5.1 DISTRICT-WIDE RATING FOR WATER SUPPLY AND WASTEWATER PROPOSAL DELIBERATIONS.

TAKE PŪRONGO / PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this report is to provide background information and to present financial considerations to assist in decision-making for the district-wide rating of water and wastewater proposal

WHAKARĀPOPOTO MATUA / EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The statutory purpose of the Annual Plan is to confirm differences from what was proposed in the corresponding year of the current Long-Term Plan 2021-31.
- Council agreed to discuss the proposal to amend the rating methodology for water and wastewater rating in a separate consultation process
- Consultation commenced on the proposal for change on 21 November 2022 and ran for an extended period to February 2023.
- The purpose of this deliberations report is to provide the information required to enable Council to make a final decision on the suggested change to rate methodologies

TŪTOHUNGA / RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- a) adopts the proposal to change to a district-wide targeted rate for water supply and wastewater services
- b) amends its Revenue & Financing Policy to include the change for implementation 1 July 2023.

1) TĀHUHU KŌRERO / BACKGROUND

There is an increasing challenge in our district to fund water and wastewater. Currently these services are funded through capital and operational targeted rates, with the capital rate calculated on a scheme-by-scheme basis. As part of the previous rate review, it was proposed to change to district-wide targeted rating for reticulated water and wastewater services because it was identified that for communities with a small number of ratepayers, the scheme-based costs were becoming unaffordable.

Since then, costs continue to increase, assets continue to age, and stricter compliance requires a higher level of service. There is also a clearer picture of the future impacts of *not* taking immediate action to resolve water infrastructure issues.

The proposal that was consulted on was to remove the current scheme-based targeted rates for water and wastewater and replace them with a district-wide targeted rates. This would impact ratepayers connected to (or able to connect to) the 15 wastewater schemes and those properties receiving piped water from our nine water treatment plants. Some ratepayers would experience a net increase in their rates while others would experience a decrease. It would not affect ratepayers who are not connected to (or not able to connect to) any Council wastewater or water scheme.

We proposed this changed to make sure we:

- Achieve compliance
- Support growth

- Manage affordability
- Prepare our communities for the Water Services Reform Programme.

Engagement

Consultation commenced on the 21 November 2022 to 16 February 2023. 213 submissions were received during that time. One additional last submission was received and added into the submission schedule, but not counted as part of the analysis, however their comments and submission were included in the complete submission set provided to Elected Members. 155 submissions were received via the 'have your say' page on the FNDC website and the remaining 58 submissions were either via the inbox (48) or hardcopy form (10). Five submitters wished to have their submissions heard verbally, however when contacted only four submitters wished to be heard. An initial date of the 29th of March was postponed to the 6th of April where four submitters verbally presented to council.

Final analysis

All submissions were provided to Elected Members for review. Final analysis was based on the initial question proposed in the consultation: 'Do you support the proposal to change the way we rate for reticulated water and wastewater to a district-wide rate, instead of a scheme-based rate?'

Noted that in the comments received for connections to reticulated just water or wastewater, the submitters assumed that they would then be charged for both services regardless of if they received both services or not. This resulted in a larger 'do not support' response.

2) MATAPAKI ME NGĀ KŌWHIRINGA / DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

Further to this consultation taking place, government has revised its 3Waters approach, including a name change to Affordable Water Reform Programme with a re-focus on the impetus for the reforms being to improve the affordability of water services. A number of key changes including the number of WSE's from four to ten, a staggered establishment date and each territorial authority owner appoints one territorial authority representative to the regional representative group.

The main change that impacts this proposal is the staggered establishment date, as the Northland entity will not change. Progress is already underway in the transition of water services into the new

entity and it is possible that Entity A could continue its current trajectory, which would include changing the process for district-wide rating of water and wastewater.

There is also the possibility that any reforms will be repealed by any new government should there be a change in government.

Option 1 – Change the rating system as proposed (recommended)

With regard to the Affordable Water Reform, Council will stay within Entity A, and indications from government are that all entities will require a district-wide targeted rate for water supply and wastewater. By changing to a District Wide rating methodology this will align with the current Affordable Water Reform Programmes timeframe, even if there is a staged transition.

Option 2 – Keep the current targeted rating system for water supply and wastewater

Leave the decision to lie on the table until such time that further progress is made in the reforms space and/or central government elections have occurred and programme either continued or repealed. This would then allow a possible change to district-wide rating to occur 1 July 2024 or 1 July 2026.

TAKE TÜTOHUNGA / REASON FOR THE RECOMMENDATION

All submissions have been collated and analysed. To facilitate Council decision making staff have analysed feedback and provided recommendations for Council to debate and, if desired, amend. The decision made at this meeting will come into effect on 1 July 2023. All submitters to this proposal will be notified in due course.

- (1) Scheme users are the same people who receive a reduction in costs as they no longer have to maintain their own water collection / sewage disposal systems;
- (2) Scheme users receive most of the environmental benefits, as they live in the area;
- (3) Where septic tanks are replaced, section sizes can be reduced, allowing extra subdivision to occur- a windfall profit to the landowner, which would significantly exceed the extra rates cost. Other ratepayers should not have to subsidise this private profit;
- (4) Where a scheme becomes necessary due to subdivision, the correct mechanism to charge for this is the development contribution, dropped by Council many years ago;
- (5) Spreading costs across the district could be used to subsidise services for people who connect but do not pay rates. Putting in a scheme conditional on local rate payment is a good opportunity to raise and resolve these non-payments;
- (6) Spreading costs across the district may well mean that small schemes miss out on subsidies from central government as the projects are now fundable by FNDC;

1. Wastewater: I am a direct descendant of Tupuna's of Te Uri O Hua Hapu, along with many others in Ngapuhi Nui territory. My whangau do own and are shareholders on whenua which is affected by this rating system, which after viewing council proposal, does not appeal to me.

The fact that this sewerage system was introduced with half the village residents being tenants at our meetings wasn't what we considered fair. The landlords are residents in e.g. Ruakaka, not at all what we call similar status? So will our rates go to maintain the richer property owners needs? = NO MORE = We lost a lot of our whenua thru colonisation and this looks like another "CON-JOB".

People should look at researchers on Waitangi Tribunal Claims for Ngapuhi and not accept what officials quotes, as genuine and beneficial for us all.

Septic tanks bran new, would have cost less than the sewerage system of \$6,000,000 and provide work for our own people in NZ. The sewerage ponds in Cumbers Road would be a health hazard future wse, as heavy rain does make it overflow into the Wairoro Awa which travels down to Ngapipito Road and links up with other outflows.

(Details removed for privacy) did inform council of that problem, but nothing much was done. Our whanau tends to an old "Wahi Tapu" that is access through a neighbouring property and we usually wash off in Wairoro Awa, named ("Kukune". Kohewhata B1). Our (Detail removed for privacy) father, was buried there in 1990. I did not accept the sewerage system and stayed with the septic tank.

The correct name was and is "Wairoro" at the entry to Kaikohe Bridge, opposite the Rawiri Taiwhanga Park, which was Tupuna Land.

2. Water Supply: I am satisfied with the supply but, when used by others like road works, we end up with dirty water. This was done recently, when the road that was damaged by Top Energy vehicles, used, when constructing and delivering supplies for the 3rd Geothermal Power Station, a few years ago, wasn't in a safe condition. So that did affect our customers



before the Parakirahi Ngawha Waiariki Pools, were redeveloped. I am one of the Trustees, who are owners along with descendants of original Tupuna.

The ditch on the Ngawha Springs Road, heading down to the pool on the left side does not have one, from he corner or in front of the Lodge building towards the trees next door up from the pools.

At the end of the pine trees growing there, is a rough ditch, that has a drainpipe or culvert installed sloping down covering about 50 mtrs. A continuation of about 100 mtrs to the pools, is no proper ditch or drain existing at all at present, just overgrown grass edge.

In the village, there is a drain that runs the R)side of the first house at our main road and the back of my property supposedly under Puia Street to an outflow opposite. The council had a lot of issues by neighbours but they never did much about it. That drain or creek does not flow out, so it rises at the back of us and the state house section, Puia Street where it sits. As this has been here for years, where the heck did our rates go to? Were they sent to the new developing areas in Kerikeri or paying for Far North District Council Office in Kerikeri.

So, I want areas for richer people to pay a higher rate than us poorer aged ones who are the were the original Tangata Whenua who did a lot of assistance for the settlers of 'Niu Tireni' and were robbed by the Authorities who continues to do so. TOTALLY AGAINST COUNCILS PROPOSAL.

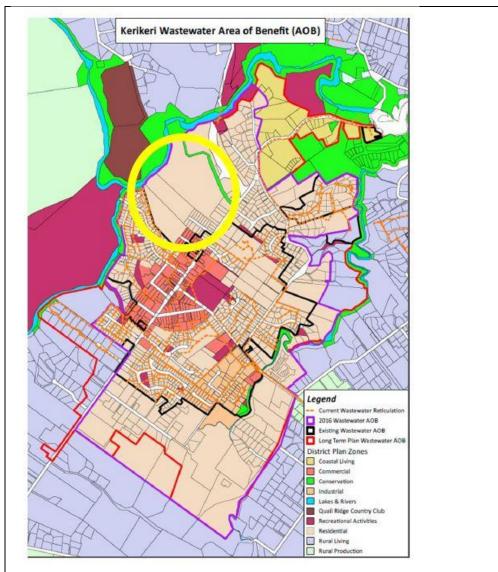

The model places a higher cost per head on smaller population centers and pushes people and employment towards living in the towns thereby adding further social costs.

The northern Iwi have been long established in many distinctive localities. Their turangawaewae is a critical aspect of well-being and cultural identity. The collective community is obligated under the Treaty of Waitangi to protect the treasurers of Maori and this includes the land and well-being of the people. Imposing additional costs upon such communities undermines such objectives.

The smaller and more isolated communities already incur additional costs re accessing health and education but there are measures in place to address these arising from a central tax base. A similar approach needs to be used for water and sewage.

Some homes within towns already collect their own water. When rate payers collect and manage their own water why would the council change them. The council should provide an incentive to those who collect and manage their own water. We should have a category for water "connected but not used, to cover those who make no demand on the council system. Many properties have satisfactory septic tanks and no requirement to connect to any council sewerage system.

There is a wider issue here of people having the opportunity to self manage and not to be forced to use a council system, many of which are less than good. A good example is the many places that have water restrictions during summer on a council manage system that is poor and badly managed by council. Council is often not the only or even the best solution. We need to share the management when ratepayers stand willing to provide for themselves. How can I give them the go-ahead without knowing our Waste Water system can cope?

Submission to the Proposal District-wide targeted rates for water and wastewater.

- 1. I support the move to a district-wide rating system for water and wastewater.
- The information provided as a consultative document does not meet the criteria for consultation due to it's ambiguities and inaccuracies.
- 3. It would appear that Council has not followed the correct decision making process as the only option considered is to apply the current defective rating system on a district-wide basis. Given the proposal is to address the challenge to adequately fund reticulated water supply and wastewater treatment in the Far North, decisions must be made on a far wider scope.

Required:

That Council recognise that the current approach has not met the standards required and therefore provide for proper consultation as part of the Annual Plan process before making any changes.

In light of my claims above, I attach information in support and a further page of issues with the consultation document.

I wish to speak to this submission.

Consultation requirements not met.

The LGRA 2002 sets out the requirements for consultation which include:

"82(a) that persons who will or may be affected by, or have an interest in, the decision or matter should be provided by the local authority with reasonable access to relevant information in a manner and format that is appropriate to the preferences and needs of those persons:"

The impact for most affected persons will be the change to their rates and to this end the consultative document includes tables purporting to show the changes in rates for the current year and the next three years.

Issue 1. Insufficient and Ambiguous Information.



Given that the current rating system for wastewater consists of three capital rates for each scheme and two operating rates for the district, the provision information based on a single future rate is insufficient information for many ratepayers.

From the document it is not possible to confirm the rating change for the following groups of ratepayers

1. Wastewater Capital Availability Rate. Ratepayers subject to this charge do not pay the operating rate but no separation of rates is given so approximately 10% of wastewater ratepayers are unable to see the impact on their rates.

Further these ratepayers may be misled by the second paragraph of the proposal into thinking that as they are ratepayers who are not connected to any Council wastewater scheme, they will not pay any charge in future.

2. Wastewater Subsequent Pan Rates. Again there is no mention of the impact of this rate which is levied on over 20% of the pans and currently accounts for over 15% of wastewater rates.

The use of the singular description in "a district-wide targeted rate for wastewater treatment" could be interpreted as meaning that there will be no subsequent pan rate in future or that the currently reduced rate will be replaced by a full charge.

In fact the calculations appear to be based on the continuation of the current structure of multiple rates.

Issue 2. Data not in accordance with Long Term Plan

While I accept that Council wishes to use the most up-to-date information in their forecasts, the rate calculations are not in agreement with the LTP.

- 1. The amounts shown in the consultative document will raise over 8% more than shown in the LTP for the three future years.
- 2. In the LTP, Council resolved to moderate the impact of depreciation on strategic assets by 24% for the years 2021/22 to 2023/24. Having requested the information re the rate calculations, I note the following regarding the depreciation not funded.
- 2.1 For 2022/23, the percentage of depreciation not funded ranges from 16.8 to 24% of the depreciation over the schemes, with most schemes being close to the 24%.
- 2.2 In 2023/24 the range widens from 14.3% to 24%. Looking at the increase in depreciation for Hihi, it suggests the possibility that new developments have not been included in the calculation.
- 2.3 There should be no depreciation not funded in 2024/25 and 2025/26 according to the LTP. However while this applies to three large wastewater schemes , all other schemes have depreciation not funded with the ranges from 9.8% to 20.4% in 2024/25 and 6.0% to 17.5% in 2025/26.

In the absence of an explanation this appears to be a blatant manipulation of the rate calculations.



3. While the number of weighted SUIPs show minor adjustment between 2022/23 and 2023/24, no further changes have been made. So rating figures assume nil growth in contrast to the Proposed District Plan where, for example, fully serviced Kerikeri Central is shown with an expected growth rate of 1.5% pa from 2022 to 2027.

Currently active approved developments in Kerikeri will add over 270 users to both water and wastewater schemes over the next few years.

Issue 3. Future Growth.

While Growth is mentioned as a reason for the proposal, no information is given of the impact of such growth. In particular I note that council is currently reviewing its District Plan with detailed zones based on the availability of these services. In some cases these include areas not currently being serviced, but which would presumably become subject to Availability rates when the PDP is approved. This should at least be mentioned as part of consultation.

Decision Making Process

The consultation document makes reference to the need to consult under LGRA S78 and S79.

However it would appear that the preceding section S77 has not been followed.

- "S77 (1) A local authority must, in the course of the decision-making process,—
- (a) seek to identify all reasonably practicable options for the achievement of the objective of a decision; and
- (b) assess the options in terms of their advantages and disadvantages; and ..."

No information has been provided to indicate that any options other than the proposal were even considered. I provide below some of the issues which should have at least been reviewed as part of the process.

Capital Rate.

Council accepts the concept of there being two classes of cost, referred to as operating and capital, and that these should be rated differently.

- 1. How much should the capital rate yield? The current basis of depreciation plus interest leads to the anomalous situation whereby higher amounts occur in the years after new expenditure and reduced amounts as assets age,
- 1.1. Consider a rate of return on asset value.
- 1.2. Currently no deduction is made for capital component of fees received. For example bulk water supply is charged at the operating rate per cubic metre.
- 1.3 Council has introduced public good charges surely most of these rates should be set against the capital rate requirements.
- 2. How should the rates be split between different users? As the peak capacity required is a major determinant of the cost of a scheme, surely this should be the key driver, not the



potential annual use. The current discount for the capital component of subsequent pans defies logic.

- 2.1 Adust the subsequent pan charge to full rate on each subsequent pan.
- 2.2 Adjust the availability charge to apply to each separate use from the granting of resource consent for subdivision or land use change. Council has to provide capacity for future development and this change would provide a fair contribution from developers once they have approval. Currently in Kerikeri wastewater area there are over 200 approved dwelling units for which no service rates will be received until after construction is completed and a further 100 dwellings until titles are issued.
- 3. Rate remissions should not apply to service capital rates. The capacity has to be made available so full charge should apply on equity grounds. For example there are a number of contiguous properties which do not meet the Valuer General's Rules to be treated as a single unit, but Council permits this treatment. At any time the second title can be sold with a right to build a dwelling and connect to services.

Operating Rate.

Assuming Council is to balance it's budgets for these services, then the amount required from the operating rate becomes the total rate requirement less the capital rate as calculated after the above changes.

Affordability.

Council uses affordability as an argument for the proposed new rating structure. But does not appear to have made any moves to consider ways to reduce costs or increase income. For example Development Contributions could have been in place to reduce capital rate requirements.

Subsidies.

Council has received government subsidies in recent years to assist with capital costs. It is normal for these subsidies to come with a condition requiring the benefit to attach to a particular set of users, usually the ratepayers of a service area. At present the benefit is attached to a scheme by reducing the borrowing needed for the subsidised project. Just transferring the total interest costs to a district-wide capital rate will mean the benefit is also spread district-wide.

Among possible solutions are:

- 1. Use a return on asset value to set the amount required from capital rate. Then apply a remission to those ratepayers who should benefit by spreading the amount of subsidy over those ratepayers for a number of years.
- 2. If continuing with current basis for capital rate, add a notional interest for the amount of subsidy to the capital rate required and apply a remission as above using amount of interest added.



Option 1 is simple for Council to operate as the remission and rating units, once calculated, would remain constant over the period chosen. For example 10% of subsidy per year over 10 years or 5% over 20 years.

This would also permit correction to be made in respect of the recent subsidy to Kerikeri wastewater which was provided to extend the scheme but has been applied over existing users as well as the extension.

Areas of Benefit.

Given the current status of the Proposed District Plan with it's Urban zones based on the availability of these services, the impact of these changes should have been considered.

Issues with Proposal Document

1. Introduction.

The first paragraph claims to "address the challenge to adequately fund reticulated water supply and wastewater treatment in the Far North." It does nothing to address funding, only to revise the split of costs between ratepayers.

The claim that there have been significant increases in the cost of maintaining water services because of ageing infrastructure is an admission of failure in production of the 2021-31 LTP or is irrelevant. Changes to compliance standards and inflation changes may have impacted costs.

The final paragraph of the Introduction refers to the requirement for consultation under LGRA 2002 but does not clarify if this is supposed to be such consultation or merely seeking input prior to such consultation as part of the preparation of the 2023/24 Annual Plan. It should not be necessary to refer back to Council meeting agenda and minutes to see that this purports to be Consultation under LGA 2002

2. Proposal.

"The proposal is to remove the current scheme-based targeted rates for water and wastewater and replace them with a district-wide targeted rate for water supply and a district-wide targeted rate for wastewater treatment."

The use of the singular when referring to the proposed system implies one wastewater rate and one water rate. This is misleading to those ratepayers currently charged an Availability rate or Additional Pan rate.

Unless Council is intending to rate at a higher level, the proposal does nothing to enable the claims

made in the final paragraph. This proposal is purely about who pays for the necessary improvements.

3. The why.

The Compliance paragraph explains Councils problem and should be part of the Introduction.

The Affordability paragraph is the explanation for the why of the proposal.

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The Growth paragraph is irrelevant unless Council is proposing to raise extra rates after the change in rating methodology. Further the information provided in the Funding Impact section does not anticipate any growths in number of connections.

Informed decision-making.

As there is a lack in information being provided to the ratepayers, how can they be considered as informed. In fact misinformed would be a better description in view of the erroneous figures supplied.

5. Funding impact of what we are proposing.

At best the design used provides the funding impact for those residential ratepayers subject to a single supply of the services. No information provided for some 15% of users with Availability or Subsequent Pan charges.

Unfortunately the actual information displayed is incorrect for all future years thus rendering the information valueless.

- 5.1. Number of Users. The number of users for the three future years is constant at a marginal increase over that for the current year. This despite the current approved growth. In Kerikeri alone there are developments under way that will increase number of connections to both water and wastewater by over 270 and a further approval for 56 that is to commence work in the next few months.
- 5.2 Depreciation Not Funded. The 2021-31 LTP contained a resolution to moderate the impact of depreciation on strategic assets for three years to 2023/24. The table contains rates calculated on the basis of 14% to 24% depreciation not funded for 2022/23. It would appear possible that new assets have been omitted from the calculation.

The big problem arises in 2024/25 and 2025/26 where there should be no depreciation not funded. That is true for just three large wastewater schemes! For the others the percentage ofdepreciation not funded ranges from 9.8% to 20.4% in 2024/25 and 6.0% to 17.5% in 2025/26.

5.3 No correction for Government Subsidies. Where Council has received a Government subsidy for work on a scheme, this normally carries a condition that it must be applied to that scheme. Under the current rating system this was achieved by the reduction in debt required for the capital works. This reduced the interest charge and thus the capital rate, over the period of debt repayment, some twenty years. How will this be processed with a district-wide rate?

I am a directly affected Ratepayer, as I own properties connected to different water and wastewater systems, and am also a tenant (leasee) of a connected commercial premises.

I am affiliated to the Kerikeri Ratepayers and Residents Association; and,

The Paihia and Districts Residents and Ratepayers Association.

I am opposed to the proposed District-Wide Rating system for water and wastewater services;

I wish to note that the brochure mailed to Ratepayers (dated November 2022) notifying us of the proposed changes to the rating system contains information that is neither an accurate account of the impacts of the proposed new rating method on Ratepayers in different areas of benefit nor does it present a comprehensive assessment of the alternative methods available for achieving the intended outcomes (more affordable and fairer, to upgrade systems to achieve compliance with "stricter Government regulations").

Furthermore, Council already conducted a long anticipated full Rating Review in 2021. Elected representatives at that time settled upon a system which continued with targeted rates by each scheme, for capital expenditure (CAPEX) but which socialised (shared equally) the operating costs (OPEX) of all schemes across all connected (and available to connect) properties.

At that time Council also introduced a 'public good' Rate to all properties (or SUIPs) which are not connected (or able to be within an area of benefit of a scheme), in recognition of the broader public benefits to all residents and visitors to the Far North, in having public potable water and wastewater schemes in townships. Townships which host Government agencies, schools, hospitals, police stations, community facilities such as reserves, libraries, sports venues, halls and the like.

It must be noted that little has changed re "Government Standards" requiring upgrades since that required 6 yearly Rates Review was concluded less than 2yrs ago, other than a local government election seeing some new elected representatives in chambers. However, 5 of the current 11 were in Council at the time Council decided to retain a Rating method targeting CAPEX of each scheme to the users of each scheme.

Key points for your consideration:

The proposal seeks to socialise (share) the cost of (alleged) required upgrades to achieve compliance with higher or stricter Government Standards. However, the proposal will also socialise the cost of upgrades intending to provide for future demand.

That is, increased capacity which enables and caters to further growth and development, within areas Council might choose to direct further growth into. Council can focus growth and development via changing zones and rules associated with them, to promote development in

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some townships more than others. For example the extensive "mixed-use zone" surrounding the existing CBD of Kerikeri; by placing a lot of community facilities within close proximity to some townships, and none in other townships; by favouring transport networks feeding into and around some townships while neglecting other areas (not providing adequate parking or transit hubs for example).

This proposal is not introducing a more affordable or fairer rating system, but rather, it will see areas which are NOT being considered areas for growth and development helping to pay the cost of new capacity (by either enlarging the Area of Benefit to cover a larger area, or by changing the zone rules to allow for more intensive development) in other areas where growth is being directed. The documentation pertaining to this review of the rating policy, does not discuss who are the beneficiaries of future upgrades, prompted by either an increase in the capacity of water and wastewater networks and/or by the changed zones and rules associated with changing zones. Ratepayers who benefit directly from such upgrades ought to be able to pay for those upgrades, while those who do not benefit (and are in fact hamstrung in their development aspirations, by inadequate provision/capacity of infrastructure) ought not have to share in paying for those who do.

The principal of "user pays" is relevant to meeting the financial costs of meeting demand for infrastructure. Catering to future demand is meant to be a focus for strategic planning, and the documents for this consultation do not describe where / areas of benefit – to be allowed to grow and development and which will be made to stay at the same level as currently accommodated.

Council has still not reconsidered Development Contributions, so new capacity is being taken up by developers at an alarming rate.

Other areas have been told they will see upgrades (e.g. Paihia new water supply), and yet nothing has eventuated. The document provided is not clear about what new infrastructure is included in the estimated (average) rates noted in the table in the consultation document.

Another factor motivating this proposed change to the Rating policy (prior to delivering essential upgrades, to achieve compliance with higher or stricter Government standards/regulations) is a perception that smaller communities with low numbers of SUIPs connected to a scheme are unable to afford the high cost of the upgrade to achieve compliance. In the past, there has been concerted lobbying to get Government to subsidize the cost of achieving compliance with higher standards. In the past Government provided a subsidy for sewage schemes, that saw the Minstry of Health come up with \$7million, that all ended up to the new Kerikeri scheme – which only brought in a small extended area of benefit, and so directly benefitted only a small number of ratepayers.

If Government is making regulations that some communities can not afford, then Government ought to be deciding if those communities are not sustainable while compelling councils to meet standards. Perhaps Government needs to provide funds to allow those communities to achieve the health and safety standards Government establishes, or allow them to revert to other forms of development and lifestyles, as with the half of all Ratepayer Residents fo the Far North, who are not connected to a sewerage scheme or to reticulated water scheme.

Redress

Council must acknowledge that it has rushed to notification of this proposed change to Rating method, and has failed to deliver accuate information.

Abandon this review, until you have assessed all the rating options more accurately, and presented more comprehensive analysis of the options for the consideration of the Ratepayers and Residents of the Far North.

Changes to Rating System for Water & Wastewater Services

I strongly disagree with the proposed methodology of charging a standard fee for all those able to connect to a council system.

The justification of this proposal is that "If we continue charging for water and/or wastewater services the way we do, rates for property owners in some communities will become unaffordable. If network costs become too high, property owners may not be able pay for these services."

The whole purpose of targeted rates is that the rate reflects the service. If the proposal is accepted then the council should also take responsibility for the installation of and charge a standard fee for all septic systems not connected to a council system. This would ensure that a council approved system was in place and cost all landowners the same whether they are on a forestry block in the middle of the district or on a waterfront beach. This would make it more affordable for those who wished to build on prime waterfront land but find the current rates and wastewater system requirements unaffordable.

It is council's responsibility to ensure that charges are equitable across ratepayers for the services council provides, not to ensure that all ratepayers are able to pay their share. Property valuations are used as a basis for general rates on the assumption that those with higher valued properties are able to pay higher rates. This is well known to be untrue where families have lived on what was once remote coastal properties or simple sections in popular towns are faced with very high rates as they become prime real estate. Council offers relief to owners by deferring rates until the property is sold. Similar relief can be offered for those connected to expensive water or wastewater systems.

The FNDC also needs to take a lot of responsibility for the state of the systems in the way it has handled the funding of depreciation and use of development contributions over the years. The removal of development contributions removed the ability to fund increased systems as development took place. The desire to grow exceeded the desire to ensure adequate infrastructure was able to be provided during a period of exceptional growth. Council would be far better addressing this issue.

1) BACKGROUND

This is the second annual plan process carried out for the 2021-31 Long Term Plan.

A number of workshops were held to review both operational and capital expenditure. Staff have taken a further look to provide further analysis on the capital programme for the 2022/23 and outer years which has resulted in a now proposed 7.75% rate increase.

The purpose of this deliberations report is to provide the information required to enable Council to make final decisions to set the rates requirement for the 2023/24 financial year while considering minimal impact on levels of service.

Annual Plan process

The statutory purpose of the Annual Plan is to confirm differences from what was proposed in the corresponding year of the current Long-Term Plan 2021-2031.

Community consultation/engagement is required only on those changes that are considered 'significant'. Typically, submitters will also provide feedback on other topics not discussed in the Consultation Document. Such feedback is recorded, analysed and considered alongside feedback on the specific proposals.

As highlighted in the Consultation Document 2023/24, the Council has focused on delivering the key infrastructure and services, but this has come with a number of challenges including Cyclone

Gabrielle and other weather events, this has compounded with the highest level of inflation imposing significant extra costs nationally.

The Consultation Document putting proposals to the public was adopted on 21 March 2023. Also consulted on at the same time were proposed fees and charges for 2023/24. Consultation of the two items in tandem is the usual process for the Annual Plan and fees and charges.

Council plans to adopt the final Annual Plan on 29 June 2023 at an ordinary Council meeting.

Consultation was carried out from 24 March 2023 until 24 April 2023 on proposals to:

692 submissions provided feedback on both consulted and non-consulted topics. 18 submitters asked to speak at verbal submissions held both in person and digitally on 17 May 2023.

There were a large number of submissions received in support of the Turner Centre proposal as the consultation document was shared amongst user groups and other organisations that support or use the Centre. These submitters did not necessarily respond to the second proposal leaving an unsure or n/a response. The overall general comments the majority related to the increase in rates (13 comments) as well as comments relating to activities (7), planning/regulatory/governance (6), wellbeing (2), spending, fees (3), other (3).

2) DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

1.a Partnering with the Turners Centre to better deliver arts and culture

The general consensus from the submissions received is the value that communities across the district place on the Turner Centre seeing it not only as a hub for arts and culture but the importance for ongoing development in that space. Acknowledging that the current operations have been under immense economic pressure due to COVID-19, economic downturn and now continuing economic pressures for the near future.

Total operating costs budgeted for 2023/24 \$71k which includes \$45k grant.

The balance of the loan is \$1.1M circa.

Option 1 Adopt the Partnering with the Turner Centre to better deliver arts and culture for the district proposal

Allows the Centre to continue to function and develop opportunities within the arts and culture sector across the district. A management agreement with the Turner Centre Board will need to developed in consultation with the Turner Centre Board and be presented to Council for discussion prior to adoption.

Option 2 Do not adopt the Partnering with the Turner Centre to better deliver arts and culture for the district proposal.

Unless there was alternative financial support, the Centre would probably have to cease operations. Reducing the options for people and communities within this space. There would also be an

economic impact throughout the tourism and hospitality industry as some events would have utilised accommodation providers throughout the district.

1.b Enabling housing development on Māori Freehold Land (policy)

Option 1 Adopt the policy with proposed conditions and criteria

For 2023/24 Council proposes a new rating policy to enable housing development on Māori Freehold Land through the remission of rates. Council has Policy R23/13 – Incentivising Māori Economic Development this policy will sit alongside to better assist Māori in both areas of development and provide housing opportunities on Māori Freehold Land. This is a requirement under section 114A of the Local Government Rating Act and this policy needs to be in place by 1 July 2024.

Option 2 Amends the conditions in the draft policy

While the council is required to have this policy, changes can be made to the policy to best fit.

The term could be reduced to a sliding scale of 1 to 5 years:

Year 1 - 100% remitted

Year 2 - 75% remitted

Year 3 - 50% remitted

Year 4 - 25% remitted

Year 5 - 0% remitted

2. ADOPT FEES AND CHARGES

As part of preparations for the LTP 2024-34, fees and charges are being thoroughly reviewed by staff to ensure the following:

- Fees are being applied correctly and consistently.
- Fees meet the pre-requisite requirement of being cost recovery (where applicable)
- Resource consent fees have been reviewed and recalculated to address past inconsistencies and bring those fees to where practical and reasonable cost recovery.
- This is an ongoing process, aligning with the LTP process and all fees are reviewed annually.

There were three direct submissions received though the Special Consultative Process (LGA 2002, Section 83) that ran at the same time as the Annual Plan consultation process.

- Submitter No. 1 in total support of the proposed fees changes as outlined in the Schedule, except for correcting the clerical error of 2022/23 to increase the fee for oversize double depth internments.
- Submitter No. 2 objection to all fee increases, commenting that services were not equitable across the district.
- Submitter No. 3 supported in part the changes in resource consents and objected to all other proposals.

Three comments were also received through the Annual Plan submissions. Two supporting the proposed changes - one in general and would like to see the reintroduction of developer contributions, one specifically supporting the hourly fees for resource consents, however suggested that building consents be a fixed fee. There were two objections specifically resource consent fees, one to the calculation of resource consent fees and the other to the increase of fees.

Option 1 Adopt fees and charges 2023/24

There are no reasons for the Council not to proceed to adopt the proposed Fees and Charges for the forthcoming year.

Option 2 Don't adopt the proposed Fees and Charges Schedule 2023/24

If the proposed Fees and Charges Schedule 2023/24 are not adopted, then fees and charges will remain for the next year or until Council determines a suitable timeframe, noting that if there were any increases in the resource consents area, we would be required to carry out a Special Consultative Process again, allowing time for consultation, verbal submissions, and deliberations to take place.

Any additional shortfall in fees as budgeted would then be required from the general rate to cover any area where cost recovery was not able to be met.

3. ADDITIONAL CAPITAL PROGRAMME REQUESTS

Throughout the Annual Plan process staff have completed an extensive review on the current and future years of the capital programme.

Option 1 Include all new capital programme requests

That all new capital programme requests are accepted as there are no rating impacts in the 2023/24 year of the Annual Plan but will impact in the future years once completed. These will be all loan funded.

If the stormwater resource consent capital project for the Te Hiku drainage district is approved, the additional \$50k operational budget will need to be considered to support this project. This will be for professional fees and will have a rating impact.

Option 2 Partially or exclude all capital programme requests

That only a select group of projects be included in the Annual Plan 2023/24 or exclude all of the additional requests and will be reviewed during the Long-Term Plan (LTP) 2024-34 process.

If the stormwater resource consent capital project for the Te Hiku drainage district is approved, the additional \$50k operational budget will need to be considered to support this project. This will be for professional fees and will have a rating impact.

4. RATE INCREASES AND DEBT CEILING

Disclosure requirements as per The Financial Reporting and Prudence Regulations 2014 alongside the Financial Strategy ensures we are prudently managing revenues, expenses, assets, liabilities and general financial dealings.

Rates (increase) affordability

This benchmark compares planned rates with quantified limit on rates contained in the Financial Strategy of the Long Term Plan (LTP) 2021-31.

The quantified limit is that the rates increase should not exceed LGCI plus 3.5%. This is indicating that the limit is nearing for 2023/24 and exceed in 2024/25.

5. OTHER ISSUES

Te Hiku Community Board has requested the reinstatement of \$100k for Placemaking. This was removed in error during the process and has been committed for Master Planning.

The establishment of the Te Kuaka Committee has identified a number of legacy issues that are being worked on and the administrative workload that has eventuated is more than can be coped with. The Committee are requesting a co-ordination role of \$87k similar to the Community Board Co-ordinator roles that support those boards.

These will incur a combined additional 0.187% on rates.

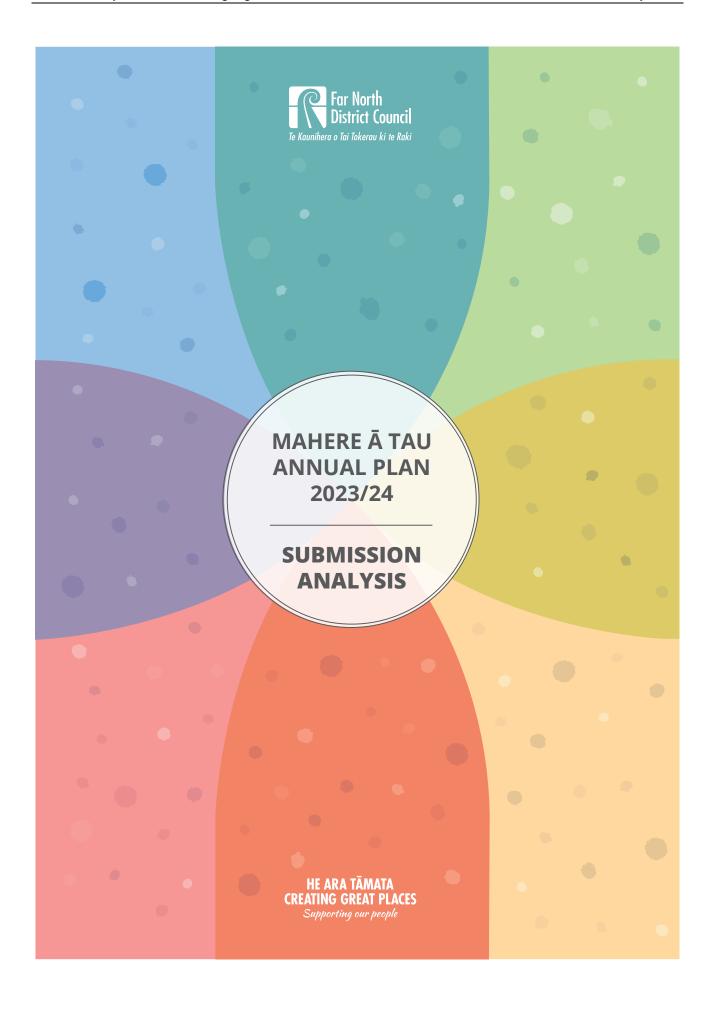

INTRODUCTION

Council agreed to consult with the community on two items for the Annual Plan 2023/24. They were:

- · Partnering with the Turner Centre to better deliver arts and culture for the district
- · Enabling housing development on Māori Freehold Land

Prompted by a media release, local news outlet the Northern Advocate ran a story on the Annual Plan consultation. The main focus of the story was the Turner Centre proposal.

We posted twice on social media; one was a written post with a link that reached 737 people organically, 18 people reacted and 5 shared the post. We also posted a short video with a link in the caption that reached 3200 people, 1800 viewed for longer than three seconds, 708 viewed for longer than 15 seconds. The video had 115 reactions and 64 comments across 14 shares. Across both posts, a total of 134 people clicked through to the Far North District Council webpage where they could find more information and submit.

A letter was sent via email to Te Kahu o Taonui, Te Pouahi o Tai Tokerau, Ngāpuhi, and Ngāti Rēhia and our general consultation database was also notified.

WHAT WE ASKED

1. Partnering with the Turner Centre to better deliver arts and culture for the district

Management of the Turner Centre, as an arts and culture venue, will continue to be the responsibility of the charitable company, The Centre at Kerikeri Limited, with annual reporting to council. Maintenance and core operational costs, like power and insurance, will become the council's responsibility. Ownership of the building would be transferred at zero-cost to council. The council already owns the land.

This proposal will give the charitable trust-owned entity the space and scope to do what they do best; deliver arts programming at a community and commercial level. It will continue to seek external funding opportunities to support this. It will also give the council the opportunity to provide community hall facilities to the wider Kerikeri community.

The options

- 1. The council takes over ownership of the Turner Centre building with The Centre at Kerikeri Limited managing the facility. This is our preferred option. This option would add 0.3 per cent to the general rates portion of a property owner's annual rates total. The exact dollar amount would vary from ratepayer to ratepayer but for most it would add little more than the price of a cup of coffee each year.
- 2. Do not take over ownership of the Turner Centre building. This is not our preferred option. The Far North risks losing the centre as a key community, arts and culture facility and the future of the building itself would be uncertain.

Question proposed in the consultation document

We are proposing to take over ownership of the Turner Centre building, with the Turner Centre Charitable Trust continuing to manage the facility.

SYNOPSIS OF COMMENTS

In regards to the Turner Centre comments below, there were some phrasing that was shared with support groups and included in their submissions in whole or part. Comments have been s

In support:

Arts, culture and creativity greatly add to the wellbeing of our community and the FNDC has an obligation to provide this
for our communities. Council needs to develop sustainable partnerships with organisations such as the Turner Centre to
ensure that arts, culture and creativity play a vital part in community wellbeing across the District.

The Turner Centre brings arts and cultural programming into the region that would otherwise not visit the Far North and without the facility, it will leave us without access to high quality arts, culture and creativity.

Access to the arts develops community cohesion, resilience, increases community spirit, builds community identity and makes the region a better and more vibrant place to live! Without FNDC taking on ownership of the Centre, we will lose this valuable asset and it will greatly impact our access to arts, culture and creativity. Without this valuable asset, it will leave Te Tai Tokerau without access to the large amount of high quality arts, culture and creativity that the Centre presents and greatly contributes towards making our region a vibrant place to live.

Volunteers: The Turner Centre enables me to contribute to and participate in my community through volunteering opportunities. I feel more connected to our community, and know that I belong.

Community Groups: The Turner Centre gives our community groups access to facilities for rehearsals, meetings, hui and community performances at a discounted price. Without the Centre, we would not have a space dedicated to the performing arts.

- I live outside of Kerikeri and value the high quality arts and cultural programming that comes to the Far North via the Turner Centre. Without this valuable asset, it will leave Te Tai Tokerau without access to the large amount of high quality arts, culture and creativity that the Centre presents and greatly contributes towards making our region a vibrant place to live.
- The Turner Centre is an integral part of our community. It will be a huge loss if it has to close. I personally use this facility
 as do many others.
- The operation of the Turner Centre has allowed artists who grew up locally to return to display and share their talents
 with people who made significant contributions to their development over many years. Our son was able to do this, and
 he relished the opportunity.

Against:

- NO, NO! There are other more urgent priorities for the funds that it would take to service this building etc. It is a nice to have but not a necessity in the current times. Has there been any research done on what percentage of people from outside of Kerikeri currently use, have access to or benefit from the centre? I would like to see a lot more resource put into the Kaikohe and surrounding township to bring it up to a better standard for that community instead of always looking like the poorer cousin. This would help address the social issues in the town and make provision for a place where the people of the Kaikohe area, in particular the youth could have access to. Not everyone have the means to travel to Kerikeri especially when there is no public transport. What about Okaihau, Horeke and other rural communities. Kaikohe needs to be the main focus and priority, not throwing more resource at Kerikeri.
- I like the way the Charitable trust is running the Turner Centre and how it supports the arts. I do not trust that the council will not, in the future, change the use of the venue. Given the way the Auckland Council views the importance of the arts ie negatively, I fear this could be a virus spreading through councils and we won't be immune. In Ireland they actually support artists by paying them. I am happy with the status quo, thank you.
- Not a core activity

- It should not be up to rate payers to subsidize this sort of business.
- We have already paid for the centre to be built, if it cant support itself now, then forever we will be paying for something thats
 just going to drain our rates money for a white elephant, when the rates could be used more productively. Sell the centre and
 see if someone can make it work!!!

I'm not sure:

- I would very much appreciate seeing more indigenous performances at Turner Center. Perhaps a series of Waiata
 performance from all of the schools between Whangarei and Kaitaia to reveal the pure beauty of our Kiwi culture.
- I do not think the arts should be supported by rate payers at this time of huge and impossible to cope with cost of living. How many people are going to lose their homes or leave the country all together because of this? I don't care that you have put this stuff into your long term plan, you need to change that... and stop paying for un necessary costs NOW>..... we will be leaving the country if this continues and your taxable base will become less and less, just like all the nurses leaving NZ. What will it take for you to realise that passing on your loss of income due to this government's economic destruction of the last 3 years and the future due to no tourism, that's gone as the cost of living hits potential tourism amongst the middle classes... only the wealthy and they are not enough to make up for the loss of major tourism are going to be able to afford to travel. Again, you can't keep people in a small country who keeps kicking people so hard, it becomes impossible to live here even in just a very basic shack. I am ashamed to send pictures back to my home in the US of people here now living on the streets, closing health care services, people living in shacks of ply as the only thing they can afford now. Your country used to be great, but you have allowed it to disintergrate.... too far, even Mexico looks brilliant compared to here...
- This proposal should be funded by a targeted rate. The majority of our district won't be ever attending any events at the
 Turner Centre. It seems a bit hypocrite to propose a big rates increase and take on this project, which is a "nice to have"
 but definitely not a "must have".

WHAT WE ASKED

2. Enabling housing development on Māori Freehold Land

This policy will give Māori Freehold Landowners the opportunity to apply for reduced rates if they intend to develop the land to provide housing. There are a number of criteria that the applicant needs to meet. These include:

- The land must be suitable for development and have a resource consent
- Applicants must apply for a building consent and code of compliance once building is complete
- · Applicants will need to obtain suitable professional advice and appropriate financial arrangements for the development
- If the development does not proceed, rates will no longer be remitted.

Rates will not be remitted indefinitely. If the application is successful, rates will be remitted on a sliding-scale over a number of years.

• Years 1 - 3 - 100% remitted

Year 7 - 25% remitted

Years 4 - 5- 75% remitted

Year 8 - 0% remitted

• Year 6 - 50% remitted

The options

- 1. The council adopts the draft Enabling Housing Development on Māori Freehold Land Policy with the proposed conditions. This is our preferred option.
- 2. The council amends the conditions in the draft policy. Let us know what changes you would like to make to the conditions. Remember, we are required to have this policy so not adopting it is not an option.

SYNOPSIS OF COMMENTS

The vast majority of people who commented on the first question either did not respond or were not sure in regards to question 2. Comments have been selected at random.

In support:

- Because it's their land. The public have no rights or interest and they will not part with it. It's wrong for us to treat Maori land like freehold land. They can't access the capital or use it for security
- Not adopting it is not an option...,!
- · All people should have access to good quality housing.
- · It is too difficult to build on Maori Freehold Land as banks do not finance. Only Kiwibank. How pathetic.

Against:

- If you are referring to Social housing within Kerikeri unfettered housing development that is not commensurable with the existing plan fundamentally changes the face of a town. International studies show that todays intensive housing development = Tomorrows slums and occur when social housing is not "pepper potted" as per the existing council plans.
- I do not believe in favouritism towards any ethnic group. Reducing or forgoing rates for Maori is RACIST. Why can't council stop spending money on park art (eg) and reduce rates for EVERYONE.
- The time scale for rate remittance seems very long. Once the development is undertaken the remittance should have a much shorter timeframe as the return will have been gained well before the timeframe suggested.
- There is a more challenging issue as well in that all should be treated equally, no matter who owns the land. Understand
 the value of the land being used but wonder if some other incentive should be considered. The area where this land is
 located has limited population and therefore rates to support infrastructure already

- · I dont know anything about this and think its a bit outside my scope of interest.

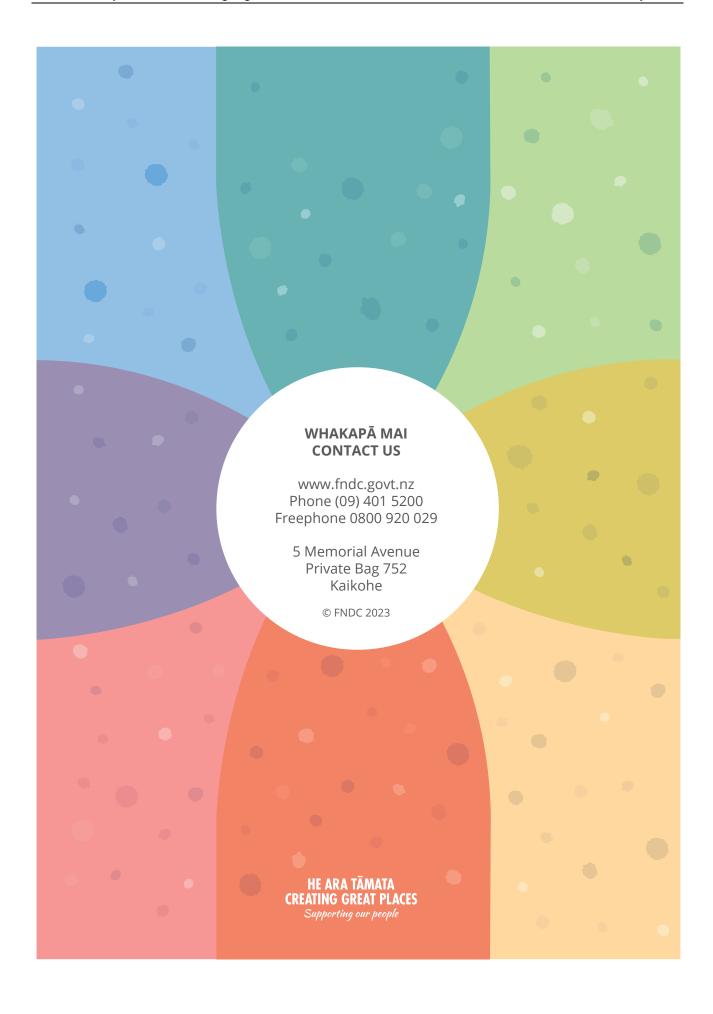

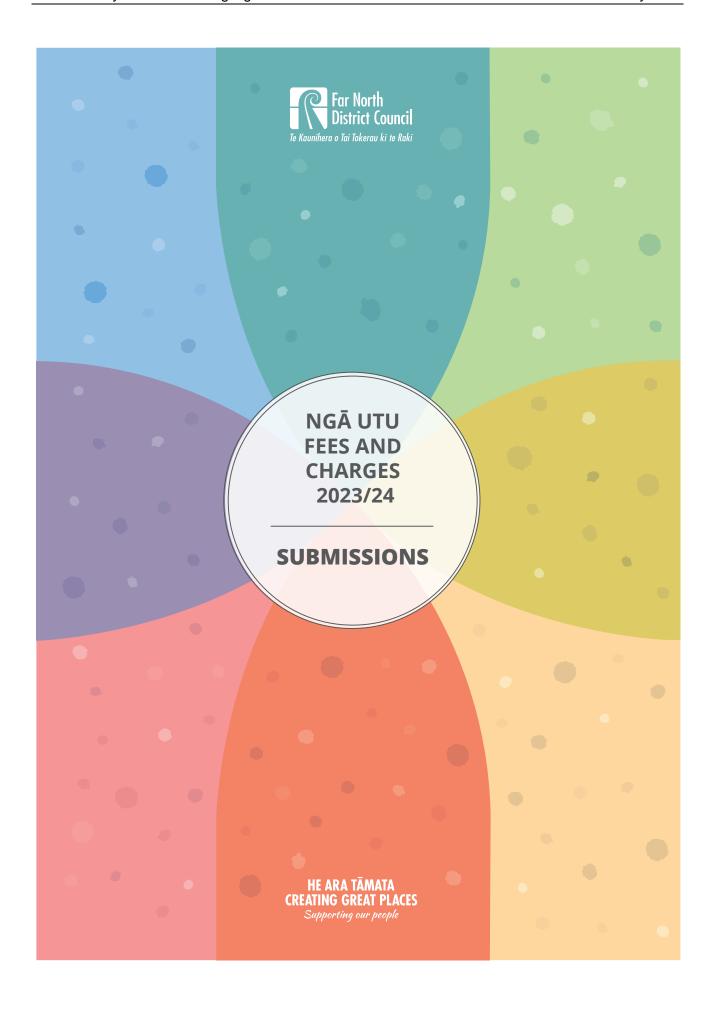

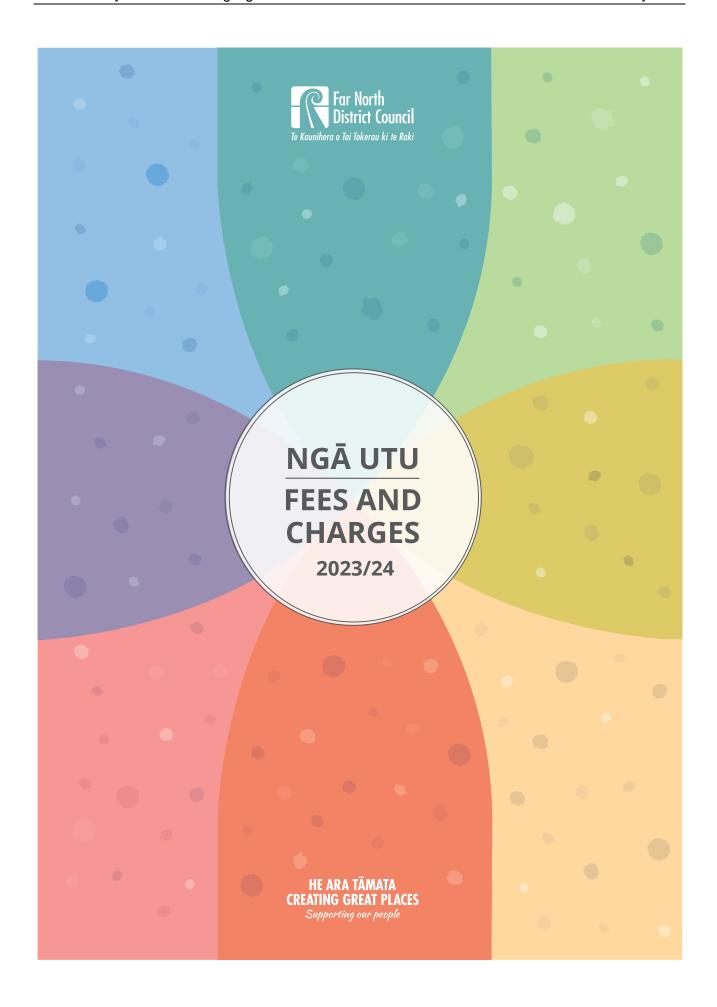


Other Fees and charges comments (via the Annual Plan submission process)

- We support the proposed changes to Fees and Charges based on the "user pays" principal.
 We are also still strongly in favour of re-introducing Development Fees to ensure Developers pay for the impact on infrastructure.
- Re the Fees- Resource Consent hourly fee makes sense to me. Building Consent should be a fixed fee in my opinion.
- The proposal for Resource Consent fees and charges increase is not in line with the private sector or the actual costs for hourly processing charges. The shortfall will need to be absorbed into the general rates or obtained through other fees. In my opinion private development should be self-funding. The hourly processing charges for the Resource Consents are 10-30% lower than what they should be. This creates budget pressure in these areas and resourcing issues.

The charge out rates are not equitable across the schedule. A clear example is the comparison of rate charges between the Building consent and Resource consent fees. A Resource Consent Engineer is proposed to be charged out at \$190/ hour and a Development engineer proposed to be \$265/hour effectively similar roles. I declare that I am an employee of Far North District Council in the Resource Consents team.

 Yes. Stop tripling the costs of council fees. I've recently learned that the Resource Consent fee has increased from \$1750 to \$4900 in under 3 years. This is OUTRAGEOUS and completely unexplainable.

Building consents

Building notes

It is important to note that each building project and site may be different, so please use this information as a guideline only.

Total consent costs may not be known until the consent has been processed to approval.

For an indication of fees payable with your building consent application, please use our building fee calculator or contact our building staff on free phone 0800 920 029 (Northland land lines only) or 09 401 5200.

When are building fees payable?

If your building project falls under the criteria for fixed fee applications, then you will be paying a fee as stated in the consolidated fees schedule. This fee will be required when lodging your application.

If your building project falls outside the criteria for fixed fee applications, then you will be in the banded fee bracket. These fees will be calculated based on processing time and will be invoiced at time of issue of your consent.

When issuing a Code Compliance Certificate a check is done to see if there are any outstanding inspection or processing fees and these will be invoiced at this time.

In all cases, Council payment terms apply to all issued invoices.

How do I work out the estimated value?

This is the total value of the building work including GST. Usually the designer or architect supplies the contract square metre rate and Council checks this against national statistics, the MBIE website, Building Economist and Codeword's publications.

Why do I get charged for inspections in advance?

Council policy is to release building consents as soon as possible. Estimated inspection fees are paid in advance to assist this process to avoid delays for all parties.

What are 'actual costs' and what will they include?

- Processing, inspections and administration services
- It may also include external services engaged to carry out reviews for Council e.g. New Zealand Fire Service and Heritage NZ etc.
- Disbursements like scanning, copying, telephone, travel and postage.

What are external services and why are they applicable to my application?

External services are usually for New Zealand Fire Service design review, engineering technical or weather-tightness review for complex design or when unproven methods are

proposed or input from Heritage NZ for any archaeological reviews.

When does my consent become commercial and trigger the higher fees?

Generally when the building use is associated with public use and the engagement of employees

Some descriptions of these building types include:

- · Communal residential (hostel / prison)
- Communal non-residential (church / school)
- · Commercial (bank / service station)
- Industrial (agricultural building / sewage plant)

These classified uses attract the higher fee due to the additional design complexity and use of specified systems.

What happens if I don't go ahead with my building consent, do I get a total refund?

This function is carried out on a case-by-case basis and no full refund is provided due to administration and cost overheads. In normal cases there will be a refund for unused inspections, and BRANZ / MBIE levies.

If processing has already begun, partially complete or fully completed fees will be deducted accordingly.

Other fee information

Some levies are set by other agencies and are not affected by this proposal.

All fees are GST inclusive unless otherwise stated.

Building application fees are based on the project value of the building works, simple structures or minor type applications.

Fixed fee applications

This fee applies to building work with a project value of less than \$20,000.

This fee applies to residential projects only.

This fee applies to specific works as listed in the chart below – the fee includes:

- · Building processing
- District plan processing (where applicable)
- Inspections as nominated (additional inspections will be charged at the current fee rate)
- Code compliance certificate application fee.

This fee is non-refundable due to the reduced fee offered for these services.

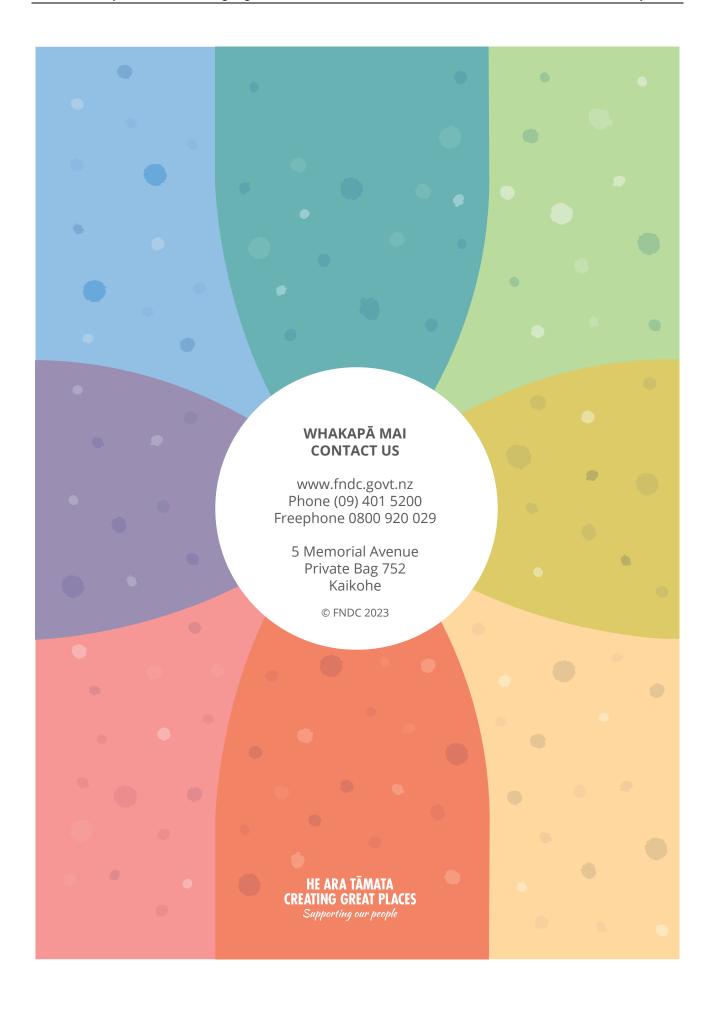

Executive Summary: This report is to update Council on the loan guarantee agreement for the Kerikeri Civic Trust. This report also seeks support for Council to continue to guarantee the loan and cover interest payments.

REPORT:

1. Background

In 2004, Council resolved to guarantee a loan of \$1.5 million for the Kerikeri Civic Trust, to construct the Centre at Kerikeri, based on a Memorandum of Understanding between Council and the Trust signed in 2003. This was subsequently increased to \$1.9 million in 2005. As part of this MOU and guarantee, Council has paid the interest costs for the loan. The present loan agreement expires on 13 May 2010.

Following discussion at the February Audit and Finance Committee Meeting, the General Manager Finance and Business Performance was requested to work with the Civic Trust to obtain competitive quotes for a new loan. Quotes were obtained from both Westpac (the existing provider) and ASB Bank (Council's primary banker). The renewal terms offered by Westpac were the best offered, and are:

Term: 3 years

Amount: \$1.9 million

Interest Rate: Floating at a margin of 1%. At the time of the offer, this equated to a rate of 4.2% on a 90 day basis. There is an option to convert to a fixed rate at 5 banking days notice. On current interest rates, the annual cost to Council would be \$80,000, less than half the current cost to Council.

Prepayment: As Council has provided for potential repayment of the loan of \$113,000 per annum from 2011/12 through to 2018/19 in its Long Term Community Council Plan, the terms allow for partial repayment of principal at 5 banking days notice. In addition, the Trust's operating company is working on initiatives to generate more income, which could assist in repaying the loan.

The guarantee document has been reviewed by FNDC's Legal Services Team. The document is in standard form, but needs some changes for Council. These will be worked through between Council's legal team and Westpac before signing.

2. Options & Assessment

If the loan is allowed to expire in May 2010, the bank is likely to request repayment of the \$1.9 million from Council as guarantor. By continuing with the guarantee under the revised terms, Council will incur reduced interest costs (refer to Section 3 of this report, Financial Implications).

3. Financial Implications

Savings over interest payments of \$80,000 per annum at present interest rates. Further savings as loan is repaid in the future.

4. Policy Context

Council has an established strategy on this matter. It is in accordance with the Council resolutions in 2004 and 2005. It is also in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding (Appendix A) that was signed in 2003.

5. Implications for Māori

There are no specific implications for Maori over and above any other ratepayer.

6. Community Board Views

There are no specific implications for Community Boards.

7. Legislative Compliance

The relevant legislation in relation to this issue is Section 12 of the Local Government Act. The information provided in this report and the recommended resolution complies in all respects with relevant legislation.

In relation to Section 79 of the Local Government Act 2002, this issue is considered to be of low significance.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the report, "Kerikeri Civic Trust Loan Guarantee", be received;

And that Council approves the continuation of the guarantee and interest payments under the terms offered by Westpac in accordance with clause 4 A & B of the Memorandum of Understanding between Far North District Council and the Kerikeri Civic Trust.

APPENDIX I

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BETWEEN THE FAR NORTH DISTRICT COUNCIL (the Council)

AND THE KERIKERI CIVIC TRUST (the Trust)

BACKGROUND

- A. Both parties are committed to the provision of a new facility for the Far North District to be developed in Kerikeri to provide for the performing and creative arts and indoor recreation needs of the community and to serve as a base for a Centre of Excellence to be established ("the project").
- B. The Trust is recognised as the body which has undertaken the role of raising the necessary funds and to build a new complex in Cobham Road, Kerikeri and to appoint a community based Management Committee to operate such facility.
- C. The Trust now requires the sum of \$1.5 million dollars either by way of a cash grant or several cash grants plus its other revitalised fundraising efforts or failing that by way of underwriting, to enable it to draw down major funding from external charitable trusts and secure other donors to enable construction to start on the new facility.
- D. The Trust has made an approach to the Council to provide a guarantee to enable the project to commence while the Trust continues fundraising the guarantee to be for a maximum of \$1.5 million dollars.
- E. The Council, having satisfied itself as to the prospects of success of the Trust's fundraising efforts, has agreed to enter into a scheme of arrangement to enable the Trust to proceed with construction and to enhance its (the Trusts) ability to secure the necessary funding on the

basis that any call on the guarantee is contingent on the Trust fundraising target not being fully achieved.

F. The Trust has employed the services of a professional fundraising organisation. The Trust acknowledges that in addition to the efforts of the professional fundraiser, that it has an obligation to demonstrate genuine intent to energetically fundraise itself, and to exhaust all avenues to achieve its fundraising targets with the objective of ensuring that the Council will only be required to provide the guarantee as a last resort.

IT IS HEREBY AGREED

- The Trust will establish a six monthly meeting programme including a written report to the Council; the report to be on fundraising progress.
- The Trust will develop a quarterly newsletter to keep all interested parties informed as to progress on fundraising.
- The Trust will continue with its fundraising efforts in order to secure the balance of the funding needed to provide for the community a new Bay of Islands Cultural Centre incorporating the proposed New Zealand Centre of Excellence.

The Trust has identified Stage I of the project and this has a budget of \$5.675 million dollars (as at 30 June 2003) and the balance of fundraising referred to in this clause is \$1.6 million dollars.

The Trust will give first priority to raise the \$1.6 million dollars but will not be precluded from accepting funds for other specific purposes if this is deemed by Council to be advantageous to the project. These funds (if any) will be held separately from those held for Stage 1.

The above clause shall not be used by the Trust to shelter funds from the Trusts first obligation to repay the total amount of any principal owing to its banker including the \$500,000 referred to in clause 6.

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- The Trust will if cash flow requires seek from its bankers a loan to a maximum of \$1.5 million dollars on the following basis:
 - (a) The application for loan will be supported by a guarantee from the Council to the level required by the Lender
 - (b) The Trust will endeavour to secure an interest only loan with flexible repayment options and the Council will pay the interest as it falls due.
- 5. That the Trust will undertake that from the drawdown of any loan facility any monies received by the Trust as the result of continuing Stage 1 fundraising efforts will be applied to the reduction in the amount of the loan principal thereby reducing the interest cost to the Council; provided that no reduction shall be made until final costs of Stage I have been provided for.
- 6. Five years after the guarantee is triggered, the Council shall have the option to call up any liability under the guarantee from the Trust provided that if the balance is less than \$500,000.00 the Council will write off the liability of the Trust by using its statutory powers to raise the funds by a charge on properties in the Eastern Ward (or the same area if subsequently renamed) on terms fixed by the Council.
- 7. In the event that the Council is required to indemnify the Trust for unfunded principal by way of a rate, per clause 6 above, the Council be credited with an equivalent value of access to the Cultural Centre over the period of the rate by way of a discount on seat prices or such other method the Trust through its Management Committee deems appropriate; the distribution of such discount to be agreed between the Council and the Bay of Islands Cultural Centre Management Committee.

Item 9.2 Kerikeri Civic Trust Loan Guarantee

- The Council agrees to publicly endorse the Stage I fundraising by any reasonable means when requested by the Trust and to encourage new donors to come forward.
- It is also agreed that before assent is able to be given to this agreement by Council that the following conditions are met to Council's satisfaction:
 - (a) A three year business plan for the Cultural Centre is produced showing estimated operational income and expenditure and key assumptions made in its creation. And that this business plan be signed off by two trustee members and two community members of the management committee, and that the business skills of the management committee be outlined in that business plan.
 - (b) That the Trust produces a statement to the effect that it intends to own and operate the Cultural Centre after its construction and to direct the ongoing management of the facility.
 - (c) That the Trust produces an up to date report on building cost estimates signed by the Project Manager.

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To formalise the support provided to Kapiti Coast District Council and Invercargill City Council on their respective remit applications for consideration at the 2023 Local Government New Zealand (LGNZ) Annual General Meeting (AGM).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- An application for a remit submission requires the support of an LGNZ zone, sector or five Councils.
- The Kapiti Coast District Council and Invercargill City Council have requested the support of 2 respective remit applications to be submitted to LGNZ for inclusion on the 2023 LGNZ AGM agenda.
- The requests are to offer support by 23 May 2023 to ensure timely submission by Wednesday, 24 May 2023.
- Due to the timeframe for deliverables, this report could not be postponed to the next Council meeting, 1 June 2023

RECOMMENDATION

That the Far North District Council endorse the support provided to Kapiti Coast District Council and Invercargill City Council on the following remits to be submitted to the 2023 Local Government New Zealand AGM:

Kapiti Coast District Council - Kiwisaver

Invercargill City Council - Young Elected Members Network

1) BACKGROUND

Each year LGNZ calls for proposed remits to be considered at their Annual General Meeting. Nominating Councils must have endorsement from 5 other Councils. The AGM votes on these proposals and adopted remits become LGNZ Policy.

The respective remits proposed by Kapiti Coast District Council and Invercargill City Council have been received by Far North District Council, requesting support to validate an application to LGNZ.

The applications for each of the remits are attached.

2) DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

An overview of the remit and the importance as suggested by the applicant is listed below:

#	Remit		Importance as per application
1.	Kapiti Coast D Council - Kiwisaver	District	This remit is about equity. For 16 years, since its inception, KiwiSaver has been available for ALL New Zealanders, who usually reside in New Zealand, and are aged between 18 and 65 and work. And for the entire time, our sector has been the only group in our country who have been excluded from the accruing savings, and any ability to benefit from personal and employer contributions and annual Government contributions.

KiwiSaver has evolved into a sort of universal benefit for all to use during our lifetimes, whether it is for a first home deposit, during a personal or community emergency, or as a form of life insurance.

Unfortunately, those elected members who are most fiscally disadvantaged fall into two groups. The young, who we are trying so hard to attract to the sector, and those with the experience of 2 or 3 or more triennium behind them, who can count in the tens of thousands, the negative effects on their KiwiSaver balances on their 65th birthday.

We meet all the criteria to be eligible for KiwiSaver benefits, all we ask for is to be treated like all other New Zealanders.

2. Invercargill City Council - Young Elected Members Network

This remit is critically important as it addresses the pressing issue of a lack of a standardised and independent process for handling complaints and escalating issues within local government.

Currently, councils handle their own problems in an ad-hoc manner, leaving many complaints unanswered and individuals feeling unsafe to come forward. This absence of a clear and impartial process undermines transparency, accountability, and public trust in local government. It also fails to provide legal protection for complainants and increases the risk of defamation.

By establishing a comprehensive framework that includes a complaints / issues / support / mediation forum and a tiered escalation process, this remit aims to promote fairness, protect complainants, restore public confidence, strengthen local democracy, and ensure timely and effective issue resolution. It will also enable economies of scale for Councils as with a centralised system it means that Councils are not left trying to justify the cost of an investigation against the cost of allowing behaviour to remain unchallenged¹.

In September 2021, the LGC released the report to the Minister of Local Government. The report noted the wide variety of approaches of how Councils deal with complaints or issues and the total inability to deal efficiently with breaches. The recommendations have been placed on hold until the outcome of the Future of Local Government is resolved – while there is some merit to this approach as it allows changes to be done together, there is a very clear need for a standardised complaints process, improved tools to Councils and a reinforcing of the COC² process. This should also include the education / best practice guidance the LGC reference in the report.

¹ The current cots to Councils of Councillor "HR" is not known, Code of Conduct investigations for ICC have generally cost at least \$10,000.00. The cost of this proposed system needs to be balanced against the costs of other interventions (Commissioners in Tauranga and the intervention at ICC).

In 2013, responding to an inquiry from a newly elected councilor, the Department of Internal Affairs office explained that LG elected members were excluded from receiving KiwiSaver because they got remuneration, and weren't technically employed, but that this was a matter of sorting out the mechanics.

They sorted it out to the extent that Members of Parliament became eligible for it, but still not our sector. The Remuneration Authority Report on Members of Parliament Remuneration (July 2021) says 'MPs elected after 1992 are entitled to a superannuation subsidy contribution. The scheme can be Kiwisaver or registered retirement savings...'

Elected Members have submitted the need for KiwiSaver entitlement at every Remuneration Authority Review. There have been letters written to every Minister of Local Government since 2013, and there have been a few.

In June 2022, Minister Kieran McAnulty was appointed Associate Minister for Local Government, he embarked on a road trip to spend time at every council table. At our table, he and our local MP were shocked to hear that no LG elected member in New Zealand was entitled to KiwiSaver benefits and they put it on their matters for action list.

We finally heard back in January 2023, when we were asked to submit to the Local Government Sector review, and asked to make sure there were plenty of requests for KiwiSaver to entitlement to push the issue to the top of the list for change.

In April 2023, the newly formed LGNZ Community Board Executive Committee members voted unanimously to seek the support of councils for an LGNZ remit regarding central government action on KiwiSaver, for all elected members.

As a sector, we have only one National body to lobby alongside us and for us, and this remit to LGNZ is the next step. This is an opportunity to thank the LGNZ executive for their past support of elected members on this issue. We again seek active support from LGNZ on this issue to enable us all to be treated fairly, like everyone else, so that our sector can thrive.

And we seek membership support to make this happen for all elected members now and in the future

Remembering that during our tenure as elected members, to be our best for our communities leaves very few hours in any day for paid employment or the operation of private businesses on the side. And while we work so hard our computer-generated monthly remuneration summaries show that we are paid in some cases \$4 an hour. ...without even KiwiSaver benefits. In reality, this is financial punishment.

The fact is we already meet all criteria to be eligible for KiwiSaver, and to be excluded is an omission that must be addressed, so the appeal is made to our National Body to assist on our behalf.

WHY IS THIS REMIT IMPORTANT?

This remit is critically important as it addresses the pressing issue of a lack of a standardised and independent process for handling complaints and escalating issues within local government.

Currently, councils handle their own problems in an ad-hoc manner, leaving many complaints unanswered and individuals feeling unsafe to come forward. This absence of a clear and impartial process undermines transparency, accountability, and public trust in local government. It also fails to provide legal protection for complainants and increases the risk of defamation.

By establishing a comprehensive framework that includes a complaints / issues / support / mediation forum and a tiered escalation process, this remit aims to promote fairness, protect complainants, restore public confidence, strengthen local democracy, and ensure timely and effective issue resolution. It will also enable economies of scale for Councils as with a centralised system it means that Councils are not left trying to justify the cost of an investigation against the cost of allowing behaviour to remain unchallenged³.

In September 2021, the LGC released the report to the Minister of Local Government. The report noted the wide variety of approaches of how Councils deal with complaints or issues and the total inability to deal efficiently with breaches. The recommendations have been placed on hold until the outcome of the Future of Local Government is resolved – while there is some merit to this approach as it allows changes to be done together, there is a very clear need for a standardised complaints process, improved tools to Councils and a reinforcing of the COC⁴ process. This should also include the education / best practice guidance the LGC reference in the report.

BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT:

Recent examples – GDC situation, ICC DIA investigation, allegations of sexism, sexual harassment, general relationship breakdowns and issues in Tauranga, Wellington and Dunedin last term.

We acknowledge that issues arise across local government that require investigation, inquiry, or mediation.

The absence of a national standardised and independent process for handling complaints and escalating issues within local government has led to the pressing need for action⁵. Currently, councils handle their own problems on an ad-hoc basis, leaving many complaints unanswered and individuals hesitant to come forward. This lack of a clear and impartial process undermines transparency, accountability, and public trust in local government. It also fails to provide legal protection for complainants and increases the risk of defamation. The COC inquiry is often very expensive and results in sanctions (if approved by a majority of Councillors in some cases) in what can only be called the "wet bus ticket".

The intense scrutiny placed on local body governance by the community emphasises the need for regular external support to drive positive change. Without such support, unresolved issues can ultimately lead to the involvement of the DIA6 and the appointment of a commissioner, representing a worst-case scenario.

Relevant legislation, policy, or practice has not adequately addressed this issue, resulting in gaps and inconsistencies in handling complaints. COC process enables the issue to be escalated to the Chief Executive. Informal conduct complaints are to be escalated to the Mayor, however if the Mayor is part of the problem this doesn't provide for a safe environment.

If a councillor is to escalate to a COC complaint, often this results in a very public fight which also generally results in a public apology that doesn't really resolve anything.⁷

It appears to the sector that where there is no national process or independent forum in which to take these issues, issues have been left to escalate or fester leading to governance breakdowns.

The absence of legal protection for complainants further exacerbates the problem, discouraging individuals from raising legitimate concerns.

We acknowledge that the process of investigation opens the sector up to media enquiry and does not protect the complainant coming forward. While this is keenly felt by the communities in which it is occurring, it also does a disservice to local democracy and local government generally.

Given the degree of intense community scrutiny on local body governance, the sector recognises that regular, external support is necessary to shift the dial.

Many terms of reference used to investigate complaints often fail to address the core issues comprehensively. Consequently, the necessary outcomes required to restore confidence in councils or individuals are not adequately addressed, resulting in slow progress and ongoing dissatisfaction.

By establishing a comprehensive framework that includes a complaints / issues / support / mediation forum and a tiered escalation process, this remit aims to promote fairness, protect complainants, restore public confidence, strengthen local democracy, and ensure timely and effective issue resolution as well as being cost effective for Councils.

Taking action is crucial to uphold good governance, address grievances, and maintain the integrity of local government institutions.

How does this remit relate to LGNZ's current work programme?

This remit aligns to the current work programme around Governance as a model COC is prepared at the start of each term of Council. However, as noted there is a gap in Councils abilities to deal with issues when they arise leading either to expensive COC investigations with little ability to do anything or to Terms of Reference for external investigations. This remit seeks LGNZ to work with the LGC to put in place the appreciate mechanisms to helps Councils resolves complaints.

How will ICC help LGNZ to make progress on this Remit?

ICC⁹ in the previous term had a DIA lead intervention after conflict within Council, and in this current term a number of issues have been raised as the result of a Councillors actions outside of Council. Because of these ICC is able to share its experience with the sector and Commission and is well placed in being able to provide evidence of what happens when it goes wrong and what can help. ICC would also be willing to provide assistance to make submissions and lead a working group to engage with the LGC and Minsters office as needed.

This adds complexity for Councils and other organisations and reduces the positive impact that the inclusion of wellbeing in the Act could have. During various stages of Covid-19 lockdowns, Elected Members were able to attend and count as part of the quorum via audio-visual link. Members had found that the allowances made through the Epidemic Preparedness notice allowed some flexibility to attend and count towards the quorum, while working from home due to sickness or due to other commitments. The lapse of the Epidemic Preparedness notice has impacted the ability of Members to attending via audio-visual link.

Currently, Council and Committee Chairs allow for Members to attend meetings, as well as join in the discussion and vote via audio-visual link under the Standing Orders. However, those attending via audio-visual link do not count towards the required quorum, despite taking part in the discussion and vote.

CHANGE TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT

The Local Government (Community Wellbeing) Amendment Act restored the four aspects of wellbeing, as below:

Section 3(d)

From "Provides for local authorities to play a broad role in meeting the current and future needs of their communities for good-quality local infrastructure, local public services, and performance of regulatory functions".

To "Provides for local authorities to play a broad role in promoting the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of their communities, taking a sustainable development approach".

Section 10(1)(b)

From "To meet the current and future needs of communities for good-quality local infrastructure, local public services, and performance of regulatory functions in a way that is most cost-effective for households and businesses".

To "In promoting the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of communities in the present and for the future".

EXAMPLES OF DIFFERENT FRAMEWORKS FOR WELLBEING USED NATIONALLY

The Public Finance (Wellbeing) Amendment Act, requires Treasury to provide an independent report on the state of Wellbeing in New Zealand at least every four years. To enable this, the Treasury's Living Standards Framework (LSF) was developed. The LSF is a flexible framework that prompts thinking about policy impacts across the different dimensions of wellbeing, as well as the long-term and distributional issues and implications of policy.

In late 2021 the LSF was updated to better reflect culture and children's wellbeing, including being more compatible with te ao Māori and Pacific cultures. It introduced three levels:

Level 1: Our Individual and Collective Wellbeing

This level of the framework includes 12 domains: Health; Knowledge and skills; Housing; Environmental amenity; Leisure and play; Cultural capability and belonging; Work, care and volunteering; Family and friends; Engagement and voice; Safety; Income, consumption and wealth; and Subjective wellbeing.

Level 2: Our Institutions and Governance

The institutions can be disaggregated into six spheres: Whanau, Hapu and Iwi; Firms and markets; Families and households; Central and local government; Civil society; and International connections. What sets each sphere apart is a common set of values, roles and rules.

Level 3: The Wealth of Aotearoa New Zealand

Our wealth is divided into four categories Natural environment; Financial and physical capital; Social cohesion; and Human capability, along with culture, which underpins it all.

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The LSF is one of two wellbeing frameworks at the Treasury.

He Ara Waiora, meaning a pathway towards wellbeing, is the second wellbeing framework at the Treasury. He Ara Waiora is a framework that helps the Treasury to understand waiora, often translated as a Māori perspective on wellbeing.

Ngā Tūtohu Aotearoa – Indicators Aotearoa New Zealand - In early 2018, then New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern announced the Government's plan for New Zealand to become the first country in the world to embed wellbeing and sustainable development in its budget decision-making process, by using measures of social, cultural, and environmental progress. It was agreed that Stats NZ would be well placed to partner with Treasury to develop this new approach to budget decision-making. Ngā Tūtohu Aotearoa – Indicators Aotearoa New Zealand was developed, with 109 Wellbeing indicators outlined on their website, with the stated purpose that "These indicators are collections of data and research that help us measure the state or condition of particular aspects of our wellbeing". 'Wellbeing' is a broad term that covers the conditions we experience in our general existence – both as individuals and as broader groups or communities. Wellbeing encompasses our health, happiness, success, and security.

Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency Benefits Framework - This framework is aligned with the Ministry of Transport's Transport Outcomes Framework and Treasury's Living Standards Framework. The Transport Outcomes Framework sets a purpose for the transport system centred around the wellbeing of New Zealanders and the liveability of places. It outlines five outcome areas to contribute to this purpose: inclusive access, healthy and safe people, economic prosperity, environmental sustainability, and resilience and security. The Transport Outcomes Framework provides clarity for everyone involved, what they are aiming to achieve, why it is important and how they will work together to achieve the goals.

The Pacifica Wellbeing Framework, the Maaori Wellbeing framework (He Ara Waiora), the Children's Commissioner's Wellbeing Wheel and He Ara Oranga Wellbeing Outcomes Framework are wellbeing frameworks in the health and education sectors.

United Nations 17 Sustainable Development goals - the SGDs are a global strategy to end poverty, protect the planet and promote prosperity and peace. Specifically, Goal 3 is to ensure healthy lives and promote wellbeing for all at all ages.
