We have ongoing issues here at the Resort due to alcohol being consumed on the beach on Foreshore Road and also on Taipa Point road and on the section across from the Resort and also down at the Boat Ramp. The section across from the Resort is private land so understandably does not come under the jurisdiction of this bylaw however the other areas I am strongly in agreeance to KEEPING THE ALCOHOL CONTROL BYLAW IN PLACE INDEFINITELY. The issues around Taipa have escalated in the past 12 months to the point where I was physically abused on Sunday the 9th October which is now in police hands. We have numerous vehicles driving with excessive speed along Taipa point Road around foreshore road and Adams road. No stopping at intersections, burnouts and donuts being continuously done starting in the afternoon to all hours of the morning. This is affecting the business of the Resort and therefore local jobs and also the reputation of the Far North. We want tourism to thrive here in the Far North and unfortunately the issues we are facing are doing the opposite. This behaviour is also putting lives of the locals our guests and visitors to the area in danger. This behaviour is happening on a continual basis weekdays, weekends, public holidays there is no pattern. Te Tai Tokerau PHO supports strategies to reduce alcohol-related harm including those that protect the public and drinkers by altering the drinking environment. We strongly support the proposed Alcohol Control Bylaw and congratulate Far North District Council on the proactive and pragmatic approach taken on this issue. Restricting areas where alcohol can be consumed in public is one of several strategies that can reduce alcohol related harm. Alcohol is no ordinary commodity but rather is a legalised toxic drug and carcinogen with the potential to cause serious harm. There are high levels of alcohol related harm in the Far North as in other parts of the country. Most recent NZ Health Survey data (2011-2014) shows over one in five 21% of Northlanders drink at levels of harm to their health, a significantly higher proportion than the NZ average. The proportion is significantly higher for Maori (nearly 27% compared with 13% for non-Maori). Alcohol-related harm contributes significantly to physical, mental and social ill-health particularly for vulnerable populations such as the economically deprived and young people. It contributes to Maori: non-Maori inequities; and it often affects those who are not even consumers, but third parties affected by drinking decisions of others such as unborn children. The burden of alcohol on peoples health and wellbeing is substantial. Excessive alcohol consumption is a causal factor in many other diseases including cardiovascular disease, cancers (e.g. colorectal, breast, oral and liver cancers) and foetal alcohol spectrum disorders. Rates of these conditions in Northland are some of the highest in NZ and are inequitable in their impact. Breast cancer is the leading cause of alcohol-related death in NZ for both Maori and non-Maori women. In a 2014 Salvation Army report comparing geographic regions of New Zealand , Northland came out second from the bottom in the rankings for safety and social hazards. The social hazards covered gambling, illicit drug use and misuse of alcohol. Northland scored 89 out of a worst possible score of 112, second only to Gisborne with 101. In the rankings for child and youth wellbeing Northland scored dead last. Places on the score card that none of us should be proud of. (It is hard to think of any other lawful product available in our society that contributes so much to so many social ills. While alcohol misuse is only one of several risk factors contributing to these harms, alcohol distinguishes itself because, unlike many other factors associated with crime, injury and social dysfunction, the harmful use of alcohol is a modifiable risk factor. In other words, as a society, we can modify our use of alcohol) . It is imperative that organisations like the Far North District Council, which has an important role to play in supporting the wellbeing of the population, does all it can to reduce alcohol related harm. According to the New Zealand Health Surveys data for 2014-17, 82.3 per cent of Northlanders aged 15 years and over as compared to 79.6 per cent of New Zealanders aged 15 years and over consumed alcohol in the past 12 months and the difference was statistically significant. Nearly 21 per cent of Northland adult respondents met the criteria for hazardous drinking (Hazardous drinking refers to an established drinking pattern that carries a risk of harming physical or mental health, or having harmful social effects to the drinker or others). Excessive alcohol consumption is a major risk factor contributing to physical, mental, and social ill-health in our community. It is estimated that alcohol is a factor in 33 per cent of New Zealand Polices apprehensions and 50 per cent of serious violent crimes are alcohol-related. Alcohol-related harm in our communities can be addressed through various measures and implementing alcohol control areas at local levels is one of them. We support the proposed Alcohol Control Bylaw and the control areas. However, we recommend that the alcohol control areas should be clearly sign posted and advertised throughout the district. Considering that the three Northland district councils (Far North, Kaipara, and Whangarei) are concurrently reviewing their respective alcohol control bylaws, the signage for alcohol control areas should be clear and consistent across the three districts. The maps didnt explicitly refer to the beaches. Young people wanted this to be clarified further and well publicised. - Can a timeframe be put on the bans for beaches, so daylight is ok but not night? Night was seen as a hazard with darkness, bottles, vehicles on beaches for fishing etc, drunk people, and drink driving on beaches as theres no police presence and no community pressure to behave as you cant be seen. - The current bylaw leaves a lot to the common sense and discretion of the police, which young people felt was questionable, especially in light of institutional racism. Young people asked whether the bylaw could be made more explicit, eg police can warn/arrest only if the person can actually be proved to have alcohol on their breath, which might avoid perceived unfair police actions. - The example about a glass of wine with a picnic at a park being maybe ok, was perceived as an example of this institutional racism (ie, a white lady with a wineglass on the beach might be deemed ok by the police, but a young Maori man with a beer can on the beach might not be.) - Young people dont know the rules about liquor bans and what they mean. Can the signage be more informative, ie, can it give a website to learn more? - Some young people like to take photos of themselves with alcohol in front of a liquor ban sign, and post these to social media. 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Kawakawa Hundertwasser Park Management Plan

The Kawakawa Hundertwasser Park is located on the north side of the township and is made up of the following land parcels:

1. Section 9, Suburbs of Kawakawa which contains 2.6305ha and is fee-simple
2. Section 1 and 4, SO 430199 containing 0.7892ha and being fee-simple and acquired for purposes of River Control
3. Section 5, SO 430199 containing 0.0976ha and being fee-simple acquired for purposes of River Control
4. Lot 1, DP 320865 that contains 2357m² classified pursuant to the Reserves Act as a Local Purpose (Parking) Reserve

The management plan provides for granting of leases for the park to groups that wish to develop the park in accordance with the plan. An extract from the plan is as follows;

LEASES AND RIGHTS TO OCCUPY

Objective

To grant leases or licenses to occupy to groups that wish to develop and manage the park in accordance with the management plan.

Policies

1. *To negotiate leases in accordance with the Reserves Act 1977 and on such other conditions and charges as Council may from time to time determine.*
2. *Decisions on renewal or re-negotiation of leases of the park will be at the discretion of Council.*

A lease to the Kawakawa Hundertwasser Charitable Trust for the land parcels 1-3 above is to be approved by Council in April 2013.

Council is currently in discussions with the Trust about leasing the 4th land parcel, the Local Purpose [Parking] Reserve, to the Trust. However before finalizing the lease details Council needs to be satisfied as to how this land will be developed.

Council understands that the Trust is seeking funds to complete a concept plan/landscape plan of this area.
