9.5% increase in ebook and audio downloads
 - 55.6% decrease in library website session
 - 1,605% increase in digital checkout sessions
- 515 RFSs received by Animal Management in July, 60 of which were urgent
- 31 dogs impounded during July, with 13 dogs adopted via Council's Facebook page and a further 5 by rescue groups
- Monitoring & Compliance received 113 RFSs and achieved a response rate of 82.5%
- 90 Resource Management Act (RMA) consents were received (compared to 68 in July 2020)
- All Resource Consents were issued within statutory timeframes for July
- · 22 environmental health verifications scheduled and completed for July

- · 30 Good Host Visits of licensed premises were conducted
- 35 alcohol licenses issued (compared to 62 issued in July 2020)
- 188 building consent applications received in July
- On average, building consents are being issued within 11 days and code of compliance certificates within 7 days
- 19 swimming pool inspections completed with a 26% swimming pool fail rate
- 35 Building Warrant of Fitness audits completed
- . 14 Notices to Fix (for breaches of the Building Act 2004) were issued
- · 30 development applications received by the Road Safety & Traffic Planning team
- Hokianga ferry revenue was \$45,540.43 excl GST, a 9 % decrease from July 2020

Governance

The months of July and August were busy with the following workshops:

The workshop format is invaluable in providing an overall strategic direction, which in turn allows Members at formal Council meetings to make informed decisions.

Community Board Workshop and Working Party

The Kaikohe-Hokianga Community Board held a Strategic Planning workshop during the period.

The Community Board Working Party has not met during the period. Work occurred in the background to address the latest matters for consideration arising from the meeting held in late June. Discussion has been held with the Chair of the working party (Councillor Vujcich) and a working party meeting will be scheduled for later in the month of September.

The Combined Community Board workshop has been deferred to November due to Covid-19 and restrictions around the number of people who can gather. Agreed agenda items are being worked through in anticipation of this workshop, and Community Board Chairs will be invited to help finalise the agenda topics in due course.

Training

This period was quiet in terms of Elected Member training which is not unusual for this time of year. There are a number of Members booked on professional development (portfolio related) conferences in late September which have been rescheduled to later in the year / early next year due to Covid-19 restrictions on travel and gatherings.

Action Sheets/Decision Tracking

Action sheets are now being circulated to all meetings of Council, Committees and Community Boards. We recognise that the format for some is not ideal but talks with the software provider (located in Sydney) are proving to be problematic during their lockdown. We will continue to pursue this avenue but will make no changes to the current, standardised format until such time as we can establish the cost of customisation and assess against available budgets.

CEO Office

People and Capability

PSA Union Negotiations

The FNDC and the PSA have successfully negotiated a 3-year collective agreement. Negotiations started in April this year and concluded at the end of June. This is a significant milestone for both FNDC and the PSA being the longest collective term agreed to.

Leader Development

Branded To Taurnata, the whakatauki for the new Leader Development Progamme is one of aspiration and determination. Tier 3 and Tier 4 leaders who applied to take part in the programme were rigorously tested through the application process. The culmination for each applicant was a questioning panel discussion with three SLT members This resulted in 10 leaders qualifying to participate in the innovative programme which will be launched at the end of September. It is anticipated that the programme will run for 6 months.

Induction

The presentation of the New Starter induction sessions has been updated and completely renewed, improving interaction, and increasing practical information sharing. During the national lockdown, the People & Capability Advisors have welcomed our new starters virtually by adapting our new induction presentation to suit the remote working situation.

CEO Office

We have successfully recruited the Executive Assistant to the Chief Executive Officer position and eagerly await for her to start working with us in September.

Infrastructure & Asset Management Group

An internal staff member progressed to fill the role of Infrastructure Compliance Lead and in turn appointed a fixed term Water Safety Plan Data Specialist to consult and provide expert advice on the development and implementation of Far North District Council's Water Safety Plans and Operations and Maintenance Manuals. A vacancy within the Infrastructure Operations team provided an Acting opportunity, enabling the internal growth of skills, connections, and experience.

Strategic Planning & Policy

With the unfortunate resignation of the Team Leader – Maori Relationships due to career progression, we now have two Team Leader roles to be filled in the Te Hono team. After strategically assessing the future needs of the team, final decisions will be made on how to fill these roles.

A new Team Leader was appointed internally for the Strategy Development team, providing leadership development opportunities.

Corporate Services Group

The pilot merger between Transformation & Assurance and Digital Information Services, commenced 8 June, is nearing mid-point for review. This pilot will allow for digital transformation and innovation with the following five outcomes expected; strengthened programme delivery, customer centric service design, embedded change management, leadership efficiencies and pathways and addressed business risks.

District Services Group

Staff movement into People & Capability opened a vacancy in District Services for Team Leader – Administration, Environmental Services. This position has now been filled.

District Services has been prepared and work ready while in COVID lockdown and continue to support our community.

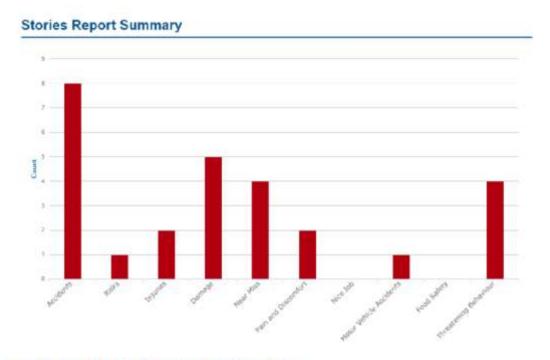

- The trial of a new service to make it easier and quicker to apply for rates rebates
- The blessing of the Kaitāia Water Project at Sweetwater near Awanui
- The beginning of physical works associated with the Kerikeri Domain Revitalisation Project
- An award ceremony for people who tried to save Kohukohu's former Masonic Lodge from fire
- Unsubsidised seal extension projects for the next three years
- The Council's representation review
- The Council's decision to provisionally opt out of the Three Waters Reform Programme
- Shaun Clarke's tenure as Chief Executive

Publication of media releases

Strategy

Corporate Planning

Long Term Plan (LTP)

The Long Term Plan (LTP) for 2021-31 became operative when it was adopted at the end of June. Year one serves as the Annual Plan for this year (2021-22). Work now begins on planning the development of the Annual Plan for 2022-23 which will be adopted in June next year (2022).

Strategy Development, Bylaws and Policies

Far North 2100 District Strategy

On 10 August 2021 staff completed a workshop on the outcomes of the consultation and options going forward for Far North 2100. The direction given by the elected members present in the workshop was to put forward the Far North 2100 Strategy to Council for adoption.

Spatial Planning

An outcome of the 10 August 2021 workshop on Far North 2100 was to undertake a review of the 2007 Kerikeri / Waipapa Structure Plan as the first spatial planning project to be initiated as part of the implementation of Far North 2100.

The review of the Kerikeri / Waipapa Structure Pan will be guided by the National Policy Statement on Urban Development 2020 (NPS-UD) and will be based on the requirements of a Future Development Strategy as per the NPS-UD.

The review of the Structure Plan will guide, support, and inform the draft District Plan in alignment with the notification of the District Plan. Work is scheduled to commence in September with the goal to have Council adopting the Kerikeri / Waipapa Spatial Plan in June 2022.

Staff have continued to engage with the Ministry of Urban Housing and Development (MHUD), our neighbouring Northland Councils, Auckland Council, and representatives of other government agencies on a proposed corridor spatial plan that would expand from Auckland into Northland.

District Population Reforecast

The last fully informed population forecast provided by .id was at the end of 2019 and delivered to the Far North District Council at the beginning of 2020. This population forecast was used to inform the District Plan.

Staff are planning to have a new population forecast available by March 2022 to inform the spatial planning programme of work and network modelling that the Infrastructure and Asset Management Planning team are currently undertaking. Procurement of a new population reforecast commenced in August and will go to the market in September for this service with a decision due in November 2021.

Climate Change

A draft of the Regional Climate Change Adaptation Strategy, that was cross referenced with the Far

North District Council's Climate Change Roadmap was presented by members of the Climate Adaptation Te Taitokerau (CATT) group to the Joint Climate Change Adaptation Committee on 30 August 2021.

A workshop arranged for 30 September with the Far North District Council will consider the content of the draft strategy to feed back into the final strategy.

An internal reference group on climate change has been established that will be used as point of reference for the establishment of a climate change policy, the development of carbon reduction plan and to feedback to the Regional Climate Change Adaptation Strategy.

Regional Accessibility Strategy

Over the reporting period staff continued to provide support to the collaborative cross Council development of a Regional Accessibility Strategy which is being led by Whangārei District Council.

Parks and Reserves

Staff continued to work on a draft parks and reserves policy. The policy will be considered by the Strategy and Policy Committee in early 2022 for approval to begin public consultation.

Bylaw Programme

Staff worked on the finalisation of the Treated Water Supply Bylaw based on submissions received on this bylaw. The current Water Supply Bylaw 2009 is scheduled to automatically revoke on 16 October 2021.

A new on-site wastewater disposal systems bylaw was developed during the reporting period and submitted to the 7 September Strategy and Policy Committee for approval to commence public consultation through to the end of October 2021. The current Control of On-site Wastewater Disposal Systems Bylaw 2010 is scheduled to automatically revoke on 26 May 2022.

Staff have been working on the development of the two new bylaws, a road use bylaw and parking bylaw during the reporting period and submitted these to the Strategy and Policy Committee on 7 September for approval to go out for public consultation until the end of October 2021. The current Parking and Traffic Control Bylaw 2010 is scheduled to automatically revoke on 17 June 2022.

Consultation on the proposed speed limit changes to the Speed Limits Bylaw for the area west of State Highway 1 (Kaitāia-Awaroa and Broadwood-Kohukohu), the Moerewa urban area, and Te Oneroa-a-Tōhē / Ninety Mile Beach ran from 12 July 2021 to 24 August 2021.

Consultation on the Solid Waste Bylaw that went out without amendment ran from 26 July 2021 until 27 August 2021. Hearings on this bylaw were scheduled for 7 September 2021 with 1 submitter heard.

Policy Programme

Staff have continued to work on the social impact assessment that is required to inform a review of the Class Four Gambling and Totalisator Agency Board Venues Policy.

Staff have also continued to work on a review of the Equity and Access Policy during the reporting period.

At the same time a review of the following eight policies commonly referred to in Council as 'roading policies' continued in collaboration with the Roading staff:

- Community initiated infrastructure roading contribution
- Dust management policy

- 3. Limits of council responsibility for formation maintenance of roads
- Private roads and rights of way
- Road maintenance policy
- Road mirrors private crossings policy
- Road naming and property numbering
- Road speed limits

An outcome of this review has resulted in a proposed Naming Policy that staff are now planning to put forward to the October Strategy and Policy Committee.

lwi/ Hapū Relationships

Māori Representation

Having resolved to establish Māori seats on Council for the 2022 and 2025 local body elections, an initial proposal was developed and went out for consultation from 20 August to 1 October. The information has been profiled on the Council's website and Facebook page. The information has also been sent to various hapū and iwi contacts.

Māori Participation in Council Decision-making

Alongside the provision for Māori representation, Council also resolved to ensure a mechanism to allow greater Māori input into decisions. In doing so, Council was also cognisant of the feedback they received from iwi during discussions about Māori representation, that Council should look to codesign a mechanism/s with Māori.

Te Hono have been discussing with our Te Ao Maori portfolio holder how this will be enacted.

Te Oneroa-a-Tôhe Board

Te Rautaki o Te Oneroa-a-Tōhe (Te Oneroa-a-Tōhe Beach Management Plan (the plan)) articulates the desired outcomes, objectives and actions for Te Oneroa-a-Tōhe (the beach). These were developed by Te Oneroa-a-Tōhe Board (the Board) to realise the need to protect and care for the beach now and into the future.

During consultation to develop the plan, safety pertaining to vehicles on the beach was one of the main issues identified. This became one of the key areas that the plan looked to address. In particular, 'Action A38' is designed to manage vehicle use on the beach – both where you can drive and speed limits.

As part of the second phase of a suite of proposed speed limit reviews, the speed limits restricting speed onto and along the beach were consulted on over six weeks between 12 July - 24 August. This included notification on Council's website, and Facebook page, print media and information sent to marae within the areas of interest. Further, drop-in days were held at Ahipara School, Broadwood A&P Hall, Kohukohu Fire Station and Moerewa School. Meetings were held at Roma Marae and a zoom with Pukepoto Marae (due to COVID-19 restrictions).

A full report will be prepared for Council and will include submissions. It will also include information on hearing/s dates and venues.

Iwi Local Government Authorities Chief Executives Forum (ILGACE)

Iwi Local Government Authorities Chief Executive Forum (ILGACE) met in August. Housing, economic development and Outstanding Natural Landscapes were key agenda items.

Te Kahu o Taonui and Mayoral Forum

Te Kahu o Taonui (TKoT) invited the Mayoral Forum to meet in early July to discuss a more collaborative approach to engagement. TKoT would like all Northland councils to have a more coordinated approach when seeking to engage with TKoT on the same work or priorities, i.e. Māorī Representation. The outcome of the meeting was a desire to meet as a governance body on a regular basis to encourage the discussion of regionally significant issues in a timely manner.

Outstanding Natural Landscapes

Northland Regional Council (NRC) presented on a recent direction from the Environment Court (EC) to include Outstanding Natural Landscapes (ONL) in the Regional Plan for Northland. The direction from the EC provided very little time for NRC to undertake consultation on this matter. Given the recent public interest in Significant Natural Areas (SNA's) NRC sought advice from iwi as to how it might best engage with Māori on this issue.

The meeting agreed that all parties would discuss with their relevant governance bodies the signing of a joint letter to the EC and relevant Ministers outlining concerns with the process and timeframe by which NRC was to have consulted and included ONL's into the regional plan. The letter was drafted by NRC and the Ngātiwai Trust Board CEO and sent on August 16, 2021.

Mäori liaison

The implications of the <u>Local Government (Rating of Whenua Māori) Amendment Act 2021</u> on internal processes continue to be a focus for Te Hono and the Rates team. Te Hono is steadily working through remission applications whilst the Rates team have carried out a review of what properties are considered non-rateable.

A mailout by the Rates team to 1500 property owners has now been completed and owners have been advised that their whenua has been identified as non-rateable and that any arrears will also be written off. Should enquiries be received in relation to becoming non-rateable, a new RFS code has been created whereby the Rates team can assist the customer. It was intended to have the letter out sooner, however, due to an influx of customer enquiries regarding the rateability of their whenua, the mailout was delayed.

Te Hono interactions with customers by kaupapa

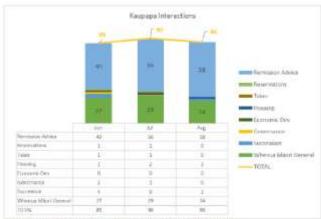


Figure 1 June-August 2021 Customer interactions by kaupapa

The volume of staff interactions with customers has been steady this last quarter with no noticeable decline since the legislative changes to the Rating of Whenua Māori.

163 remission advice queries were received, with the second highest volume of interactions being related to general enquiries around whenua Māori (80). Examples of the types of enquiries range from transaction histories, to what are their legal rights before building due to a family member having a trespass order imposed on another family member.

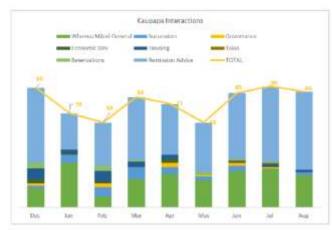
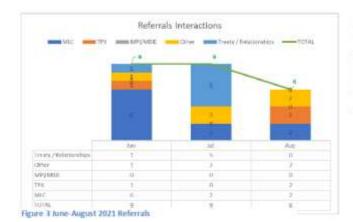


Figure 2 YTD Customer interactions by kaupapa

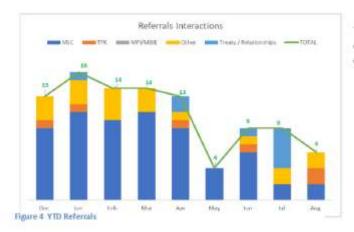
When considering the interactions over the past year, the volume of work related to Whenua Māori has not decreased. This is somewhat surprising due to legislative changes it was thought staff would see a drop-off.

It is worth noting that Economic development interactions have been minimal to date which signals that we could increase efforts in socialising this to whenua Māori landowners. A revised policy is to be developed by the Finance team with Te Hono for the next rating year.

Referral interactions



Referrals to external / other agencies are reducing which may indicate the customers are becoming more informed and knowledgeable prior to their contact with FNDC, and/or Te Hono staff being better equipped with expertise to provide appropriate advice.



The Māori Land Court continues to be the key external agency necessary to assist customer enquiries to FNDC.

"Whenua Māori Expo" - a multi-agency initiative

The coordination of a regional "Whenua Māori Expo" has been developing since April 2021. This is a multi-agency approach being led by the Māori Land Court and Te Puni Kōkiri with the 4 Northland councils.

The overarching intent of the expo has been to share with whenua Māori landowner's advice on what they need to do in order to derive economic and/or social benefit from their land, what funding assistance can be accessed and what Council processes need to be fulfilled.

Due to the latest COVID-19 Delta variant alert, it has been agreed to defer this event until early 2022. In the interim, an online information sharing forum has been identified as being an ideal platform to begin engaging with Whenua Māori landowners and is being considered.

Agencies will continue the momentum of collaboration by looking to have a combined booth/tent at the 2022 Waitangi Day events. This will lead on to the actual Expo, with dates staggered from

February through to April 2022, as opposed to condensing to four weekends across one month.

Community Wellbeing

Community Development & Funding

Staff have committed to a focused effort in Kaikohe for the next three years in conjunction with the NZ Police and community leaders. The project — 'Kaikohe Cares' aims to provide high level coordination across Council departments and between all the great initiatives already happening in Kaikohe - from grassroots to agency level - to strengthen the relationship between Council and the community.

Staff identified a need for definitions, guidelines, and eventually new policy, in relation to the introduction of the Community Board Placemaking Fund, which allocates \$100,000 each financial year from 2021 to each Community Board. The fund is intended to support community-led placemaking opportunities and it is envisioned that this funding stream will have a significant positive impact on community wellbeing. Consultation with each Community Board took place in July and August, with staff presenting to each board a Placemaking Fund guideline with suggestions and recommendations. Community Board input was collated and will be presented back at the next joint meeting of the Community Boards in November. We look forward to developing robust guidelines alongside our Community Board members that will not only be transparent to our ratepayers, but also inform and enable our communities to make the best use of the Placemaking funding.

FNDC now has 18 Community Plans across the Far North. Work is currently underway to update all plans that are over 10 years old to ensure they are fit for purpose, before any new plans area started.



Staff continue to develop and refine our youth programme with the aim of supporting the personal development of our next generation of leaders. July saw the second of 3 rangatahi attend Outward Bound in Anakiwa, coordinated by our team and sponsored by the Kaikohe-Hokianga Community Board and Mayors Taskforce for Jobs. In July/August the Far North Youth Council (8 rangatahi) attended the Festival for the Future conference in Wellington, and our TUIA candidate attended another wananga for the year. Staff have also been running virtual wellbeing check-ins with all Youth Councillors, our TUIA candidate, FNDC Cadets, and our Outward Bound Rangatahi throughout C19 lockdown.

Funding

Staff lodged a \$1.2 million funding application to the Lotteries Community Facilities Fund for the new

Kerikeri Squash Courts. This application was developed in conjunction with Infrastructure & Asset Management (IAM) and Kerikeri Squash Club. The decision is due in early December.

Staff applied to the Mayors Task Force for Jobs Community Recovery Fund for \$499,745 to support our Kaikohe Cares kaupapa. The funding is focused on meaningful, sustainable employment and if successful the funding will cover a coordinator - who will work closely with MSD – a remote work programme, a daily free of charge workers 'Berry Bus' from Kaikohe to Ngawha Enterprise and Innovation Park, drivers licencing programme for youth and bespoke funding to small to medium size enterprises to support training costs and employment support as required on an individual basis. The decision is due the end of September.

In August, the Events Investment Panel, consisting of the three Community Board Chairs, met to deliberate on applications to the Events Investment Fund. 24 applications requesting \$333,850 were received, with 13 applicants receiving funding totaling \$80,000. These events included:

Funding applications from the Karikari Residents and Ratepayer Assoc. for a Christmas Community Lunch and Te Whakaora Tangata for assistance with rental costs were declined as the Board felt funding would be more appropriately sought elsewhere.

District Planning

There are two key processes that continue to be developed as part of the draft plan process. These are consultation with lwi Authorities and targeted engagement on Heritage Areas. These have

dominated team focus in the recent term, whilst continuing the refinement of the draft plan.

Engagement with Iwi Authorities is being carried out in May through to September. Between June – August the team attended a number of hui with all but one of our 11 Iwi Authorities. This engagement will allow for further refinement of the plan prior to the development of the proposed plan. Council is required to summarise all advice concerning the draft district plan received from iwi authorities and summarise the response to the advice, including any provisions of the proposed plan that are intended to give effect to the advice.

Council has committed to undertaking targeted engagement with affected communities about the draft district plan and heritage areas. Further engagement with specific communities where heritage area changes were being considered has been confirmed and Council was preparing to mail out to landowners in 9 different locations in August and has had to adjust the planned engagement to adapt to the current COVID-19 context.

Heritage specialist advice on the nature of the heritage resource has prompted consideration of new techniques to both manage and create understanding and awareness of the heritage resources in different settlements. In most cases, these resources extend beyond individual buildings, to encompass settlement patterns, associations of European and traditional land use, occupation, and cultural values.

Council's further engagement to allow for the discussion to continue the suite of methods that might best manage the resources, which are considered legislatively as a matter of national importance. Communities will also be able to submit when a proposed plan is notified, allowing for participation in hearings and voice support, opposition, and reasons.

Joint Shareholding of Northland INC

This project is now complete. As part of the 2021-31 Long Term Plan process, Council became an equal shareholder in Northland Inc. on 1 July 2021

Joint Regional Economic Development Committee

The Joint Regional Economic Development Committee, established as part of the shareholding between Northland Regional, Kaipara and Far North District Councils, had its first meeting 30 July 2021. FNDC was represented by Councillors Clendon and Vujcich where the main order of business was to elect a Chair (Justin Blackie, NRC), adopt the Committees Terms of Reference and the Statement of Intent (SOI).

Northland Inc presented at a workshop following the formal meeting outlining:

- · Northland Inc's focus areas
- Development of a Regional Economic Strategy

It was agreed that a strategy was required, and that Northland Inc were best placed to lead and develop the strategy.

Regional Economic Development Strategy

The key purposes of the strategy are:

- · Confirm regional aspirations and provide a clear strategic vision and focus, set priorities
- Guide long term planning of key entities (including lwi/Hapū/Māori, communities, sectors, Councils, agencies)

- Provide agreed long-term intergenerational outcomes for the regional economy
- An opportunity to do things differently
- Give confidence to our people that there is a plan
- Guide and direct investment e.g., Government, private sector, community
- Guide and direct the activities of Northland Inc.

Northland Inc have secured most of the funding required to deliver the strategy.

Chief Executive and Mayoral Forums

Reports were prepared on Northland Forward Together key priorities and updates with regards to Government funded or co-funded projects for the agendas of both Forums. The CEO Forum held 9 August 2021 at FNDC and the Mayoral Forum 30 August 2021 hosted by WDC was conducted remotely due to COVID-19 lockdown restrictions.

The next cycle of meetings will see the CEO Forum hosted by WDC on 8 November 2021 and the Mayoral Forum hosted by FNDC on 29 November 2021. Work will be undertaken in October 2021 to prepare Northland Forward Together reports for these agendas.

Kaikohe Civic Hub Working Party (KCWHP)

The principal purpose of the KCWHP is to work collaboratively with the community in reviewing the options for building a Civic Hub in Kaikohe and supporting Council to deliver the project. Phase 1 is the building of a new library facility, however, the KCWHP needs to consider it in the wider context of enhancing Kaikohe and the surrounding linkages. The KCWHP has 5 Elected Members with voting rights, 2 community representatives, General Manager Strategic Planning & Policy and Manager Te Hono as support.

The KCWHP has:

- · Had an onsite meeting on a Council owned property to determine if fit for purpose
- Commissioned a study to be delivered by ĀKAU
- Requested staff to update the Kaikohe-Hokianga Community Board (4 August 2021) and the Strategy & Policy Committee (7 September 2021) on progress through an information report.

Northland Forward Together

The Northland Mayoral Forum met Monday 30 August 2021. It was intended that this meeting would be at WDC, but due to COVID-19 lockdown restrictions was held online. As can be expected, the main topic of discussion was around the lockdown, and especially how varying levels across regions would impact Northland. The largest item on the agenda was meeting with Northland Members of Parliament (MPs).

A priorities session with Northland MPs was held. Key aspects of the session included:

- Appreciation was extended to the MPs for taking Northland's messages back to central government.
- There was growing concern in the local government sector and the wider community about the pace of change and that 'centralisation was taking away the democratic voice of the people'. These concerns were being raised directly with the Minister of Local Government

- by Local Government New Zealand (LGNZ). LGNZ would be issuing a media release in the following days.
- Concern was raised that raft of reforms were rushed, there was a lack of prioritisation and the supporting information had 'gaps in practicability'; all which led to a lack of confidence in the process.
- Concern was also raised that local government in Northland, but also across most regions, were losing key staff to central government which was detrimentally impacting on Council business.
- A key message was that Northland was keen for Central Government to continue investment into core infrastructure.
- In general the Northland communities had responded well to the ongoing Covid-19
 lockdown. However, there was 'growing concern being linked to Auckland'. It was advised
 that the 'cases in Warkworth had links into Northland, possibly as far as Waipu'. It was
 stressed that Northland needed clear messaging, a hard border at Te Hana and a travel
 corridor through Auckland when levels changed.

A Climate Change Update was circulated outside the meeting. Key Climate Change work programme updates were:

- The Joint committee met and reviewed the draft Te Taitokerau Climate Adaptation Strategy (the Strategy) on 9 August 2021.
- The Strategy sets out high-level direction for local government response to the impacts of climate change.
- The Strategy has detailed overview of climate change impacts and issues relating to Councils business activities - what is currently being done and future opportunities
- It includes 46 priority actions in four groups, most have existing funding, and include ongoing, short, medium and long-term projects (the Mayoral Forum requested these be prioritised and parking those that could potentially be affected by pending legislation):
 - 1) improve knowledge and understanding;
 - grow relationships;
 - 3) reduce risk and vulnerability; and
 - 4) build capacity.
- The Mayoral Forum stressed that Councils 'cannot push pause' on climate change.

Corporate Services

Transformation and Assurance

Audit and Assurance

The recalibrated Internal Audit and Assurance Programme for the remainder 2021 calendar year was presented to the September meeting of the Assurance, Risk and Finance Committee.

Three audits were initiated this reporting period – the Review Network Logon Accounts and two Building Consent Authority Quality Audits.

Risk

Regular reporting, to the Assurance, Risk and Finance Committee, on the top organisational risks and their treatment plans continues.

Four risk progress reports were included in the September 2021 Risk Management Report to the Assurance, Risk and Finance Committee. The Risk Progress Reports on ARF001 Climate Change Risk, ARF004 Asset Management, ARF009 Customer Service Delivery, and ARF013 Drinking Water Resilience were presented.

The deep dive risk session for September focused on ARF004 Asset Management, particularly the risks surrounding Programme Darwin.

Finally, the second progress report on the risks associated with the programme of the externally funded "shovel ready" projects that form part of the Governments economic response to the COVID-19 pandemic was presented to the Assurance, Risk and Finance Committee in September.

Transformation

The Creating and Enabling Great Workplaces Programme has completed the 'Evaluation' phase. Key findings from evaluation were:

- The self-reported wellbeing and productivity of our people has improved since adopting hybrid working.
- The current office configuration and space is sufficient to meet our operational needs.
- We have achieved discernible financial savings from adopting hybrid working.

Customer Experience Programme

Customer Satisfaction

We continue to see an increase in our overall customer satisfaction (CSAT) scores since the implementation of our new digital customer feedback system.

The customer satisfaction scores have continued to rise during the recent COVID lockdown - we have a score of 3.9 out of 5 for the lockdown period of this report. This is significant to note as some of our higher scoring services don't influence our results as they are closed (i.e. libraries, service centres, i-SITES). This is a real testament to the resilience of our staff and adaptability of our work environment. Our response rates have also remained consistent. In the last lockdown our satisfaction scores and response rates declined significantly.

Over the period we can report:

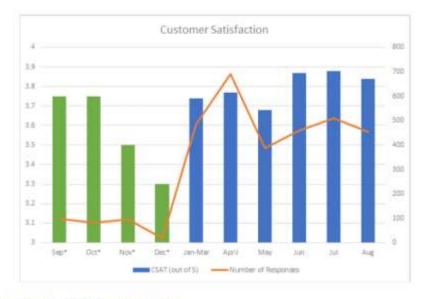
- Service Requests CSAT 3.60 (5.1% ▼)
- Building Consents CSAT 4.41 (11.6% ▲)
- Building Inspections CSSAT 3.97 (2.1% ▲)
- Resource Consents CSAT 3.65 (5.9% ▲)
- Visitor CSAT 4.88 (1.2% ▼)
- Service Centres (5%)
- Libraries CSAT 4.90 (2.2% ▼)
- LIM's CSAT4.05 (2.37% ▲)
- Property Files Requests CSAT 4.07 (1.5% ▼)

There are 965 customer responses in this period (which is down on the last report but is expected due to the lockdown) and our response rate remain consistent at 41.8%.

June Customer Satisfaction (new system, scale out of 5)



The new system's Customer Satisfaction is a 5-point scale, we have converted the old performance measure below to highlight the monthly Customer Satisfaction results and volume of responses from the old and new systems over the year.







Net Promotor Score (NPS) is a reputational benchmark and this has increased 12.79% ▲ during this period.

Date and Promise Measures



The average customer contacts has increased slightly (0.7% ▼) since the last reporting period and is currently 1.93. Our keeping customers informed has increased 2.7% ▲ with a CSAT of 3.8.

Digital Information Services

Executive Summary

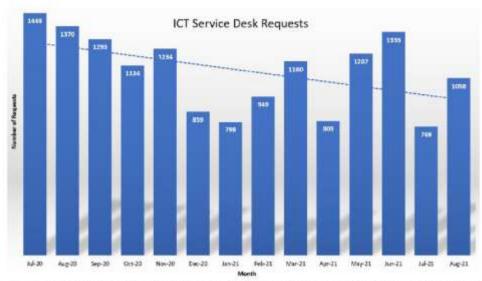
The focus for the last two months has been on cybersecurity. Multi-Factor Authentication and Single Sign-on was deployed throughout the organisation. A benchmarking exercise on cybersecurity was undertaken as a lead-in to cybersecurity awareness programme that was launched in July.

We have also continued to make discernible improvements in our service offerings. Highlights in this reporting period includes implementing Freshservice (a new IT Service Management system), migrating all calls to the MS Teams environment, migrating the existing Contact Centre phone system to a new cloud-based Software as a Service) system called Genesys Cloud, and expanding our online service offerings.

ICT Operations and Delivery

ICT Service Desk Requests

The number of ICT Service Desk Requests received during the July-August 2021 period was 1,827. This number is down from 2,542 which were received in the May-June 2021 period. Overall, the number of requests lodged have trended slightly downwards over the last 12 months.



The number of outstanding requests yet to be resolved is 289 (this is up slightly from 256 in the previous period). 45 are awaiting an external vendor or the delivery of equipment, and 90 are awaiting a response from the requester.

Multi-Factor Authentication 'My Security Information' (Plan B)

Staff currently use the Multi-Factor Authentication app to approve their access into our systems but there may be times when staff do not have access to their app, for example, if they lose their phone or have left it somewhere, and occasionally things just don't work as they should. An enhancement to Multi-Factor Authentication called 'My Security Information' has now been configured. This means staff can log into their security information and set up an alternative contact number, such as a personal mobile number or even to receive a phone call via their home number. In the event they cannot use their normal method of authentication, they can have a Plan B ready to go.

Payroll Health Check

Our TechnologyOne software vendor has recently undertaken a full health check of our Payroll system and processes. They have prepared a comprehensive report which contains recommendations for improvements which are currently being evaluated.

Digital Wings E-Waste Programme

FNDC have recently agreed and signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Digital Wings and RemarkIT Solutions to redistribute or responsibly dispose of unwanted surplus computer equipment.

Digital Wings is a programme supported by the Ministry for the Environment and RemarkIT Solutions to redistribute refurbished and fit-for-purpose computer equipment from organisations such as FNDC, to local Far North community organisations and charities.

These organisations are seeking to promote access to digital technologies for people who are digitally disadvantaged, and to raise aspirations and create opportunity - especially for youth education and employment, Māori, and Pasifika development.

Digital Wings technology partner, RemarkIT Solutions, has a philosophy of reduce, reuse, and recycle to provide responsible e-waste options for New Zealand organisations. FNDC receives a cost-neutral, safe, secure, and professional method to recycle unwanted computer equipment and it also helps us to realise our sustainability goals. By signing up to this programme 98% of our e-waste will be diverted from landfill.





Contact Centre Phone System

Work with Datacom has now been fully completed to migrate the old Contact Centre phone system over to a new cloud-based SaaS (Software as a Service) system called Genesys Cloud. This provides an overall better customer and staff experience, can be used via a web browser with a headset, and fully integrates with Microsoft Teams. This new platform enables Contact Centre staff to work remotely which helped to significantly reduce the numbers that needed to work from an FNDC office during the recent COVID-19 Alert Level 4 lockdown.

Library RFID Project

Work has progressed on the project to insert RFID (radio-frequency identification) tags into library books to enable the use of self-service kiosks in our Libraries. A successful vendor has been selected and work is currently underway to implement this new system.

Data Insights and Programme Delivery:

Online Services

Event applications have been released to the public with two successful bookings in the first few days. The Community Facilities Customer Service Officer is collaborating with Sport Northland on a complex application for the Kerikeri Half Marathon. This will test the process as there are multiple departments involved.

A process improvement opportunity was identified during the implementation of ePathway dog reregistration payments. This allows the payments received via our bank statement to be accurately receipted and the tag issued eliminating a manual and time-consuming process. This has been implemented and received with enthusiasm and positive feedback.

The ePathway solution enabling Consentium to lodge applications with FNDC has been completed, allowing project resources to move on to Stage 4.

Scoping and requirements workshops are progressing for Stage 4 Permits and Licenses. The top four items have been identified for development in the first release these are:

- Special liquor licence
- Manager's certificate
- Vehicle crossing
- Earthworks.

System Upgrades

The upgrade programme is underway with the team evaluating the release notes, documenting the changes and assessing new functionality. Deployment of Objective to Production is planned for October followed by Pathway and ePathway in November. Initial impressions of ePathway are that it is more customer friendly with modern design features and improved functionality.

Long Term Plan

The Digital Insights & Programme Delivery management team has been busy with the planning of the projects in the 2021 – 2023 LTP. This is a significant portfolio of work that will deliver several new capabilities to the organisation. Improvements in FNDC's geo-spatial and project portfolio management capabilities as well as further digitisation of processes and records are some of the anticipated outcomes. The structure of governance and the provisioning of FTE across the portfolio is a critical outcome of the planning process with the correct balance of management to team members a core requirement of this stage.

In conjunction with the planning, recruitment of two IT project managers to support the delivery phases of the LTP is also underway.

Enterprise Data Warehouse

The Resource Management Act dashboard has been moved to production and final testing has started. The Building Control Authority rework to the new enterprise data warehouse has started and should be complete by end of October.

CI HRP

The Business Intelligence team created a CIA HR data quality tracking dashboard that resolved 2800 data issues. The Business Intelligence team also created an FTE reconciliation dashboard with daily tracking of all FTE adjustments and approvals in the system to enhance data quality in the system.

GIS

District Plan

The GIS team created a GIS app for the District Plan team. The application will enable the team to edit the draft district plan and including detailed tracking of changes and the reasons for them enable spatialising the public feedback received against the draft district plan.

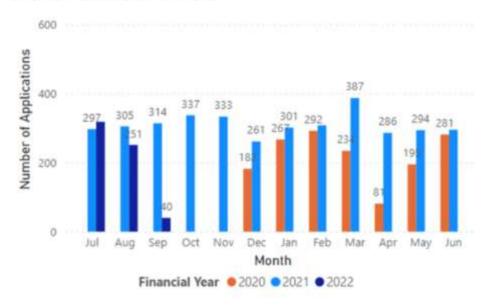
The GIS team created a web app for the Representation Review consultation this will assist the team with the public consultation, and it is available on the FNDC web site.

Property File ePathway Applications



25th Anniversary at FNDC

Staff member Robyn Kemp celebrates 25 years working at FNDC this month. This is a big achievement for her and a real benefit for Council to have her business knowledge and dedication with us for so long. In the 12 months to 10 September, she's processed 2326 Property File requests for our customers.

Archives Data Project

Over the past 8 months staff have been working on making our Archives data more searchable and accessible by adding descriptive metadata for every archive box held at our offsite storage. This huge job is complete, and we can now search our archive holdings by barcode, contents, subject matter, disposal code, date of contents and more.

Finance

Operational Financial Performance As at 31 August 2021

Operating Surplus

- Operating surplus for the period ending 31 August recorded \$9.5 million against a planned year-to-date budget of \$4.8 million. The Operational budget surplus is therefore at 99% compared against the year-to-date budget. However, FNDC have received considerable income in relation to Economic Stimulus Employment Opportunity (ESEO), Provincial Growth Fund (PGF) and 3-Water Reforms that were not in the budget, and if these are excluded the year-to-date budget surplus is at 43%.
- Major savings are in salaries partially funded from capital projects and general expenses for
 provision for doubtful debts which is an annualised process. However, there is a YTD overspend
 in contractor and professional fees for which cashflow is being reviewed after confirmation of
 National Land transport Programme (NLTP) budget from Waka Kotahi NZTA on 07 September
 and carry forward budgets for 3-Water Reform.
- We are currently tracking above the forecasted operational income. This is due to PGF funds received for Lake Omapere for de-mobilisation costs and operational subsidy received to support capital projects.

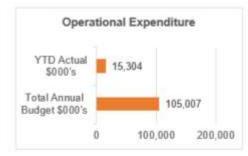
Income



Income has recorded favourable year-todate budget variance as at 31 August 2021 in the following areas:

- Income has been received from Waka Kotahi (NZTA) as interim funding for maintaining levels of service across the district.
- Unspent grant funding has been brought into the year to complete the 3-Water Reform projects. Large amount of this grant was not required last financial year, therefore further claims for funding have been delayed as a result.
- Unspent grant received Provincial Growth Fund (PGF) last financial year to complete the final reinstatement costs for Lake Omapere and support the road sealing project at Ngapipito road.

Operational Expenditure



Operational expenditure has recorded unfavourable year-to-date budget variance as at 31 August 2021 in the following areas:

- Maintenance and operational expenses incurred across the roading network for sealed & unsealed pavement maintenance, drainage, structures, traffic services maintenance. Waka Kotahi (NZTA) approved and adopted the 2021-24 National Land Transport Programme (NLTP) on 07 September 2021.
- Annual cycle trail grant has been paid to the Pou Herenga Tai Twin Coast Cycle Trail Trust.
- These are offset by savings in salaries that are partially funded from capital projects and general expenses for provision for doubtful debts which is an annualized process.

Capital Expenditure



Capital expenditure has recorded unfavourable year-to-date budget variance as at 31 August 2021 in the following areas:

- Kaitaia New Source (Sweetwater) project contract has been awarded and winter works are progressing well following NRC's approval.
- Waipapa Sports Hub, Kerikeri Domain and Te Hiku o te Ika revitalisation projects ongoing from last financial year which will require carry over budget approval.
- Planned works for Provincial Growth Funds (PGF) road sealing projects ongoing at Ruapekapeka, Ngapipito and Peria road.
